#### 4. **RESOLUTIONS**

4.1 **Resolution No. 08-3938**, For the Purpose of Establishing Metro Council Recommendations Concerning Key Preliminary Decisions Leading to a Future Locally Preferred Alternative Decision For the Columbia River Crossing Project.

Motion:	Councilor Burkholder moved to adopt Resolution No. 08-3938.
Seconded:	Councilor Park seconded the motion

Councilor Burkholder said the Metro Council supported the Columbia River Crossing (CRC) alternative (LPA) that called for building a new/replacement Columbia River I-5 bridge, which included light rail and tolls to pay for it and serve as a demand management system.

The Metro Council supported this project because it encompassed a balanced multi-modal approach of highway, light rail, demand management, bicycle and pedestrian access, as well as

safety and environmental improvements, compact land use development patterns which minimized long commutes and reduced our citizens' automobile dependence.

Although the Metro Council was instructing its delegate to the CRC project (Councilor Rex Burkholder) to endorse the project, the Council does still have some conditions that we feel should be met, but we believe it is appropriate to move this process into the next design and financial analysis phase so that those issues can be satisfactorily resolved.

Specifically, those conditions are:

- 1. Local oversight by an Oversight Panel (appointed by the two state's governors) to make all major planning, design, engineering, finance and construction decisions in partnership with the two state governments;
- 2. This Panel would consider the number of total lanes, size and design of the bicycle and pedestrian facilities, and design of the light rail.
- 3. A detailed financing plan (construction and operation), including tolls and how tolls will be linked to a demand management plan;
- 4. An independent analysis should be completed to forecast the greenhouse gas emissions and induced automobile demand for this project;
- 5. Preservation of freight mobility and access relative to tolls should be made clear;
- 6. A full evaluation of how the project's interchanges will affect urban design in the impact area.

The Columbia River Crossing is not an isolated project – rather, it is part of a larger regional effort to ensure that we have a balanced and efficient transportation system – something that Metro is leading through the Regional Transportation Plan.

This project, like the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), achieves multiple goals (mobility, environmental sustainability and economic and community health) through multiple transportation modes and good land use planning;

The Metro Council also believes that it's very important to complete this project because it represents a tremendous collaborative effort between Oregon and Washington, the cities of Portland and Vancouver and many other local governments and organizations. If we do this well, it will serve as a model to other state governments (and the federal government) of how to plan, design and build sustainable transportation networks/infrastructure, which is critical to the country's future.

The Metro Council recognizes that significant project elements will not have been finalized at the time of LPA adoption. The Council believes it is appropriate to move this process into the next design and financial analysis phase so that those issues can be satisfactorily resolved prior to a final "build / no build" decision point being presented to the involved governing bodies including the Metro Council.

The Metro Council will consider approval of the LPA after consideration of public comment, the CRC Task Force, local jurisdiction and Joint Policy Advisory Committee on Transportation (JPACT) recommendations, and evaluation of how the conditions it has expressed have been addressed by any final proposal.

Motion to substitute:	Council President Bragdon moved to substitute Resolution No. 08-3938B.

Council President Bragdon explained his motion. He described the contents of his resolution. Today would be a vote to express Metro Council's recommendation to the Columbia River Crossing Task Force.

Vote:

Councilors Park, Burkholder, Collette, Harrington, Liberty, Hosticka and Council President Bragdon voted in support of the motion. The vote was 7 aye, the motion passed.

Council President Bragdon opened a public hearing on Resolution No. 08-3938 and 08-3948.

