### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

- Travel Portland exceeded all of its contractual goals.
- For the year OCC realized over \$10M in revenue from Travel Portland booked business with an ROI of 47.8:1. This exceeds last year's high water mark of \$9.2M. The year began with \$6.8M of potential OCC revenue so additional bookings and increased attendance helped make this a very strong year in OCC revenue.
- During fiscal year 2010-11 Travel Portland booked 47 future OCC business with an estimated OCC revenue of over \$7.5M and an economic impact of over \$55M. This represents 111,745 rooms. More conventions were booked but with less future room nights so we are seeing smaller conventions. This speaks to the lack of a headquarter hotel and smaller room blocks.
- Travel Portland booked 96 total group meetings, including single hotel, for future years during the fourth quarter. These represent a total of 62,542 rooms sold with an estimated economic impact of \$38.6 million. For 2010-11, 359 groups meetings were booked which represented 227,864 rooms sold. Estimated economic impact was \$138.5 million.
- Travel Portland generated three articles with a value of \$20K for the OCC. There were also two article valued at \$219K from our efforts in the Chicago/DC markets. A total of 55 MERC and Chicago/DC articles valued at \$3 million was generated for 2010-11.

#### TRENDS, SUCCESSES, OBSTACLES

- YTD room tax collection from the City is +7.1% compared to 2010.
- Travel Portland tracks lost business and during the 4th quarter six groups worth 15,238 room nights declined to come to Portland due to lack of a headquarter hotel or the inability to get all of their delegates in a single hotel.

## **OPERATIONS**

#### FIRST OPPORTUNITY TARGET AREA REPORT (FOTA)

#### HIRING

Travel Portland hired no new employees in the fourth quarter. Recruiting and special considerations are always made for applicants in the MERC FOTA. Travel Portland currently has seven employees who reside in the MERC FOTA.

#### **PURCHASING**

Travel Portland expended a total of \$180,815.27 with businesses in the FOTA area for twelve months ending June 30, 2011.

#### **PARTNERSHIP**

Travel Portland currently has 78 member businesses within FOTA and 52 minority and 92 women-owned businesses as its partners.

## MBE/DBE/WBE PURCHASING PARTICIPATION REPORT FOR THE TWELVE MONTHS ENDING JUNE 30, 2011

For the last 22 years Travel Portland has implemented a voluntary MBE/DBE/WBE purchasing program that strives to ensure a high level of participation with certified minority-owned, disadvantaged or women-owned businesses when securing services and supplies that are purchased using lodging tax dollars.

For fiscal year 2010-11, Travel Portland expended \$575,642.00 of lodging tax dollars in the purchasing of services and supplies where it had the discretion to purchase from outside vendors. Of this amount, \$91,563.37 or 15.9 percent was spent with minority/women-owned or emerging small business enterprises.

Subject: Solid Waste Fleet Diesel Emissions Project Presentation

This presentation is intended to provide you with an update on regional efforts to reduce diesel particulate emissions from solid waste collection vehicles. Reducing these emissions can have significant positive impacts on human health and the environment and is one of the goals in the Sustainable Operations chapter of the 2008-2018 Regional Solid Waste Management Plan (RSWMP) adopted by Council.

In 2009, Metro and local government staff, in consultation with haulers, began to develop and implement a plan for reducing diesel particulate emissions from solid waste collection vehicles. This plan incorporated a range of techniques, including exhaust emissions equipment retrofits, alternative fuels, and retirement of older vehicles. The plan included exploration of funding options, development and management of performance metrics, and data tracking protocols. Early buy-in on the plan from the local governments that regulate the franchised haulers and set collection rates has been crucial for the success of this project.

The first phase is focused on installation of diesel particulate emissions control devices on approximately 120-160 regional refuse collection vehicles. It is jointly funded by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) and Metro. To date, work orders have been issued for the testing and installation of diesel particulate filtering devices for 80 trucks, with an additional 40-80 trucks pending. Prior to testing and installation, each vehicle is authorized by DEQ after satisfying an EPA cost-benefit analysis. This cost-benefit analysis ensures that an acceptable level of emissions reductions will be achieved for the investment. EPA has calculated that for each pound of diesel particulate reduced, there is approximately \$125 in human health and economic benefits. The retrofitting of the region's refuse trucks will result in an overall benefit of approximately \$4.6 to \$6.2 million.

The second phase of Metro's work, also to be done in collaboration with the solid waste industry and local governments, will be to facilitate the transition of the solid waste fleet to alternative fuels. The most likely near-term alternative is compressed natural gas. Throughout the country, collection fleets are switching to natural gas as an alternative to diesel. In 2008, it was estimated that over 2,000 natural gas powered refuse collection vehicles were in operation in 57 communities nationwide.

