BACKGROUND

The seven-member Solid Waste Rate Review Committee (RRC), with representation from haulers, a person involved in a local recycling or waste reduction program, a citizen ratepayer, and finance and ratesetting experts, reviews and makes recommendations to the Metro Council regarding proposed solid waste disposal rates and other technical issues related to solid waste disposal rate setting.

Sarah Adams, a lawyer currently in practice at Hoffman Angeli LLP, has recent experience with utility rate setting, and has been appointed by the Council President to serve on the RRC as a full voting member performing the functions of the "person with experience establishing rates." [Metro Code, Chapter 2.19.170 (b) (4)]. Attachment 1 contains the curriculum vitae for Ms. Adams.

IN CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION 08-3908, FOR THE PURPOSE OF REQUESTING A REFERENDUM ON FEDERAL OLD AGE SURVIVORS, AND DISABILITY INSURANCE COVERAGE

PROPOSED ACTION

Request that the State of Oregon conduct a referendum and take other necessary steps to remove the exclusion of Metro Elected Officials from Old Age Survivors and Disability Insurance ("OASDI"), the mandatory federal social security program.

EXISTING LAW

Under Section 218 of the Social Security Act, the State of Oregon is party to voluntary "Section 218 Agreements," which provide Social Security and Medicare Hospital Insurance ("HI") or Medicare HI only for designated State and local government employees who have opted into the system.

BACKGROUND AND ANALYSIS

In 1976, Metro opted into Social Security coverage for Metro employees through an amendment to Oregon's Section 218 Agreement, but it specifically excluded elected officials from coverage. Metro elected officials are subject to Medicare taxes, but are subject to Social Security taxes only if they do not enroll in the Oregon Public Employee Retirement System. Metro desires to remove the exclusion of all services in any class or classes of elective positions to obtain Federal Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance ("OASDI"). This resolution will initiate the State resolution process, which will lead to the inclusion of Metro elected officials into all aspects of Social Security coverage.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no need for a budget amendment because there are sufficient appropriations, both this year and planned for 2008-09. However, this is a new cost to Metro, approximately \$26,000 per year, and would represent a fiscal impact since it is a cost that Metro is not currently paying. In addition the process for the State to extend Social Security Coverage to Metro elected officials may take as long as 90 days. This would significantly lessen the fiscal impact for this budget year.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that that Metro Council approve the resolution and thereby request that the State initiate the process for extending Social Security Coverage to Metro elected officials.

IN CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION NO. 08-3891, FOR THE PURPOSE OF APPROVING PORTLAND REGIONAL FEDERAL TRANSPORTATION PRIORITIES FOR FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR 2009 APPROPRIATIONS

BACKGROUND

The region annually produces a position paper that outlines the views of the Metro Council and the Joint Policy Advisory Committee on Transportation (JPACT), a regional body that consists of local elected and appointed officials, on issues concerning transportation funding that are likely to be considered by Congress during the coming year. This year priorities are limited to the FY '09 appropriations bill. Next year, the focus will be on the new six-year authorization bill.

The Portland region is pursuing an aggressive agenda to implement a high-capacity transit system. This effort involves implementing two projects concurrently within the next three to five years: opening the Wilsonville to Beaverton commuter rail and completing construction of the I-205/Downtown LRT. Project development is also underway for the next LRT corridor to Milwaukie and streetcar to the Eastside and Lake Oswego. Additionally, there are several complementary projects for which the region is requesting funding: bus and bus facility purchases regionwide, Wilsonville Park and Ride, highway projects and others. All of these projects have a strong economic development emphasis.

Oregon and Washington continue developing a cooperative strategy to address the transportation needs in the Columbia River Crossing Corridor through a multi-modal project. Furthermore, this resolution calls out the Columbia River Crossing separately for funding through the Federal Highway Administration. This is in recognition of the regional and national significance of the I-5 corridor and this segment, particularly relating to the impact on movement of freight. The intent is to have a preferred alternative for the Columbia River Crossing defined through the NEPA process in 2008 to allow the region to seek designation in the next authorization bill as a "Project of National and Regional Significance." Designation of the Columbia River Crossing separately is not intended as an exclusive priority to the exclusion of funding for other projects. In addition, it is in recognition that other projects will be so designated in the future, much like the multi-year, multi-project approach to implementing a regional light rail system. Finally, funding for the Columbia River Crossing is with the understanding that the analysis that is underway will likely lead to identification of improvements beyond the project area that may need to be addressed in the future.