Matt Garrett Oregon Department of Transportation, 355 Capitol NE Salem, OR 97201 said this was a big day and they were at a milestone. As he reflected on the project he saw a project about partnerships and opportunity. Without partnership they would not secure opportunity. There were many partners. As he looked at this project it was a high capacity transit project giving people opportunity to move from Oregon to Washington through a variety of modes. He spoke of the history of the bridge. It was a highway project that would address safety issues, economic and community development project. This was also an environment project. They would also address the congestion issues. This was a significant decision and milestone. They had a long journey ahead of them. The State of Oregon and Washington and the nation needed this project. (Copies of his talking points are included in the record)

Councilor Liberty asked about finance. He noted one of the exhibits from the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS). He provided detail of some of the financial plan. He asked about tolls and state administered revenues. Did the state administrative revenues mean that there were no local or regional contributions? Mr. Garrett said he was not sure what the answer was but they would seek as much money from the federal government as possible. Those were future decisions. They were now looking at narrowing the recommendation. Councilor Liberty asked about the tolling. In the narrative they talked about tolling I-205 as well as I-5. Was it more concerns about demand management or paying for the project. Mr. Garrett responded to his question.

Councilor Harrington noted that there were several unknowns to the financing. What was the time frame? Mr. Garrett said they would play out the process from the DEIS to the final document to the federal document. It would be about a year.

Councilor Hosticka wanted to understand the context of the testimony. He wondered which proposal Mr. Garrett was speaking about. Mr. Garrett said they were in the public comment process. They wanted to run the full calendar. This testimony was still informing the discussion. There were five options before Council, one of which was a no build option. The other options provided a variety of proposals. He saw these as variation of the same theme. Councilor Hosticka summarized, at this point there was not an official perspective from the State of Oregon.

Janice Marquis, Metropolitan Exposition Recreation Commission (MERC) Chair said they managed EXPO to provide facilities for high quality shows and expositions. MERC understood that the CRC was a significant project for Metro and the region. The Commission had concerns about some of the proposed designs, which would impact the EXPO Center. While she recognized the decision today was not the final decision, they had concerns about Marine Drive. She talked about EXPO. Several local and regional buses were reliant of EXPO for their activities. She provided her testimony for the record.

Councilor Burkholder asked if the Task Force was aware of MERC's concerns? Chair Marquis said they had provided their concerns to the CRC Task Force. Councilor Liberty asked about the CRC project and the headquarter project. Mr. Woolson said if they were successful with the headquarters hotel project, they would be moving some of the Oregon Convention Center's shows to EXPO.

Lenny Anderson, Swan Island TMA, 4567 N Channel Ave Portland OR 97217 provided his testimony for the record and summarized his comments for the record.

Chris Smith, 3393 NW Pettygrove Portland O R97210 said often in public policy the answer you got depended on the question asked. The question was about how we relieve congestion in the I-5 corridor. All of the build options included funding mechanism and demand management. Should they not be looking at the demand management first? What did this project mean when they were in the throws of global warming and the price of oil increasing? They knew that the local dollars for transportation match were very scarce. Was this the best project for the money? He was concerned that none of the build option represented the best investment for the region.

Jeff Swanson, Schnitzer Steel Industries Inc 3200 NW Yeon Ave Portland Oregon 97210 provided his letter for the record and shared that testimony.

Lynn Lehrbach, Teamsters Union Jct 37 Portland, OR 97230 provided his testimony for the record.

Terry Parker, PO Box 13503 Portland OR 97213 provided his testimony for the record.

Edward Banner, Labor Round Table 4009 NE 50<sup>th</sup> Ave Vancouver WA 98661 said he had been a transportation commissioner for the State of Washington since 1999 until 2007. He had been involved in every one of the freight study, I-5 partnership study and the Columbia River Crossing study that was currently going on. Out of the 27 member Task Force, 26 voted for the Task Force recommendation. Mr. Anderson was the only one that voted against this recommendation. As a transportation commission for the State of Washington he helped institute the building the Tacoma Narrow Bridge and the tolling. The folks that use that bridge were saving 45 minutes to 90 minutes each day. Anyone who was out on I-5 today would see why the lift spans should come out of there. He spoke to congestion in the Interstate Bridge and the number of individuals who were using arterials to create additional congestion. He felt it was causing headaches for every one. It was an economic disaster for the Portland Vancouver area for creating jobs. The working people have to get up earlier and earlier to get to work. He asked the councilors who had proposed the alternative resolution why they took so long to bring forward an alternative resolution. He noted that none of the three Councilors had shown up at the CRC meetings to make their comments. He noted the costs that had already occurred. He urged resolution.

