A message from Rod Park

I am pleased to announce that the Metro Council awarded more than \$560,000 to 27 local organizations for 32 projects to protect fish and wildlife throughout the region. I am proud to have sponsored the resolution that created this program, which provides \$1 million in grant funds over two years for nature-friendly projects and is part of the Nature in Neighborhoods initiative, the Metro Council's commitment to protecting habitat for fish, wildlife and people.

This program is creating new partnerships, resulting in the protection of sensitive areas, some of which have been or could be affected by illegal dumping. The program is providing education to communities about the relationship between protecting and ensuring the health of our natural areas through the proper disposal of solid waste by using franchised haulers.

The grants were awarded to a range of organizations, ranging from neighborhood associations and community groups to established conservation organizations and businesses. Some of the organizations that received funding in District 1 include the Wilkes Community Group to start building a Wilkes Creek Bridge and Path, SOLV to do some restoration work at Osborne and Beaver Creeks, and Johnson Creek Watershed Council to do some restoration work in the Johnson Creek Watershed.

Public comment sought on eastside transit alternatives

Should the streetcar line be extended to the eastside, or would bus service be a better alternative? To develop a recommendation for one of these options, the Eastside Project Advisory Committee reviewed technical analysis and shared evaluation results at an open house and public hearing in May. The committee is expected to recommend an alternative in July.

Once a recommendation is made, local jurisdictions will be asked to adopt a resolution in support. The Metro Council will consider public comment and resolutions from local governments before adopting a preferred alternative. The City of Portland, TriMet, Portland Streetcar Inc., Multnomah County and Metro are the project's partners.

Cool off this summer at Blue Lake's new water spray ground

Blue Lake Regional Park's new water spray ground opens in July, offering an alternative to non-swimmers, those under age five who are not allowed in the lake, and persons with limited mobility.

The action-packed 30' x 60' feature sprays, gushes, dumps and pours water from a variety of whimsical devices including oversized nozzles, buckets and even a large frog you can leap through. A re-circulating water system transports water from the park's wells and local aquifer. Water is recycled through an

on-site treatment facility to ensure safety. The park is located between Marine Drive and Sandy Boulevard, off Northeast 223rd Avenue. TriMet shuttle weekend service is available this summer from the Gresham Town Center Saturday and Sundays, Memorial Day through Labor Day.

The water spray ground is free to all park visitors with \$4 admission per car, \$7 per bus. In order to best protect people and wildlife, pets are not permitted here or at any of Metro's parks and natural areas.

Metro offers regional perspective on local health care debate

The Metro Council will examine how Metro might help address the high cost of health care in the region. Earlier this spring, Council passed a resolution that directs the agency to study the issue and report back in the fall.

Metro has been asked by regional constituents to develop a public process for siting health care facilities, claiming that unregulated hospital expansions are causing costs in the Portland area to rise, and are reducing certain needed services. Councilors think that given Metro's service area, a regional approach to

health care might be logical, using tools such as land use-planning and policy experts. Metro has agreed to involve health care consumers, physicians, businesses, hospital representatives and stakeholders in a broad community discussion regarding regional solutions to enhance access to health care. They will look at the scope of the issue to determine if Metro should pursue it further.
