Committee Recommendation: At its February 15, 2001, meeting, the Regional Facilities and Operations Committee voted 3-0 to recommend Council adoption of Resolution No. 01-3031. Voting in favor: Councilors Hosticka, Burkholder, and Park. Voting against: None. Absent: None.

Background: Karen Withrow, Staff to the Committee for Citizen Involvement, presented the staff report. explained that, according to Metro Code Chapter 2.12 and Ordinance 00-860, the Metro Committee for Citizen Involvement (MCCI) is responsible for nominating appointees to vacancies, with final approval to be given by Council.

Nominee Meyer Seigel represents Council District 4. Nominees Helen Richardson and Joe Annett represent Council District 5. Nominee Andrew Kelly represents Council District 7.

Committee Issues/Discussion: Councilor Burkholder asked how many other vacancies exist on the MCCI. Ms. Withrow replied that there are at least six vacancies, most in District 3, but also in District 4, from the Washington County MCCI, and in the area of Clackamas county outside Metro boundaries. She stated that there are three applications pending, and that she will inform all the councilors of the exact vacancies by email.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF RESOLUTION

This resolution is intended to appoint four new members to the Metro Committee for Citizen Involvement (MCCI).

EXISTING LAW