Councilor Hosticka noted that they had provided information previously to the Task Force. Councilor Harrington explained that several councilors were new to the process.

Pia Welch Portland Air Cargo Association P O Box 55983 Portland OR 97238 provided her testimony for the record.

Dan McFarling, 20585 SW Cheshire Aloha OR 97007 provided his written testimony for the record

Richard Gill, Hayden Island NA 169 N Lotus Reach Dr Portland PR 97217 provided his testimony for the record.

Monica Isbell, Starboard Alliance Co LLC 17307 NW Camelback Lane Beaverton OR 97006 provided her testimony for the record.

Jonathan Schlueter Westside Alliance and member of the Columbia River Crossing Task Force 10220 SW Nimbus Tigard OR, provided his testimony for the record and included a 2008 Greater Portland Property Prosperity, A Regional Outlook brochure for the record.

Councilor Liberty asked if they didn't have enough money to pay for all of the projects, how should they pay for all of the projects? Mr. Schlueter said his group was willing to be taxed to cover the cost. It was for the benefit of the region.

Pat Campbell, Council Member, City of Vancouver, PO Box 873206, Vancouver, WA 98687 provided his testimony for the record. Councilor Hosticka wondered if there was a requirement in Washington that the citizens vote on this issue? Councilor Campbell said yes. Councilor Collette said she extended her apology to their city council. She said there was no offense intended and Mr. Campbell accepted the apology. Councilor Liberty added that he believed in partnerships and opportunity to talk and hear their comments.

Myrna Curzon, 1651 Redwing Ct NW Salem OR 97304 said she had been a user of public transit. The reality was that people needed roads as well. She talked about accidents in the area of CRC as well as the congestion and the costs of congestion. She was in support of the replacement bridge to address safety and congestion concerns.

Veronica Rinard, Travel Portland 1000 SW Broadway St #2300 Portland OR 97205 provided her testimony for the record. They supported light rail and a replacement bridge.

Pamela Ake, Northwest Industrial NA 112 NE Bridgeton Rd Portland OR 97211 provided her testimony for the record by comment card.

Brett Hinsley OPCMIA 555 7084 N Wilbur Ave Portland 97217 did not testify.

Jeri Williams, Environmental Justice/ CRC Task Force 7053 NE 27<sup>th</sup> Ave Portland OR 97211 said when she got started in this process they were asked to participate in the Bi-State process. They were asked to address environmental justice issues such as impacts from air pollution, etc. They defeated the expansion of the freeway because of little kids with asthma who lived closed to I-5. They increased a level of community involvement. They felt they were being heard and being listened to. The citizens were able to see what would happen. Throughout the CRC process they were told not to expect financial reimbursement. She was not happy with the public involvement in this process. They received the DEIS document. She urged support of the community enhancement fund and public involvement.

Jeff Stone, Oregon Agriculture and Nursery Association 24571 SW Town Center Ct Loop W Wilsonville OR 97070 provided his testimony for the record.

Joe Cortright, Economist, 107 SE Washington, Portland OR 97217 said the CRC was a project that was conceived in another time. The CRC project was not in current process. He said the

world had changed profoundly. He talked about gas prices. The model used for this project was developed in the 1990s. Traffic and freight were going down. He said the models overstated what growth would occur. They did not have 2.4 billion dollars. Senator Murray said there would be no earmarks for large projects. He commented on the process about how the models were put together. He had filed a public record request. There was not good information. He provided a large document for the record.

Councilor Hosticka asked if staff could address some of the issues raised.

Jill Fuglister, Coalition for a Livable Future (CLF) 107 SE Washington Suite 239 Portland OR 97214 provided her testimony for the record.

Mara Gross, Coalition for a Livable Future 107 SE Washington Suite 239 Portland OR 97214 provided her testimony for the record.