The interest in switching from diesel to natural gas as a refuse fleet fuel is due to emission reduction benefits, rising diesel prices, the improvement of natural gas engine technologies, and a perceived abundance of natural gas reserves. The primary impediment to its adoption in our region has been the lack of a fueling infrastructure. The phase 2 work is expected to focus on development of this infrastructure, with Metro's roles to be as a convener, facilitator and potentially, a funding partner, if needed and approved by Council. An additional role for Metro is seen as investigating and facilitating development of natural gas fuels derived from materials in the waste stream. The development of a viable natural gas fueling infrastructure may prompt approximately 30% of the 900 trucks in the refuse fleet to switch from diesel to natural gas as a fleet fuel.

Second:	Councilor Craddick seconded the motion.

Councilor Collette introduced Resolution No. 11-4290. While the Portland metro region is known for its regional sustainable development, gaps still exist when it comes to regional equity, access to housing, and access to opportunities such as housing and transportation. These gaps limit the region from developing the sustainable communities it desires. The grant, a partnership with Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Department of Transportation (DOT), and Environmental Protection (EPA) is intended to assist regions like the Portland metro area – areas who have already adopted a regional sustainable development plan – address these gaps and develop more detailed strategies for execution. As a result of the grant, the consortium hopes to:

- Create new partnerships with local government, foundations, service providers, business and community-based organizations;
- Increase capacity for community engagement;
- Better align local, state, regional, and federal investments that support housing needs of the future; and

• Develop a new framework to guide investments that promote equity and opportunity.

The grant would target two pilot communities in east Portland/Rockwood and McLoughlin South Center. A pilot project in Aloha-Reedville was awarded funding through the 2010 HUD grant.

Deputy Council President Hosticka opened the meeting for public comment on Resolution No. 11-4290:

• <u>Jane Leo, Portland Metropolitan Association of Relators (PMAR)</u>: Ms. Leo expressed concern that the private sector, specifically PMAR and the Home Builders Association, were not included in the consortium. She stated that the relators originally expressed support in 2010, but had been told that due to the tight timeframe had not been included on the grant application. She could not confirm that PMAR would be a partner on 2011 application due to the tight timeframe, but did express interest to say involved in the process.

Council apologized for the oversight and expressed their desire for the private sector to be included. Staff indicated that their deadline could be extended to include HBA and PMAR on the application, but if possible would also like a financial commitment from the organizations. Staff indicated that the larger the coalition partnership the stronger the grant application.

Seeing no additional citizens who wished to comment on the resolution, Deputy Council President Hughes opened the resolution for council discussion.

Mr. Andy Cotugno of Metro highlighted that Council support for the resolution would commit local match funds (e.g. through staff support), and support the establishment of an executive committee comprised of six public officials and six community-based leaders. The executive committee is charged with making decisions on the delivery of grant work program and establishing conclusions and recommendations resulting from the grant. The six public officials positions would be drawn from the Metro Council, Joint Policy Advisory Committee on Transportation (JPACT) and Metro Policy Advisory Committee (MPAC) membership.

Council discussion included opportunity mapping and Washington County's success utilizing the tool, the magnitude of the housing survey, regional equity, and building a livable, prosperous community.

Vote:

Deputy Council President Hosticka and Councilors Collette, Roberts, Craddick, and Harrington voted in support of the motion. The vote was 5 ayes, the motion passed.

5.2 **Resolution No. 11-4292**, For the Purpose of Approving the Oregon Zoo Bond Implementation Plan.

Motion:	Councilor Craddick moved to adopt Resolution No. 11-4292.
Second:	Councilor Collette seconded the motion.

Councilor Craddick introduced Resolution No. 11-4292. At the General Election held on November 4, 2008, the Portland metro area voters approved Oregon Zoo Bond Measure 26-29, entitled "Bonds to Protect Animal Health and Safety; Conserve and Recycle Water." The measure outlined a series of

capital improvements that would enhance animal welfare, increase access to conservation education, and improve the zoo campus sustainability. Metro contracted with a world-class team of architects, animal experts and engineers to develop the Zoo's comprehensive plan.

Ms. Kim Smith and Mr. Craig Stroud of the Oregon Zoo provided a presentation on the Zoo's comprehensive master plan. Their presentation included a brief historical overview of the project, summary of bond fund allocations and total project cost, revised project schedule, and sketches/renderings of the of the new or update exhibits. Highlights included a new veterinary hospital, conservation discovery zone building, and visitor circulation center, and new and/or updated penguin, polar bear, primates, rhino, condors, and Asian elephants' exhibits and related infrastructure. In addition, staff previewed a video thanking voters for their support of the bond measure. (Presentation and video included as part of the meeting record.)

