I believe that the issue of affordable housing is crucial for our community at this time, and it is a personal priority for me.

As for qualifications, I offer my years of experience in the for-profit investment real estate field, emphasizing acquisition and development of condominiums and apartments. ODC Accessibility Committee Designee for Clackamas County beginning August 1994. In accordance with ORS 447.230, the ODC provides annual training covering current Chapter 31 of the Uniform Building Code (UBC) and Amendments for mandated ODC representation (via Designees) involved in UBC compliance waiver/appeals process with [here] Clackamas County Appeals Board. In most cases, such early contact/intervention results further analysis and strategies to comply with UBC and avoiding the formal waiver/appeal process altogether. In addition, Committee is involved in drafting periodic amendements to Chapter 11 of Oregon Specialty Structural Code (OSSC).

Following public hearing process, final (favorable/affirmative) recommendation was presented to Board of County Commissioners. Implementation effective July 1, 1997.

<u>Disability Services Transfer Implementation Planning Committee</u>. Member, April '97 to date. The 25 member committee is comprised of area disability and aging services advocates and staff have estblished 5 smaller committees to facilitate and ensure a transfer which will result in the least possible impact to or disruption of services.

City of Portland and Multnomah County, Housing & Community Development Commission,

Fair Housing Plan Advisory Committee. Member, September '95 - May '96. The 16 member advisory group comprised of fair housing agency staff and advocates and specialists from the public and private sectors was created to fulfill a US Department of Housing and Urban Development directive to conduct an analysis of the implementation of the Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988 within Multnomah County and the cities of Portland and Gresham. From findings of any inequities and/or impediments to Fair Housing, develop and submit a Fair Housing Plan to HUD Region X office.

City of Portland Parks and Recreation, East Portland Community Center

Citizen Task Force April 1995 to present. Following voter approval of \$5.4M General Obligation Bond, appointed by Commissioner Charlie Hales (City of Portland (City)) to actively participate on 14 member East Portland Community Center Citizens' Task Force (CTF) and work in cooperation with the City Parks and Recreation (PP&R) staff to develop criteria for, advise and make recommendations to Commissioner Charlie

Hales regarding project site selection, design, programming and principal project contractors throughout the processes of the East Portland Community Center's project development, ground breaking and opening.

One of two CTF members appointed to Selection Committee (SC) by CTF chair to review, evaluate and rate the 12 Request for Proposal architectural design firm team respondents. PP & R Project staff reviewed SC evaluations and scheduled a day of 1-hour proposal presentation and interview sessions for the top 4 firms with Project staff and SC in which principal Project architectural design firm team selected for recommendation to PP & R.

City/County Advisory Committee on the Disabled Chair, September 1995 to present & 1989-1992; member since 1987. CCACD is a 25 member committee which monitors and advises the City of Portland and Multnomah County on disability and accessibility related program and policy issues, such as compliance with Section 504 of the Civil Rights Act, and the Americans with Disabilities Act, etc. For example, CCACD Parks sub-committee is currently meeting bi-monthly with PP&R staff, architects and contractors involved in ADA transition plans and General Obligation (GOBI) funded project modifications to PP&R facilities. Plans (conceptual and architectural) must receive written CCACD approval prior to implementation.

Fair Housing Council of Oregon

Tester 1994 to present. Trained as tester in investigation of housing discrimination complaints for FHCO enforcement authority.

Consultant May-October 1995. Due to a mandate and federal grant through US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Region X office, contracted with FHCO as a consultant and investigator to review the implementation of - and adherence to - the Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988 regarding "covered multi-family dwellings of 4 units or more," around the state of Oregon. The focus of the site reviews is in regard to the compliance and non-compliance of structural accessibility and building code standards.

Quadriplegics United Against Dependency, Inc./Myer's Court Member, Board of Directors - QUAD Inc/Myer's Court, November 1993 to present. Myer's Court is an assisted living/congregate care facility for persons with mobility-related impairments (particularly higher level spinal cord injuries) which has been in

operation nearly 20 years and is currently very actively seeking to expand through development of additional assisted living sites.

Oregon Department of Human Resources, Housing and Community Services

Advisory Committee on Energy Member, 1989 to present. ACE addresses the weatherization and energy needs and programs for low-income, senior, and disabled persons throughout Oregon.

Oregon [Trail Blazer] Arena Project (Rose Garden) Member, Disabled Community Access Committee, meeting regularly with Project managers and architects to review plans, ensuring quality access, and compliance with Americans with Disabilities Act.