Councilor Burkholder talked about performance measures at holding Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) at current levels. Was she speaking about individual or total VMT's? Ms. Gross responded to her question. Councilor Liberty summarized her testimony about tolls that impact low-income community. Ms. Gross responded to his question. Ms. Fuglister said they thought they needed to have a serious discussion about tolling to look at the impact on low-income individuals as well as community enhancement funds. Councilor Park said they were looking at Vehicle Miles Traveled offsets and tolling to encourage VMT reduction. Ms. Gross said the effect of tolls on low-income people was more impactful. Lower income working people had fewer options about when they could travel. Councilor Park said they had a lot of issues on sustainability.

Noelle Dobson, CLF Community Health Partnership, 107 SE Washington Suite 239 Portland OR 97214 emphasized considering the health impacts of the CRC project. She provided her testimony for the record.

Dave Ball, Laborer Local 320 PO Box 754 Stevenson WA 98648 said he supported a new bridge and light rail. His time was valuable. He had to make numerous trips across the bridge and often sat in traffic. He would like to speed the traffic up. We needed to continue to improve our infrastructure.

Jenny Bedell-Stiles, Cascade Climate Network 4912 NE Alberta Portland OR 97211 provided her letter for the record.

Lacey Riddle, Cascade Climate Network 8539 N Princeton Portland OR 97203 provided her letter for the record.

Jeremiah Bauman, Environment Oregon 1536 SW 11<sup>th</sup> Portland OR said Oregon was just behind Portland and the region in addressing reduction of pollution. He provided his testimony for the record.

Councilor Burkholder asked Mr. Baumam about trips and VMT numbers. Mr. Bauman responded to his question.

Marion Haynes, Portland Business Alliance 200 SW Market Portland OR 97201 provided her testimony for the record.

Councilor Park asked Ms. Haynes about funding for increased gas tax. Ms. Haynes said they supported this tax. They were working with the State to get that done.

Don Gire VP of Hinoon, TDA, 490 N Tomahawk Island Drive Portland OR 97217 said they needed fast action on the Columbia River Crossing replacement bridge and it should include light rail. He urged building now.

Bob Stacey, 1000 Friends of Oregon 534 SW 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave #300 Portland OR 97204 provided his testimony.

Doug Allan, 734 SE 47<sup>th</sup> Portland OR 97215 provided his testimony for the record.

Dave Ritchey, LIUNA 335 2212 NE Andresen Rd Vancouver OR 98661 did not testify.

Walt Evans, Schwabe Williamson and Wyatt, 1211 SW 5<sup>th</sup> Portland OR provided his testimony for the record as well as maps.

Councilor Hosticka asked how many bridges were tolled in Oregon. Mr. Evans responded to his question by providing some history about the inception of the I-5 Bridge.

Frank Regalado, 1618 SE 28<sup>th</sup> Ct Troutdale, OR 97060 did not testify but provided a comment card.

Ron Buel, 2817 NE 19<sup>th</sup> Portland OR 97212 provided his testimony for the record.

Jefferson Smith, NE 117<sup>th</sup> Portland Oregon did not testify.

Joe Smith, NE 21<sup>st</sup> Ave Portland OR 97212 said he was part of Ron Buel's gang. He provided his testimony for the record.

Councilor Park asked Mr. Smith about Pearson Air Park, was he still in favor of keeping Pearson where it was due to the issue of the bridge. Mr. Smith responded to his question.

Tom Buchele, PEAC at Lewis and Clark College Law School, 107 SE Washington St Portland OR 87214 said he was here on behalf of CLF and Northwest Environmental Center and Columbia River Keepers. They asked him to testify about the DEIS. The DEIS as presented was required to present four options. The public process was supposed to allow for public comment on the alternatives. It was important to indicate that the comments say that they wanted a bridge but if there were other alternatives considered they needed to have another public process. To the extent that a recommendation was changed it would have to go out for a new DEIS. He also thought there was inconsistency in recommending the mega-bridge as the least impactful on the environment.