Approval of the resolution would direct Zoo staff to move forward with securing land use permits, and construction. Council thanked the Zoo team and oversight committees for their work on the plan. Councilors emphasized the professional, transparent, and open process, and expressed confidence in staffs' ability to deliver on the project.

Vote:

Deputy Council President Hosticka and Councilors Collette, Roberts, Craddick, and Harrington voted in support of the motion. The vote was 5 ayes, the motion passed.

5.3 **Resolution No. 11-4293**, For the Purpose of Amending the Natural Areas Acquisition Refinement Plans for the Clackamas River Bluffs and Greenway, Columbia Slough, Lower Tualatin River Headwaters, Rock Creek Headwaters and Greenway, Tonquin Geologic Area, Westside Trail, and Willamette Narrows and Canemah Bluffs Target Areas.

Motion:	Councilor Harrington moved to adopt Resolution No. 11-4293.
Second:	Councilor Collette seconded the motion.

Councilor Harrington introduced Resolution No. 11-4293. After the citizens of the region passed the 2006 Natural Areas bond measure, the Council spent 9 months developing priorities for each target are identified in the bond. Each of the 26 regional target areas were recorded in individual refinement plans. In 2007, after the Council finalized the refinement plans, Council adopted a confidential tax lot map for each target area. As long as a property within a target area supports achievement of the refinement plan goals, is on the confidential tax lot maps, and conforms to the requirements of the natural areas work plan, staff can proceed to acquire property without further authorization by the Council. In the four years since then, Metro has acquired over 3,000 acres and over 20 trail agreements. With more knowledge about each target area, potential adjustments to the map are proposed. The Council has reviewed each proposed addition in executive session. In order to maintain confidentiality for real estate negotiations, the staff report to the resolution identifies the target areas and describes the additions, but does not include the map. Approval of the resolution would authorize staff to add additional parcels to the confidential tax lot maps for potential natural area bond acquisition.

Vote:

Deputy Council President Hosticka and Councilors Collette, Roberts, Craddick, and Burkholder voted in support of the motion. The vote was 5 ayes, the motion passed.

#### 6. <u>WILLAMETTE FALLS GREENWAY OPPORTUNITY</u>

Mr. Desmond provided a broad overview of the Willamette Falls Opportunity. The 22-acre heavy industrial site is located adjacent to the City of Oregon City. Staff stated that while the loss of the Blue Heron is disappointing, the region is presented with an opportunity to rediscover the falls. He highlighted the Falls' historical and cultural significance for the Native American people, revitalization potential for the City, job creation, and fish and wildlife habitat restoration as reasoning. Bids for the Willamette Falls site are due October 19 to the Bankruptcy Trustee. Mr. Desmond emphasized the complexity of the project and stated that should Metro move forward with acquisition the public would be engaged in the site's visioning process. He emphasized the multiple partners and stakeholders that would be included in the process.

Deputy Council President Hosticka opened the meeting for public comment on the Willamette Falls Opportunity:

• <u>Mike Falia, Portland</u>: Mr. Falia was in support of the acquisition, citing the cultural significance of the site as reasoning. He recommended that the site be developed as a tourist attraction, similar to Multnomah Falls, stating that the attraction would create jobs. He also noted Metro's experience working with regional partners on natural resource protection.

#### 7. CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER COMMUNICATION

Mr. Dan Cooper of Metro provided an update on Metro's recent purchase of a Nissan Leaf, a fully electric vehicle. He also updated the Council on the continued search for missing Metro staff person Mark Bosworth.

#### 8. <u>COUNCILOR COMMUNICATION</u>

Council updates include the final "It's Our Nature" event scheduled at Cooper Mountain, and the Council's annual kayak race.

#### 9. <u>ADJOURN</u>

There being no further business, Deputy Council President Hosticka adjourned the regular meeting at 3:53 p.m. The Metro Council reconvened into an executive session pursuant with ORS 192.660(2)(e). The Council will reconvene the next regular council meeting on Thursday, Sept. 29 at 2 p.m. at Metro Council Chambers.

