GENERAL PRINCIPLES GUIDING METRO REPRESENTATIVES

Revised: November 28, 2000

Transportation: Transportation and transit planning are essential components of Metro's growth management responsibilities. Transportation plans must be developed to support land use policies, support the regional economy, and ultimately, move people and goods throughout the region in an efficient manner. Sufficient funding is an important goal in the region for appropriate and adequate infrastructure.

- Preserve local/regional authority providing for regional transportation solutions.
- Seek adequate funding for transportation and transit planning projects such as Washington County commuter rail.
- Sustain policy and funding for transportation components of regional growth management, including continued support of the ODOT's Transportation/ Growth Management grant program.
- Support the regional policy by seeking to improve freight mobility, decrease congestion, and improving transportation access necessary for commercial and industrial development in regional and town centers.

Land Use/Growth Management: Metro's charter directs that regional planning and growth management are Metro's primary functions—in order to maintain and enhance the livability and economic vitality of the area. Rapid growth is occurring in the area. Metro's job is to ensure that this growth occurs in a manner that minimizes the impact on residents and promotes the values established in the Regional Urban Growth Goals and Objectives (RUGGO) and the 2040 Growth Concept.

- Support continuation of Metro's voter-approved streamlined local/regional land use planning process for the Portland-metropolitan area.
- Support adequate funding of DLCD and other agencies working with the local/regional planning process.
- Support partners in efforts toward affordable housing.
- Support various mechanisms for formation of complete communities (within the 3-mile radius of the UGB).
- Seek proposal for state-funded grant program for high growth areas throughout the state.
- Assist the implementation of state measures, statutes and rules, in a manner that supports the regional framework plan and the 2040 Growth Concept.
- Consider proposal to develop a state-funded grant program (dollars based on tax "windfall" from UGB amendments) to fund land use and infrastructure planning in high growth areas, and economic growth in economically distressed counties.

Environmental: Environmental concerns in the region cross city, county and district boundaries. Protection of natural resources, including air and water

quality, fish and wildlife habitat, and parks and open spaces is a key livability component in our urban environment. Working in concert with local, state and federal partners is a principal strategy in this arena.

- Help coordinate and assist efforts of local watershed councils; serve as informational resource.
- Monitor and be supportive of efforts by others as needed on NMFS (4d) implementation and/or WRI legislative package.
- Seek urban component language in the Oregon Plan.
- Minimize excessive use of paper and utilize technological advances

Solid Waste and Recycling: Metro manages solid waste disposal and oversees waste reduction and recycling planning. Metro will continue to work with its regional partners to provide cost-effective disposal and promote waste reduction.

- Support efforts to preserve streamlined, low-cost management of solid waste in the region
- Support recycling policies that emphasize collection, processing and end-use markets
- Seek statewide legislation supporting the development of markets for scrap tires

Regional Parks and Greenspaces: Metro operates 21 regional parks and natural areas and has surpassed the acquisition of over 6,000 acres of open spaces and trails through voter-approved funding of the 1995 Open Spaces bond measure. Metro has considerable responsibility to acquire, plan, operate and manage a system of regional parks and greenspaces. Metro will strive to develop parks, trails and open spaces in a manner that protects their resource value, consistent with a regional park system.

Work to support regional parks and open spaces management programs

Regional Facilities: In addition to its regional parks programs, Metro owns and operates facilities that serve regional objectives and attract regional attendees. These facilities include the Oregon Zoo, Metro Exposition and Recreation Commission (MERC) facilities—Oregon Convention Center, Expo, Portland Center for the Performing Arts—and the solid waste transfer stations.

- Preserve ability to efficiently manage facilities that provide regional and national educational, entertainment and meeting services, as well as direct and indirect employment for the citizens of the region
- Support OE&CDD financial assistance for the Oregon Zoo

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION NO. 00-2997, FOR THE PURPOSE OF ADOPTING THE METRO 2000-01 OREGON STATE AND FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE PRINCIPLES AND PRIORITIES

Date: January 2, 2001 Presented by: Councilor McLain

Committee Action: At its November 28, 2000 meeting, the State and Federal Legislative Affairs Committee voted 2-0 to recommend Council adoption of Resolution 00-2997. Voting in favor: Councilors Park and McLain.

Background: Creates policy guidance for Metro officials and lobbyists during the 2001 legislative session.

Budget Impact: None

Committee Issues/Discussion: The committee reviewed the final iteration of the legislative package, which the committee had shaped over several months. Minor language changes were made relative to transportation policy and funding, after which the committee voted to send the package to Council.

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION NO. 00-2997, FOR THE PURPOSE OF ADOPTING THE METRO 2000-2001 OREGON STATE AND FEDERAL LEGSLATIVE PRINCIPLES AND PRIORITIES.

Date: October 26, 2000 Prepared by: Michael Morrissey

Proposed Action: Resolution 00-2997 establishes a set of principles and priorities that will be used to guide Metro in its lobby and educational activities through the Oregon 2001 state legislative season. The legislative effort may also identify federal activities that are of concern to the Metro regional effort.

Specific Metro action to support, oppose or track legislation should be consistent with these principles and priorities.

Factual Background and Analysis: Prior to each state biennial legislative session, Metro prepares itself to address issues that may arise in the legislature, perceived to be related to Metro's scope of policy and operation. Metro has contracted with PacWest Communications to provide lobby assistance for federal and state 2000-2001 legislative sessions. Metro's State and Federal Legislative Agenda Committee has spent several meetings developing its legislative stance by polling Council members regarding their individual priorities, tracking key federal legislation and renewing educational efforts with the region's legislative delegation.

The staff legislative team, consisting of staff from the Council, Executive and Office of General Counsel offices, has assisted with the development of these priorities and principles, and oversees the activities of the lobbyist on a day-to-day basis.

Budget Impact: There is no direct budget impact from the passage of Resolution 00-2997. The contract with PacWest, approved through separate legislation, allows expenditures for up to \$100,000 for lobbying services.

Applicable Law: Council identification and adoption of a legislative agenda is conducted within the guidelines of state law..