Councilor Collette said she knew that the executive summary provided several alternatives. Was he saying if they recommended a right size bridge, would they have to do a SDEIS? Mr. Buchele said they would have to have an additional public process. He talked about a new SDEIS to consider green house gases. Councilor Hosticka asked if it was common in projects like this to end up with a SDEIS? Mr. Buchele said if they were suggesting another option, it would need a SDEIS and the public should have an opportunity to comment. Councilor Liberty said he was

looking at the Supplemental Bridge rendering. He wanted to know if there were deviations, would they need a SDEIS? Mr. Buchele said if there were significant change then it would trigger a need for a new SDEIS. Mr. Buchele said they would have to extend the public comment.

John Mohlis, Columbia Pacific Building Trades Council, 3535 SE 86<sup>th</sup> Ave Portland OR 97266 did not testify but provided a comment card.

Mathew Deaton, Portland OR provided his testimony for the record. He advocated for a supplemental bridge. It was easier for a bicyclist.

Jerry Grossnickle, Columbia River Towboat Association, 13510 NW Old Germantown Rd Portland OR 97231 said they supported a toll bridge across the river. He provided his testimony for the record.

Jim Howell, AORTA, 3325 NE 45<sup>th</sup> Portland OR 97213 provided his testimony for the record.

Mike Delman, 3937 SE Pie Portland OR did not testify but provided a comment card.

Kate Allen, Enterprise Community Partners/CLF, 5262 SE 62<sup>nd</sup> Portland OR 97206 provided her testimony for the record. Councilor Burkholder talked about housing expenses on both sides of the river. Ms. Allen said there was a disproportionate impact on low income, which existed on both sides of the river.

Kathryn Williams, Port of Portland, 121 NW Everett Portland OR 97212 provided her testimony for the record

Ray Poland, AORTA, 6110 SE Ankeny St Portland OR 97215 said he had testified before on this subject. This was too important to the State of Oregon. We have not accepted the change in our environment. He talked about national debt; half of it was in the hand of other nations. Meanwhile, Oregon registered 2.4 million in population and a backlog of 8 million dollars in transportation needs. Freeway and road have other issues. He said that transportation was the single most expensive expenditure of our budget. What to do about CRC? He said continue to maintain the existing bridge and build a new bridge including light rail. We must finance appropriately the main freight line to serve passengers and freight.

Sharon Nasset, 1113 Baldwin St Portland OR said she brought some paper including the federal register and the West Arterial for the record. She said the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process had not been followed. She talked about the west arterial and summarized the document she submitted on that subject. She noted List B, which had not been done on the CRC and so it did not follow the NEPA process. She summarized this document. The NEPA process had not been followed. A thorough study had not been done. We need more options. The process must be open. She hoped to open up the NEPA process.

Christion Steinbuecher. 6262 SW Salmon Portland OR 97221 did not testify.

Fred Nussbaum AORTA, 6510 SW Barnes Rd Portland OR 97225 suggested calling for an SDEIS addition and add some additional options. They supported Res No 08-3948. He urged keeping options open and encouraged amendments to Res No 08-3938B. He thanked Council President Bragdon for his leadership. The policies on the Oregon side of the equation should be addressed. This project was a run away project. He talked about the schedule, which the deadline

was August 15<sup>th</sup>. He talked about the six-year cycle. There was no rush. They were not saying that nothing needed to be done. The choice was whether we wanted to build something that we could be proud of.

Rebecca Woods, CREEC, 1020 SW Taylor Portland OR 97205 summarized CREEC's letter, which had already been submitted for the record and provided a comment card for the record.

Bill Scott, 1620 NE Broadway #540 Portland OR 97232 provided his testimony for the record.

Paula Warran, 6800 NE 58<sup>th</sup> Vancouver, WA 98661 said she lived in Vancouver Washington. She had gone to several meetings in Vancouver, which disturbed her where they took a vote supporting the alternative bridge. She had studied the DEIS and felt it was seriously flawed. She talked about the investment versus the return. There was something wrong with this project. She talked about the transit tech report. She talked about the immense amount of property that would be taken. She urged the Council to take their time.