# 10. EXECUTIVE SESSION HELD PURSUANT WITH ORS 192.600(2)(E). TO CONDUCT DELIBERATIONS WITH PERSONS DESIGNATED BY THE GOVERING BODY TO NEGOTIATE REAL PROPERTY TRANSACTIONS

The Council convened an executive session related to the Willamette Falls Greenway Opportunity, for the purpose of deliberating with persons authorized to negotiate real property transactions, as provided in ORS 192.660(2)(e), and for the purpose of considering confidential and privileged legal advice exempt by law from public inspection, as provided in ORS 192.660(2)(e). Representatives of the news media, designated staff and other specified persons were allowed to attend the executive session. News media were specifically directed not to report on any of the deliberations during the executive session, expect to state the general subject of the session as announced. Council reminded attendees that no decision maybe made in executive session.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Metro Code, Section 6.01.030(a), gives the Metro Council President sole authority to appoint all members of the Metropolitan Exposition Recreation Commission, subject to confirmation by the Council. Section 6.01.030(d)(1) of the Code allows Multnomah County to nominate a candidate for appointment for the Council President's consideration. Under Section 6.01.030(e)(1) of the Metro Code, the Metro Council President has the authority to concur with Multnomah County's nomination and submit it to the Council for confirmation, or reject it.

Elisa Dozono's term is ending September 24, 2011. Multnomah County has reappointed Elisa Dozono as a candidate to continue membership on the Commission. The Council President has concurred with this nomination and accordingly submitted his appointment of Elisa Dozono to the Council for confirmation. If confirmed, Ms. Dozono would, pursuant to Metro Code, Section 6.01.030(g) begin her term on September 24, 2011 and ending September 24, 2015.

A copy of Ms. Dozono's biography is attached.



#### RECOMMENDED ACTION

The Council President, Tom Hughes, recommends approval of Resolution No. 11-4295 to confirm the reappointment of Elisa J. Dozono to the Metropolitan Exposition Recreation Commission and to continue serving from September 24, 2011 to September 24, 2015.

The Sunday Oregonian's bold headline "The CRC will bring SAFER access to Hayden Island" stretches the truth. Statistical accident rate & severity is worse. Both exits onto Hayden Island are downhill which increases stopping distance. Exiting traffic must come to a complete stop at a "T" with forced turns. Stopped traffic backs up while waiting for traffic entering the freeway to pass. Faster freeway speeds lead to faster exiting onto less visible downhill ramps with backed-up traffic and little emergency escape space. The design 'creates' a pair of extremely dangerous bottlenecks. The Hayden Island interchange design is NOT SAFE for motorists nor pedestrians as air, water, noise, land-use and redevelopment potential, and island traffic management overall are worse than existing ramps and alternative designs.

I recommend a fair public review of the CRC Commission's own Off-island Access Alternative Concept #1 (hinted in the article) plus building ONLY the Southbound Bridge while using both existing bridges for northbound lanes. The eventually built Northbound Bridge does NOT need a lower deck. Being lighter, it can be an elegant cable-stayed design to complement the utilitarian stressed-truss of the southbound bridge. This phased approach to the CRC project sets up a traffic pattern that necessitates further study of northbound interchange designs in Washington State. It most likely reduces costs, but more important, achieves higher safety standards.



# SOCCER CITY, USA

A LONGTIME SOCCER HOT SPOT, PORTLAND BRINGS ITS GAME TO MLS. ast July, at a time when some of the country's other sports fans were more fixated on their NFL fantasy football drafts, Portlanders had *futbol* on the brain. With flags waving — and vuvuzelas blasting — thousands of the city's soccer fans jammed into downtown's Pioneer Courthouse Square to cheer on a live outdoor broadcast of the 2010 World Cup Final.

Call it a warm-up party.

This year, the city's wildly popular minor league soccer team, the **Portland Timbers** (www.portlandtimbers.com), makes the leap to the big time, becoming Major League Soccer's 18th franchise. The eagerly awaited move means big things for local footie fans, including a renovated stadium and a schedule

packed with ready-made rivalries in the form of the Seattle Sounders and the Vancouver, B.C., Whitecaps.

"The atmosphere here is one that a lot of teams are trying to create," says owner Merritt Paulson, who bought the team in 2007. "This has been very organic, in the spirit of Portland, and it's something that is fan-generated. It's special."

Many of those fans belong to the die-hard Timbers Army, unofficial boosters who have been following the team for years. On game nights, they fill up the stands and remain on their feet, cheering wildly and singing heartily, the entire game.


The \$31 million renovation of JELD-WEN Field, the Timbers' home stadium, gives fans another reason to cheer. The 85-year-old multiuse sports facility has been transformed into an 18.000-seat home field that maximizes the soccer experience, stands within walking distance from downtown and is easily accessible via MAX light rail.

"We've got something that's rare in Major League Soccer," says Paulson, "a soccer-specific stadium that's in the heart of the city." Not to mention one that's filled with the country's biggest fans.





**HOUSE SPIRITS LEADS** PORTLAND'S CRAFT DISTILLING REVOLUTION.

ortlanders are a thirsty - and creative - lot. Long known for microbrews, Pinot noir and hand-roasted coffee. Portland is also home to a trend-setting spirits scene. Many of the city's 10-plus distillers offer tastings and tours in an area of Southeast Portland dubbed Distillery **Row** (www.distilleryrowpdx.com).