Metropolitan Human Rights Commission Commissioner, September 1989 to August 1994. The advocacy based commission serves in an advisory capacity with issues involving multi-cultural relations in Portland metropolitan area. MHRC's mission is to promote mutual understanding and respect among diverse groups.

United States Civil Rights Commission, State Advisory Committee

Appointed July 1992 for two-year term; re-appointed in 1994; re-appointed in 1996.

[County-Wide] Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy (CHAS) - Special Needs Advisory Committee (SNAC) Working Group

Member, January 1992 - June 1993 of Multnomah county/cities of Portland and Gresham SNAC working group focused on first of the five year CHAS plan and recommendations as to the initial activities of the Special Needs Advisory Committee. CHAS is now "The Consolidated Plan".

State Park & Recreation Association - Americans with Disabilities Act Task Force

Member, September 1993 - June 1994. The 1991 Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines (ADAAG's) did not include accessibility guidelines for outdoor parks and recreational facilities and play ground equipment. Thus, a task force comprised of persons with disabilities having prior training and experience in accessibility standards and guidelines served in an advisory capacity to the federal Architectural and Transportation Barriers Compliance Board's (ATBCB) Recreation Access Advisory Committee to review and submit comments/recommendations on draft materials which would then be used at the federal level in developing minimum guidelines for the design and construction of new and/or altered recreational facilities, equipment and developed outdoor recreational areas. Final standards and guidelines are expected in 1995.

Portland Future Focus Strategic Plan, Bridging to the New Century Member, Steering Committee, January 1992 - February 1993. Committee, under then-Mayor Clark, was charged with overseeing Plan implementation and monitoring action plans while coordinating changes to the Plan as the community evolves. Under Mayor Katz, Committee was dissolved and reformed as Portland Benchmarks.

The Committee, housed in Affirmative Action Office, assists in development of instrument(s) to evaluate access, identify programmatic and structural barriers for persons with disabilities, and assist in development of mandated transition plan for compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

<u>Spinal Cord Association</u> Member, Board of Directors, 1985-1988, volunteer staff 1984 - 1988. Spinal Cord Association provided programs and services promoting independence for persons with spinal cord injuries. Now closed, consumers turn to Independent Living Resources, Inc.

Multnomah County Adult and Family Services, Client Employment Program

Advisory Task Force Member, 1987. Reviewed the CEP program and made recommendations to [then] Oregon Department of Human Resources, Adult and Family Services Division, advocating for direct client involvement in individual care plan development and service delivery.

Tri-Met Light Rail Wayside Lift Project Advisory committee member, 1983. Committee reviewed plans and participated in design and location of lifts and mobility-aid securement systems. Since that time, advocated for low-floor Light Rail Transit (LRT) cars and the subsequent removal of way-side lifts to accommodate, facilitate and promote "universal design" in the Portland metropolitan area Tri-Met mass transit system.

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION 98-2629, FOR THE PURPOSE OF APPOINTING MEMBERS OF THE AFFORDABLE HOUSING TECHNICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Date: March 24, 1998

Introduced by: Councilor Washington

Proposed Action:

Adoption of this resolution, to appoint the members of the Affordable Housing Technical Advisory Committee.

Analysis:

In December 1997, the Metro Council adopted a resolution creating the Affordable Housing Technical Advisory Committee to review data and assist in drafting an affordable housing functional plan. Membership was specified to reflect representation from various interest groups, local governments and citizens. No appointment process was provided for in the resolution. For those membership positions that were identified by specific organization, i.e. the Department of Housing and Urban Development, those organizations were asked to make appointment recommendations.

For the unspecified positions, recommendations were made as follows: the city representatives were recommended by MPAC; the county representatives and affordable housing providers were recommended by county chairs; the three citizen positions were recommended by MCCI; and the private financial institution, major employer, seniors representative and disabled/special needs representative were recommended by the Executive Officer. ¹ Because the appointment requests resulted in two county housing authority recommendations, the regional housing authority position designated by the resolution will not be filled at this time.

Resumes are attached for the recommended appointees who are not representatives of local government.

Budget Impact:

The Council recently approved a budget amendment to provide administrative staffing to this committee for the remainder of the fiscal year. Lisa Lister, formally of Human Resources, has been hired for this position. Gerry Uba of the Growth Management Department has been assigned to the committee to work on the substantive issues. The proposed FY 98-99 budget continues the funding for these positions and for materials and services.

¹ The Council has not yet received recommendations for the appointment of the major employer and private financial institution representatives. A resolution will follow with those names when they are available.