Councilor Burkholder said the body making the decision was the CRC Task Force not the Metro Council. The Metro Council would be recommending their suggestions to the Task Force. The CRC Task Force would make a recommendation back to the 8 jurisdictions.

Bob LeFeber, Commercial Association of Realtors, 733 SW 2<sup>nd</sup> Portland OR did not testify.

Ty Lerud, 16000 SE Powell #19 Portland OR 97236 said he was a construction worker representing himself. The bottom line was they wanted to make their commutes faster. They were in favor of building a multimodal bridge. Just build it as fast as you can and for 100 years. It affects everyone. No one liked the idea of a toll because it would slow traffic down. He provided a green comment card summarizing his testimony.

Corky Collier, Columbia Corridor Association, 6015 NE 80<sup>th</sup> Portland OR 97218 said when he had spent time with the Freight Working Group, they had supported development of improvements to north and south of the river, a new bridge and light rail. This was a project with three elements that were dependent upon each other. He talked about the number of interchanges within the corridor. He talked about tolling options. Light rail needs the bridge. Could you build light rail without the bridge? By themselves they were more expensive. He felt Councilor Burkholder had approached this issue with an open mind.

Mike Wells, NAIOP, 15700 Upper Boones Ferry Rd Lake Oswego, OR 97035 provided his testimony for the record.

Joel Batterman, 6211 SE 43<sup>rd</sup> Portland OR 97206 talked about cultural shifts that were going on that might influence the project. This project was about global warming and sustainability. He talked about why he moved to Portland, which included a different lifestyle including more compact urban environment. This was a profound cultural shift and should be considered in the project.

Council President Bragdon closed the public hearing.

Councilor Hosticka asked about transportation costs that were included in the model. Andy Cotugno, Planning Director, provided a memo from the CRC Co-Project Directors. The direct answer to the question was \$.14 in 2005 dollars. What they found was that the auto operating cost

fluctuation had remained constant in the long-term sense. The short-term effect was that the fleet was fixed. Over the long term they had more choices including choices about the fleet, which counter balance oil consumption. The actual cost to use the vehicle was what was used in the model. He summarized the three cost factors. These were assumptions. Councilor Collette asked if there was an actual cost of gas. Mr. Cotugno said no. The main point for this forecasting process was that they were looking at economic fuel efficiency counter balancing the cost of gas. Councilor Hosticka talked about the real cost of fuel and looking to the future.

Councilor Liberty asked Dan Cooper, Metro Attorney, to walk them through the amendments.

Mr. Cooper said there were ten amendments before Council (a copy of which is included in the record). One of those amendments had an error so that was revised and was about early implementation of tolling as well as the revision of the environmental justice. They should have a total of 12, two of which are revised,

Councilor Harrington explained her amendment having to do with health impacts. She provided an example of concrete barriers, replacing the existing sound wall so the air quality would improve. She also wanted to ensure community enhancement funds were available as well, for example, as used in the Delta widening project.

Vote:	Councilors Park, Burkholder, Collette, Harrington, Liberty, Hosticka and Council President Bragdon voted in support of the motion. The vote was 7 aye, the motion passed.
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Motion to amend:	Councilor Collette moved to amend Resolution No. 08-3938B with
	Greenhouse Gas Emissions amendment and included an additional whereas
	clause about the analysis of green house gas emissions.
Seconded:	Councilor Liberty seconded the motion

Councilor Collette summarized her amendment and read that amendment into the record. Her intent was to address concerns, which reflected the values of reducing VMT and reducing green house gases and with an understanding of that goal.

Councilor Park asked for clarification as to the term independent analysis. Would this be part of the normal EIS or would this be a third party? Council President Bragdon explained what they were looking for in an analysis, which was a question of taking a fresh look at this issue. Councilor Park explained why he asked the question.

Councilor Burkholder said he supported the intent but there was a part of this that may not work which was a reduction in VMT. He suggested green house gases reduction wordage changes. There was difficulty in achieving a reduction in VMT on a regional level. Councilor Harrington clarified what Councilor Burkholder was suggesting as an amendment. Councilor Burkholder suggesting striking reducing VMTs. Councilors added their comments about the amendment.