Founded in 2004, House Spirits (2025 S.E. Seventh Ave.; 503.235.3174; www.housespirits.com) became a Distillery Row anchor with the opening of a permanent tasting room alongside its expanded facility in 2008. The tasting room is open Tuesday-Saturday, and tours of the distillery are offered each hour on Saturdays.

Inside House Spirits' tasting room, you can sip the best-selling Aviation Gin or take a nip of Krogstad Aquavit, a Scandinavian liquor flavored with anise and caraway seed. More adventurous tipplers can try selections from the

Apothecary line. With labels designed by a local artist and red-wax-dipped closures, the bottles evoke an old-time pharmacy. These limited-edition test batches change frequently, but recent offerings have included whiskey, ouzo and rum, as well as less familiar creations like rice-based shochu and pálinka, an unaged brandy.

In addition to the unique libations, the tasting room also sells a number of cocktail accoutrements. Alongside bar tools like absinthe spoons, muddlers and strainers, there's an impressive

selection of bitters, all chosen to complement House Spirits' offerings.

To sample these spirits, you don't have to mix your own drinks or even visit Distillery Row. Every Wednesday evening, House Spirits hosts a happy hour at a different local bar or restaurant. Dubbed "RPM Wednesdays," these events feature custom-crafted drinks for just \$5, and offer a great excuse to visit up-and-coming eateries around town. 



Portland's most-talkedabout chefs plate up unforgettable meals.

# **ANDY RICKER**

In the last five years, Andy Ricker, 47, has been heralded as an Asian cuisine guru by the likes of Food & Wine, earned two James Beard Award nominations and created a miniempire of restaurant ventures, including Pok Pok (3226 S.E. Division St.; 503.287.4149; www.pokpokpdx.com), a temple of Thai street food, and Whiskey Soda Lounge (503.232.0102; www.whiskeysodalounge.com) across the street. Diners head to the latter for Thai "drinking food," such as addictive sticky chicken wings, and beverages like drinking vinegars and "jelly beer." Ricker's newest spot, Pok Pok Noi (1469 N.E. Prescott St.; 503.287.4149; www.pokpok noi.com), focuses on takeout. And Ping (102 N.W. Fourth Ave.; 503.229.7464; www.ping pdx.com), a Chinatown venture co-owned by Ricker, offers East Asian snacks and drinks.



# MATT LIGHTNER

When he's not juxtaposing flavors and textures in the kitchen at award-winning restaurant Castagna (1758 S.E. Hawthorne Blvd.; 503.231.9959; www.castagnarestaurant. com), 30-year-old Matt Lightner, who was named one of 2010's best new chefs by Food & Wine, is foraging for uncommon ingredients in the woods or along the coast. (Lightner says his inspiration comes from the aromas and colors he encounters while hiking.) The result: art on the plate and surprises on the palate, like a sous-vide lamb collar with grilled chicory and groats, accented with grasses, dill weed and yogurt.



# NAOMI POMFROY

In between a Top Chef Masters appearance and photo shoots for Marie Claire and O magazines, Naomi Pomeroy, 36, orchestrates prix fixe, French-inspired meals in her tiny, rose-hued restaurant, Beast (5425 N.E. 30th Ave.; 503.841.6968; www.beastpdx.com). Her formula is simple but foolproof: elegant multicourse dinners and Sunday brunch served at two communal tables. The meatheavy menu evolves constantly, but lucky diners will get to savor one of Pomeroy's melt-in-your-mouth foie gras bonbons.



# JOHN GORHAM

John Gorham, a former butcher, calls his award-winning eatery Tasty n Sons (3808 N.Williams Ave.; 503.621.1400; www. tastynsons.com) a "modern neighborhood diner." How else to explain such unexpected finds as house-made North African sausage with couscous, Burmese red pork stew or a cast-iron cassoulet? Old favorites like buttermilk biscuits and cheesesteaks also figure into the mix. The boisterous atmosphere and shared plates are part of the fun here and at Gorham's nearby tapas restaurant, Toro Bravo (120 N.E. Russell St.; 503.281.4464; www.torobravopdx.com).