Beyond these regional transit and highway priorities, the resolution endorses a list of priority projects for earmarking through the federal highway appropriation from throughout the region. To ensure this resolution is limited to the highest priorities, the list is limited to no more than two projects per agency or subregional group of local governments. Included in the list are two priorities from Metro: A TOD project in partnership with Pacific University in Hillsboro by the Metro Planning Department and trail projects by the Metro Parks and Greenspaces Department. In addition this resolution endorses the project requests outside Metro's boundary from the transit districts surrounding Metro in Oregon and developed by the Southwest Washington Regional Transportation Council.

This FY '09 appropriations request for earmarked funding from SAFTEA-LU represents the consolidated regional request. Additional independent requests should <u>not</u> be submitted by any member jurisdiction or agency represented by JPACT (with exception of ODOT outside the metro region). Each member jurisdiction has limited heir requests to two priorities each.

ANALYSIS/INFORMATION

- 1. Known Opposition None known.
- 2. Legal Antecedents Projects within the region earmarked for federal funding must be consistent with the Regional Transportation Plan, adopted by Metro Resolution No. 07-3831B, For the Purpose of Approving the Federal Component of the 2035 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) Update, Pending the Air Quality Conformity Analysis, on December 13, 2007.
- **3. Anticipated Effects** Resolution would provide the US Congress and the Oregon Congressional delegation specifically with the region's priorities for transportation funding for use in the federal transportation appropriation process.
- **4. Budget Impacts** Metro is involved in planning related to several of the projects included in the priorities paper and must approve many of the requested funding allocations. Failure to obtain funding for one or more of the projects could affect the FY 09-10 Planning Department budget. However, most of the funding requests deal with implementation projects sponsored by jurisdictions other than Metro.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approve Resolution 08-3891 for submission to the Oregon Congressional delegation for consideration in the Federal Fiscal Year '09 Appropriations Bill.

WHEREAS, the Portland Metro region is a transportation-dependent region; and

WHEREAS, Metro is updating its Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) to frame the region's transportation agenda through year 2035; and

WHEREAS, the updated RTP has identified a shortfall to build the new transit and roadway infrastructure that will be needed for an efficient transportation system that will allow for the economic vitality and environmental health of the region; and

WHEREAS, it is critical that the region maintain its existing infrastructure as well as build new transportation infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, the Sellwood Bridge across the Willamette River has been identified by engineers as a critically deficient bridge on the federal bridge rating scale; and

WHEREAS, other bridges around the region are in need of ongoing maintenance; and

WHEREAS, Multnomah County is currently undertaking an Environmental Impact Statement to rehabilitate or replace the Sellwood Bridge; and

WHEREAS, the cost to repair or replace the bridge is estimated to exceed \$300 million; and

WHEREAS, Multnomah County is proposing to secure federal, state and local revenues to rehabilitate or construct a new Sellwood Bridge; and

WHEREAS, Multnomah County is proposing to place a \$24 countywide vehicle registration fee on the May or November, 2008, ballot; and

WHEREAS, Multnomah County proposes to dedicate 100 percent of the revenue from such fee to reconstruction and/or maintenance of the Willamette River bridges; and

WHEREAS, Multnomah County is committed to establishing an oversight committee to ensure that collected revenues are used only for the purposes agreed to under an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA); and

WHEREAS, Multnomah County is committed to working with local partners to develop a broader, long-term strategy for funding a multimodal transportation system; and

WHEREAS, Multnomah County is required by OR 801.041(7) to enter into an IGA with Metro and other local governments that grants Multnomah County the right to establish and collect such fee; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Metro Council:

- 1. Recognizes that it is critically important to replace or maintain the Willamette River bridges.
- 2. Authorizes the Chief Operating Office to enter into an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) pursuit to ORS 801.041 with Multnomah County permitting the county to establish and collect a countywide vehicle registration fee subject to voter approval to maintain or reconstruct the Willamette River bridges. The execution of the agreement is authorized provided that the fee be subject to voter approval in either May or November 2008, be limited to a 20 year period, be in an amount not to exceed \$24 a year, and be dedicated to the maintenance or reconstruction of the Willamette River bridges.
- 3. Commits to on-going collaboration with all jurisdictions across the region on transportation funding issues in 2008 and beyond.