Councilor Collette said she was not convinced that the supplemental bridge described in the LPA was the best option. She talked about right sizing the project. Mr. Cooper said the preferred alternative were five options, one with light rail and one with rapid transit but it did not nail down the number of lanes. Council will be taking action on the RTP later on, so lanes were still open for determination. Council President Bragdon explained Exhibit A and talked about the fact that the number of lanes was to be determined at a later time. Councilor Hosticka explained the essence of the decision before Council today. Councilors further explained their thoughts on the amendment and why they were voting a certain way.

Vote: Councilors Liberty, Hosticka voted in support of the motion. The vote was 2 aye/5 nay, the motion failed with Councilors Collette, Bragdon, Burkholder, Park and Harrington voting no.

Councilor Burkholder felt the debate had been helpful. He spoke of the issues that all people had different positions on. The Task Force had spent a lot of time. He felt the guidance provided was helpful. He was hopeful the Task Force would agree with the Councilors recommendation. Councilor Park thanked Councilor Burkholder for spending the time with the Task Force as well as the Council for making this recommendation better for the region. It was not business as usual. He talked about the regional economy and the impacts of this decision. Councilor Harrington said the resolution that they had tonight that they achieved through the amendment process was a better product than before. She also thanked those who had participated in the process. She was troubled with that idea that highway action was contradictive to climate. With regard to the CRC the status quo was not an option. She looked at the region as part of a connective larger whole. It was part of a whole at the state, national and planetary level. What ever was done should be sustainable. Time matters, freight mobility and reliability matters. There was a lot of work ahead. She believed they were working toward a right size solution. She respected the work that had been done particularly with their partners. She would be supporting the resolution. Councilor Liberty said one of the first times they considered this project was in the Fall 2006. They had all signed a letter to CRC Task Force. He summarized the letter. This was not the end. The project

would be going through a lot of changes. There were some good elements. He was concerned that they had stepped away from their commitments so he would not be supporting the resolution. Councilor Collette said this had been an amazing process. She thanked Councilor Burkholder and the other regional leadership who had worked on this project. She also thanked those who explained to her what was right and wrong with her perspective. She thought they could build a successful project. We needed a new approach to transportation planning. They needed to take lessons from the power side. They needed to look at cost effectiveness including both capital and environmental. We needed a new bridge and a corridor to the future that spans common values. She spoke of the serious climate challenge. We will have to find common ground. Councilor Hosticka appreciated efforts that they had gone through tonight. What they were doing was to reducing congestion, having freight move more freely but reducing the impact on the environment and climate and reducing sprawl on the landscape. There were three ways, which were combined into one mega project. He could not support this. Council President Bragdon said this was a momentous project as a whole. He was proud of the Council in terms of the way this issue had been approached. He acknowledged Councilor Burkholder's tremendous amount of time that had been put in. He thanked the entire Council and the staff. They were asking for more work by the action tonight. He spoke of new partnerships as they go forward. He felt that these partnerships would serve them well as they moved forward.

Councilor Burkholder closed by saying by quoting Councilor Hosticka "in government was that everything had been said but not everyone said it" and "that when you refuse to settle for nothing but the best sometimes nothing is all we get". We were trying to do the best we can. No good deed goes unpunished. Mark Anthony's speech in Julius Caesar "there was a tide in the affairs of men which taken at the flood leads on to fortune which left in the slack leaves you on the rocks of despair." Finally, Winston Churchill said, "Democracy is the worst form of government except every other one." There was still a lot of work to be done to make sure this things actually accomplishes the goals. They were tough goals to meet. He thanked everyone involved and urged support.

Vote on the Main Motion:

Councilors Park, Burkholder, Collette, Harrington and Council President Bragdon voted in support of the motion. The vote was 5 aye 2 nay, the motion passed with Councilors Liberty and Hosticka voting no.