Amid the futuristic cityscape, old-fashioned touches make big impressions. Streets are walkable. Scores of bike routes guide cyclists through town. And at the city's core, a public plaza draws Portlanders to the heart of a downtown that's always looking ahead. — Brian Barker



The succulent pastrami at **()** Kenny & Zuke's Delicatessen (1038 S.W. Stark St.; 503.222.3354; www.kennyandzukes. com) are cured for a week, smoked on the spot for seven hours, and then served atop rye bread baked that morning. Eat your heart out, Big Apple. A longtime favorite on Portland's famed food cart scene, **2 Tábor** (corner of S.W. Fifth Ave. and Stark St.: www. schnitzelwich.com) tames lunchtime hunger pangs with its legendary "Schnitzelwich" and rich goulash. (1) Little Bird Bistro (219 S.W. Sixth Ave.; 503.688.5952; www. littlebirdbistro.com), an offshoot of the eclectic Le Pigeon, offers tamer — but no less decadent - French-influenced fare such as braised lamb shanks and flatiron steak with truffle creamed spinach.



Tax-free is the name of the game in Oregon, and at 4 Pioneer Place (700 S.W. Fifth Ave.; 503.228.5800; www.pioneerplace.com) you can find amazing deals at scores of

dirt on the Rose City. Choose from a series of themed outings such as "Best of Portland" and "Epicurean Excursion." If you'd rather let the action come to you, head to Pioneer Courthouse Square (701 S.W. Sixth Ave.; www. pioneercourthousesquare.org). Nicknamed "Portland's Living Room," this red-brick public space pulls Portlanders together for concerts, movie screenings and festivals. Locals love to eat their food-cart takeout here, and to visit the farmers' market on summer Mondays. 3 At the Portland Art Museum (1219 S.W. Park Ave.; 503.226.2811; www.portlandartmuseum. org) the permanent collection includes thousands of Native American and Asian objects, as well as modern and contemporary art and photography. Special exhibits feature regularly — the "The Allure of the Automobile" puts rare cars on display from June through September 2011.

## PEARL DISTRICT

Once a warehouse district, the Pearl, as locals know it, is now a hub for shoppers, diners and art mavens alike. Served by a modern streetcar line that snakes through downtown to the city's Northwest neighborhood, the urban Pearl is bustling with bars, restaurants, shops and public spaces. It's also a hot spot for eco-friendly architecture, with many of the new structures earning LEED certification and older buildings restored to maintain their timeless appeal. — *John Patrick Pullen*







A short stroll away, the **3** Museum of Contemporary Craft (724 N.W. Davis St.; 503.223.2654; www. museumofcontemporarycraft.org) showcases an impressive collection of midcentury ceramic pieces as wells as works in wood, fiber and glass. But if you prefer playing outside, there's no better space than 1 Jamison Square (N.W. Johnson St. & I Ith Ave.; www.portlandparks.org), which attracts sunbathers and fountain-loving toddlers in summer.








## NORTHWEST PORTLAND

A few blocks away, the modest **2** Red Onion Thai Cuisine (1123 N.W. 23rd Ave.; 503.208.2634; no website) produces inspired Asian dishes like Chinese sausage and shrimp laced with Dungeness crab chunks, and a zippy stir-fried green curry beef. At 3 Bar Mingo (811 N.W. 21st Ave.; 503.445.4646; www.barmingonw. com), discover Old World delights, including hand-cut pasta and fresh risotto. You'll find similar fare in a more formal setting at Caffe Mingo, next door.



Distillery tours are offered twice a year, on Memorial Day and Thanksgiving weekends. Urbanites can escape up a flight of stairs to the unmarked **1 Uptown Billiards** (120 N.W. 23rd Ave.; 503.226.6909; www. uptownbilliards.com), a swanky pool hall and restaurant stashed away on busy Northwest 23rd Avenue. Look for the black awning.

Make a grand entrance by stepping through the ornate Chinatown Gateway on Northwest Fourth Avenue and West Burnside Street. — John Patrick Pullen

emphasizes local, organic ingredients.

Don't miss the fresh oyster hash and killer brioche French toast. The warm interior of ② Davis Street Tavern (500 N.W. Davis St.; 503.505.5050; www.davisstreettavern. com) channels the neighborhood's historic charms, with sandblasted Douglas fir beams and exposed brick befitting its casual fine-dining experience. Meanwhile, ③ Gilt Club (306 N.W. Broadway; 503.222.4458; www.giltclub.com) surrounds tipplers in hip elegance with plush, high-back booths and drape-covered walls that encourage patrons to cozy up with inventive cocktails

and late-night eats.



Couch St.; 503.575.9455; www. sevenplanet.com), stocks everything from aged cheddar to bike-messenger bags made of recycled inner tubes and seatbelts.



