The natural areas bond measure: Targeting your investment for maximum benefit

On Nov. 7, 2006, voters in the region approved a \$227.4 million bond measure directing Metro to purchase property and conservation easements from willing sellers to preserve natural areas and protect rivers and streams at the regional, local and neighborhood level. The regional part of the three-part measure provides Metro with \$168.4 million in bond funds to acquire, on your behalf, approximately 3,500 and 4,500 acres of land in identified regional target areas. The goal is to protect lands around local rivers and streams, preserve significant fish and

wildlife habitat, enhance trails and wildlife corridors, and connect urban areas with nature.

The bond measure approved by voters identified specific regional target areas, which were selected based upon their natural resource value. The regional target areas are broadly defined, and don't list specific areas or resources to be protected. Metro has initiated a public refinement process to narrow the scope of attention to specific areas and natural resources that merit protection within the target areas. Metro will gather information and public input, and develop specific objectives and detailed acquisition options for each regional target area.

Metro will then meet with the owners of key properties within those specific areas to find out if they are willing to sell to Metro either a conservation easement or the property outright. Our goal is to make your tax dollars go as far as possible to protect as many of the identified areas and resources as possible.

Metro's responsible financial management has earned our regional government a superior bond rating from the major rating services. This allows us to sell bonds for more money, with a lower interest rate. As a result, your tax rate for this program will be lower than anticipated.

Your input for this refinement process is important to us. During the month of June, the Metro Council will host public meetings for each of the regional target areas in order to seek your ideas. A subset of the list is provided below with the full list available on the Metro website. The Metro website will also host a virtual open house. I hope that you will join me, as well as my fellow councilors, at the public meetings in June.

Metro purchases 93 acres in Washington County to protect water quality

In April, the Metro Council purchased a 93-acre parcel near the confluence of Dairy and McKay creeks in Washington County as part of the natural areas, parks and streams bond measure that voters approved in November. Located west of Hillsboro and east of Cornelius, this purchase provides opportunities to protect water quality, restore a wetland system and provide a natural buffer between the two communities.

The property features almost one mile of creek frontage, a significant floodplain and

waterfowl habitat. The acquisition resulted after the owner approached Metro and offered the property for sale. Although the land will continue to be farmed, in the future, the riparian areas could be restored and the floodplain could be used for flood storage, contributing to overall improvement in water quality.
