A message from Rod Park

Lately, I've been reminded of "Abandon Ship," a classic movie where the captain of a luxury liner is suddenly faced with life or death decisions when his ship sinks, leaving himself and a few survivors floating at sea in an overcrowded lifeboat without enough food and water to support them all. The captain, a decent fellow, initially intends to save everyone. But it soon becomes clear that this is impossible. We are facing a similar situation with our transportation system. Granted, our transportation decisions are not quite that dire, but the challenge is about allocation of resources. It has

become clear that our needs outweigh current funding streams and hard decisions will have to be made. Do we prioritize taking care of what we have or do we continue to build new facilities? Or do we make the hard decision to increase our funding of both approaches?

Needless to say, this will not be an easy decision.

As part of this process, I think it's important to keep an open line of communication with you to help guide Metro's policy making on transportation. After all, you are out there trying to get from Point A to B, living in neighborhoods between those points and beyond. In addition, we are trying to keep the economy humming along by getting goods and services where they need to be. It is our quality of life and pocketbook that is affected largely by the transportation options – or obstacles – that we face every day.

Believe me, there is a gap and it can only be filled by either cutting back or increasing fees. Other efficiencies such as land use design and building smarter can take us only so far.

It's more important than ever that we look critically at all investments – whether they be for basic maintenance, or building much needed new projects – and evaluate them on the basis of the outcomes that they produce – safety, congestion relief, community development, freight movement, or environmental benefit.

Metro to unveil winners of Earth Day billboard designs at April 5 celebration

On Saturday, April 5 Metro will announce the winners of this year's Earth Day billboard design competition. Students from Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington counties were invited to design a billboard encouraging people to conserve and protect resources through waste prevention, recycling, composting or using fewer toxic products. Approximately 200 entries were selected as finalists. That artwork is displayed in the lobby at Metro's Regional Center.

Grade-level category (K-2, 3-5, 6-8 and 9-12) winners have been selected to have their artwork and name, and the name of their teacher and school displayed on billboards throughout the metro region for Earth Day. Winning and honorable mention artists will be announced for the first time and presented with their framed original artwork at an art show and unveiling ceremony on April 5.

The guide is designed to help new coordinators and veteran volunteers improve recycling and waste prevention at cleanup events; improve effectiveness of community volunteers through training and recognition; inspire community; and ensure best use of Metro disposal vouchers and local government grants.