Open from March through Dec. 24, **7** Portland Saturday Market (S.W. Naito Parkway at Ankeny St.; www. portlandsaturdaymarket.com) is the largest outdoor arts and crafts market in the country, with endless varieties of handmade wares and some of the city's best peoplewatching.At 1 Lan Su Chinese Garden (239 N.W. Everett St.; 503.228.8131; portlandchinesegarden.com), wander a city-block-sized traditional Chinese garden that's filled with a tranquil array of ever-changing foliage and an authentic teahouse. And for a historical splash, climb aboard the **1 Oregon Maritime Museum** (S.W. Naito Parkway at Pine St.; 503.224.7724; www.oregonmaritimemuseum. org), which is set inside the Portland, the last operational steam-powered sternwheeler



Biscuits, gravy and otherworldly fried chicken keep comfort-food fanatics lining up at **2** Pine State Biscuits (3640 S.E. Belmont St.; 503.236.3346; pinestatebiscuits. com). Reopened in 2009 after a brief hiatus, Portland institution 3 Genoa (2832 S.E. Belmont St.; 503.238.1464; www. genoarestaurant.com) has been tempting gourmet palates for nearly 40 years. Exacting standards, farm-to-table ethics and a welcoming atmosphere keep the restaurant's prix fixe, five-course Italian meals feeling as fresh as ever.



sweeten the deal, the store shares space with bakery Saint Cupcake. At perennially cool gift shop Presents of Mind (3633 S.E. Hawthorne Blvd.; 503.230.7740; www. presentsofmind.tv), locally crafted jewelry, tees, purses, socks and bath products help line shoppers' bags.

Headlining Hawthorne Boulevard's lively nightlife is the landmark 10 Bagdad Theater & Pub (3702 S.E. Hawthorne Blvd.; 503.467.7521; www.mcmenamins. com). First opened in 1927, the palatial, Mediterranean-inspired cinema houses a seven-story movie screen showing local and independent films, which you can enjoy while sipping McMenamins microbrews and noshing on freshly baked pizza. At the Back Stage Bar, patrons can rack up a game of billiards in a soaring space behind the Bagdad's screen that's been decked out with massive textiles and vintage neon signs. A few blocks away, jazz club 1 The Blue Monk (3341 S.E. Belmont St.; 503.595.0575; www.thebluemonk.com) has opened its downstairs stage to everything from blues to belly dancing.





## CENTRAL EASTSIDE

In contrast to downtown's high-rises just across the Willamette, the Central Eastside has long been a workaday mix of warehouses, loading docks and freight car lines. In recent years, this gritty landscape has yielded a creative renaissance. Artists, microbrewers, retailers and chefs are taking a cue from the blue-collar world and rolling up their sleeves to create Portland's next hot spot. — *Brian Barker*

Once owned by local legends the McMenamin brothers, **1** Produce Row Café (204 S.E. Oak St.; 503.232.8355; www.producerowcafe.com) helped ferment Portland's microbrew revolution in the 1970s. Today, you'll find some two dozen kinds of beer on tap, plus a swank patio and a farm-fresh menu. 2 Bunk Sandwiches (621 S.E. Morrison St.; 503.477.9515; www. bunksandwiches.com) and its late-night sister, 3 Bunk Bar (1028 S.E. Water Ave.; 503.894.9708; www.bunkbar.com), are legends in the making, overseen by two chefs lauded as gurus of meat and bread. Don't miss the pulled pork with apple cabbage slaw. For more refined offerings, **4** clarklewis (1001 S.E. Water Ave.; www.clarklewispdx.com) is a standby for Northwest, French and Italian cuisine served in a hip, warmly lit industrial space.



St.; 503.335.3131; www.grasshopperstore.com), which sells books, toys and onesies that mirror the neighborhood's funky charm.

What goes with fish and chips? How about jazz and blues? Halibut's (2525) N.E. Alberta St.; 503.808.9601; no website) delivers great grub and polished live acts in its energetic, small space. Music also spills out of the (1) Alberta Rose Theatre (3000 N.E. Alberta St.; 503.719.6055; www. albertarosetheatre.com), a 1920s-era movie theater transformed into a venue for intimate acoustic performances and arthouse films. It's also home to Live Wire!, Portland's monthly live variety radio show. Motion pictures are still the top draw at the 1 Movie Marvel Museum (2728 N.E. Alberta St.; 503.280.2376; www.moviemarvelmuseum.com), thanks to an extensive collection of Hollywood memorabilia and vintage projectors.







## Horse and Rider

A trip to an Oregon City stable is a dream.

he first time I rode a horse I was terrified. The creature was massive, and I was sure I would fall off his back and be trampled. As soon as I settled into the saddle, I burst into tears.

But 12 years later, ready to conquer my childhood fears, I'm driving a quick 25 miles south of Portland to **Dream**Ridge Stables (20524 S. Ridge Road, Oregon City; 503.631.8466; www.dream ridgestable.com), an idyllic 10-acre farm lined with maple trees. Adding to the natural appeal is a good deal of history: Nearby Oregon City was the final stop on the legendary Oregon Trail, whose pioneers traveled, quite literally, by horsepower.