IN CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION NO. 08-3917, FOR THE PURPOSE OF ENDORSING MULTNOMAH COUNTY'S WILLAMETTE RIVER BALLOT MEASURE

Date: January 29, 2008 Prepared by: Tim Collins

BACKGROUND

Multnomah County operates and maintains six Willamette River Bridges: Sellwood, Hawthorne, Morrison, Burnside, Broadway and Sauvie Island. Multnomah County's Capital Improvement Plan identifies:

- A 20-year need of approximately \$621 million, which includes rehabilitating or replacing the Sellwood Bridge, as well as maintaining the remaining bridges.
- Revenues for the next 20 years are approximately \$131 million, leaving a shortfall of approximately \$490 million.

The rehabilitation or replacement of the Sellwood Bridge is the county's highest priority for transportation funding. The Sellwood Bridge is the busiest two-lane bridge in Oregon, with over 30,000 vehicles crossing daily. The Sellwood Bridge is weight limited (10 tons) and buses, emergency vehicles and freight traffic are restricted from using it. The bridge has a federal adequacy rating of only 2 on a scale of 1 to 100.

Apart from the Sauvie Island Bridge that is currently being replaced, the age of the remaining Willamette River Bridges ranges from 50 years to 98 years, each requiring ongoing capital maintenance. In order to address the lack of funding, Multnomah County's Board of Commissioners is proposing a countywide vehicle registration fee (VRF) of \$24 per year per vehicle, which would be on the countywide ballot in May or November 2008. The VRF would be dedicated solely to the maintenance and/or reconstruction/replacement of Willamette River Bridges.

The county is working aggressively with federal, regional and state partners to secure funding for the Sellwood Bridge:

- Local funds are needed to obtain federal, regional and state dollars. The VRF will generate the county's local contribution of \$100 million toward an estimated total cost of more than \$300 million.
- The county desires to have its local match secured in order to be in a better position to secure federal dollars in the transportation reauthorization bill, which will be passed by Congress in 2009. Without a local match, the county may miss this opportunity and will need to wait until 2015 before the next federal reauthorization funding cycle.

The VRF would generate approximately \$13 million per year of revenue, and would sunset after 20 years. These funds will allow the county to generate \$100 million for the replacement of the Sellwood Bridge and address a portion of the maintenance issues on the county's remaining five Willamette River Bridges. If the countywide ballot measure passes, an independent oversight function would be established to ensure that collected revenues are used only for the purposes established by the measure.

The attached resolution authorizes the Council President to enter into an intergovernmental agreement (IGA) with Multnomah County that would grant the county the right to establish and collect a VRF.

- 1. **Known Opposition** None known at this time.
- 2. Legal Antecedents Consistent with Resolution No. 00-2969B, "For the Purpose of Adopting the 2000 Regional Transportation Plan as the Federal Metropolitan Transportation Plan", adopted by the Metro Council, on August 10, 2000 and Resolution No. 03-3380A, "For the Purpose of Designation of the 2004 Regional Transportation Plan as the Federal Metropolitan Transportation Plan to Meet Federal Planning Requirements", adopted by the Metro Council on December 11, 2003.
- 3. Anticipated Effects Adoption of this resolution will authorize the Council President to enter into an IGA with Multnomah County. If the ballot measure is successful, Multnomah County would have a portion of the anticipated \$300+ million required to rehabilitate or reconstruct the Sellwood Bridge and address a portion of the maintenance needs for the remaining Willamette River bridges. The county would still need to secure other funding sources in order to reconstruct the Sellwood Bridge.
