ISSUE & BACKGROUND

Metro Code establishes that a primary purpose of the Solid Waste Advisory Committee (SWAC) is to evaluate policy options and present policy recommendations to the Metro Council and Chief Operating Officer. Members of the Council, Metro staff, and many SWAC members feel that the committee has not effectively carried out this role over the last few years.

In light of this, in Fall 2008 Council President Bragdon informed SWAC members that he was directing staff to develop options for improving the quality of the input provided by stakeholders to the Metro Council on solid waste policies. He solicited input from SWAC members on how to improve this input, as well as how to best meet the need for continuing engagement on non-policy matters.

On June 8, 2009, Council President Bragdon convened SWAC and staff presented a draft framework for stakeholder input and collaboration. The framework is described in Attachments 1 and 2 of this packet. Its components are intended to address three elements identified by internal and external stakeholders as necessary components for effective collaboration and policy-making:

- 1. A process for policy options to be developed and vetted in a manner that reflects the public interest.
- 2. A forum for ongoing dialogue between industry, Metro, local governments and other stakeholders.
- 3. A means through which all stakeholders can collaboratively address complex program implementation issues.

The options and questions to be presented to Council during this work session will focus on the first component identified above. Under the proposed framework, the responsibilities for developing and vetting policy proposals would be divided between two committees:

a. A **Policy Alternatives Committee** responsible for developing policy options. The voting membership would be limited to local government representatives. The non-voting membership would be comprised of industry, Department of Environmental Quality, environmental advocacy, and Metro representatives.

b. The **Metro Policy Advisory Committee** (**MPAC**), which would consider those options and make recommendations to the Metro Council.

OPTIONS AVAILABLE

1. Endorse MPAC's role to make solid waste-related policy committee as described in Attachment 3. recommendations to Council

2. *Or*, endorse MPAC's role to make solid waste-related policy recommendations to Council and amend the membership of the Policy Alternatives Committee.

3. *Or*, do not endorse this role for *and*, instead, either expand the role of the Policy Alternatives Committee to include making policy recommendations

or identify an alternative approach.

IMPLICATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS

Staff Suggestion: Option 1

Reasons

- a. It would establish a process for developing and vetting policy options that would potentially be more effective than the current approach.
- b. In contrast to SWAC, it would segregate the work of developing policy options from that of making recommendations to Council.
- c. It would engage MPAC members in the development of policies that affect their residents and businesses.

Anticipated problems if Option 1 is implemented

MPAC members may not have the time or interest to engage in substantive discussions of solid waste management-related policies.

Anticipated problem if Option 1 is not implemented

The status quo with SWAC does not allow for policy recommendations to be effectively made to Council. Some alternative approach is needed.


QUESTION(S) PRESENTED FOR CONSIDERATION

- 2. If "yes" to question 1, does Council direct staff to bring forward revisions to the code that would establish a Policy Alternatives Committee as delineated in Attachment 3?
- 3. If "no" to question 1, would Council like the responsibility for making policy recommendations to be vested with the Policy Alternatives Committee or be carried out through some other means?

Regional Collaboration Framework Waste Reduction and Solid Waste Management

Roles and responsibilities	Purpose	Participants	Schedule
Policy Alternatives Committee (placeholder name)	The Committee identifies policy needs and develops policy alternatives for consideration by MPAC.	13 members appointed by the Metro Council, representing government, industry and environmental sectors. Only public sector members vote.	Meets on as-needed basis.
Metro Policy Advisory Committee (MPAC)	In this framework, MPAC considers the options developed by the Policy Alternatives Committee and forwards a policy recommendation to the Metro Council.	28-member charter-mandated committee of local government representatives and citizens.	Meets at 5 p.m. on the second and fourth Wednesdays at Metro Regional Center.
Roundtable (placeholder name)	The Roundtable provides a forum for Metro and its private and public sector stakeholders to: (1) update each other on current activities; and (2) identify issues that warrant regional collaboration.	Waste reduction, sustainability and solid waste management stakeholders, and other interested parties.	Meets quarterly.
Task force or workshop	Limited duration task forces or one- day workshops will be used to address complex programmatic and technical issues identified by Metro, the Roundtable, or the Policy Alternatives Committee.	Roundtable and Policy Alternatives Committee representatives, topic experts, technical staff and other stakeholders. Metro's Deputy COO will appoint participants for issues directly related to Metro programs. Participants for other issues will be determined by a consensus of the Roundtable or Committee. Policy Alternatives Committee (placeholder name)

I. <u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of the Policy Alternatives Committee (Committee) is to support Council decision-making by providing well-developed policy options to the Metro Policy Advisory Committee (MPAC) for consideration.

The Committee's work will address issues related to:

- resource conservation and waste generation, including waste prevention, reuse, recycling, toxicity reduction, and product stewardship
- the system through which the solid waste generated by the region's citizens and businesses is collected, transported, processed and disposed.

II. Membership.

appointments, the Metro Council President will strive to achieve a representation of four members directly involved in regulation or oversight of solid waste services and three members, such as sustainability coordinators, who are directly involved in resource conservation activities.

- F. The Oregon Department of Environmental Quality representative shall be appointed by the agency's presiding executive and serve until replaced by that executive.
- G. The other non-voting members shall be nominated through a public application process, appointed by the Metro Council President, and subject to confirmation by the Metro Council. Appointments shall be for a term of two (2) years. A member may be reappointed for a second consecutive two (2) year term.
- H. The Metro representative shall be appointed by the Chief Operating Officer (COO) and serve until replaced by the COO.
- III. <u>Meetings</u>. The Committee shall meet on a schedule determined by its members, with no fewer than two meetings per calendar year.
- IV. <u>Subcommittees</u>. Subcommittees of a limited and defined duration may be established by the Committee. Membership composition shall be determined by the Committee and may include individuals who are not members of the Committee. All such subcommittees shall report to the Committee.