Owner and instructor Karen Brauer greets me warmly at the gate. She leads me into the tidy stables where I meet Elmo, the dark brown quarter horse I'll be riding today. She says his mild disposition sets beginners (or second-timers) like me at ease. And it's true. Elmo has the demeanor of a big chocolate Labrador retriever.


Brauer and another instructor help fit my bootstraps while describing important safety precautions. After a quick steering lesson, I'm ready to take the reins. Brauer reminds me to "keep my back straight and my heels down." Easier said than done. Heart racing, I mount Elmo's lofty frame.

Much to my relief, we're not headed for the trails just yet. Instead, we duck into one of the two indoor arenas for a half-hour of instruction and plenty of pointers on how to communicate with the horse. Here Brauer can safely gauge her customers' abilities. She says that she's happy to tailor the experience to my comfort level. (Translation: I can chicken out anytime I wish.) But when she mentions that she has taught riders as young as 3, grandmothers in their 80s and even horse lovers who

have come from far-flung places like France and Germany, I decide I'm game for more.

I squeeze my legs into Elmo's tawny belly, click my tongue twice and say, "Trot." Elmo speeds up, and together we lumber around a line of tall training poles. Within minutes I discover that Elmo responds to even the slightest tug at the reins, and I begin to think that a horse is a little like a convertible Ford Mustang. When we reach the end of the line, I pull the reins back and firmly say, "Halt." Elmo stops on a dime. "I think I might be ready to hit the trails," I say.



Brauer is thrilled that I want to keep riding. And before I know it, we're pointing our mounts toward the trails. The terrain on the ridge beneath us becomes rocky, and the Douglas firs create a shadowy canopy above. I inhale the dewy scent of the forest and let out a deep sigh. Elmo does the same. We've found our rhythm.

We reach a clearing that reveals a sweeping valley and the lower Cascade Mountains to the east. On clear days, the ridges here reveal views of snowcapped volcanoes, including Mount Hood and Mount St. Helens. I pull

Elmo's reins to halt; I can't take my gaze from the autumn-bronzed leaves and violet wildflowers — and there are more than 50 acres of trails to explore. It's no wonder so many people hitched up their wagons and set out to discover this land.

We eventually return, with Elmo and me leading the line of horses. We move seamlessly, and I'm increasing speed. As we approach the stables, three freshly groomed horses crane their necks and perk up their ears. They can hear Brauer's voice, and they're prancing in place.

We finish the day by feeding and brushing the manes of these happy horses. As I stand below Elmo — his long brown nose, streaked with a splash of white, draped over my shoulder — I tell him that I'm already looking forward to the next ride.

## Flight Fantastic

Safely tethered, you'll fall head over heels for this new aerial obstacle course.

'm soaring through the treetops like a flying squirrel, dangling from a pulley and rocketing down a wire rope that's strung at an angle between two building-size trees. Call this the "Jump" portion of Hop, Skip & a Jump, one of a half-dozen routes - color-coded and named like ski runs - at Tree to Tree Adventure Park (2975 S.W. Nelson Road, Gaston; 503.357.0109; www.treetotree adventurepark.com), an aerial obstacle course that combines the childhood thrill of tree climbing with zip lines, rope and tire swings, trapezes, ladders and tightropes.

The brainchild of entrepreneurs Julie and Gerry Beres, recent transplants from upstate New York, the 26acre park and its strict safety protocol (guests wear helmets and climbing harnesses that are double-tethered to an overhead wire) is modeled after a similar course in the Adirondacks.

"These parks are really popular in the United Kingdom and France and only recently moved across the pond and into Canada and the United States," explains Julie, a former real estate developer who decided to tap into the market for aerial adventure in

tree-blessed Oregon. And Hagg Lake (50250 S.W. Scoggins Valley Road, Gaston; 503.846.8715; www.co. washington.or.us), a 1,200-acre troutstocked reservoir in North Willamette Valley wine country, provided the ideal setting. "People come to Hagg Lake to boat, bicycle and swim, so why not another outdoor adventure?" she asks.

Plenty of thrill-seekers are lining up to prove her right. On an average day during the park's March-November

season, as many as 70 people run the course, including adrenaline-driven professionals like firefighters, teambuilding office types, children (there's a special kids' course just a few feet off the ground) and couples looking for a more inspired alternative to the usual dinner and a movie. Today, an entire cadre of Dockers-clad engineers from a nearby tech company is cavorting in the trees high overhead.

As many as seven guides patrol the

grounds like lifeguards, occasionally calling out tips to help adventurers navigate the more difficult sections. These include the crux of a double-black diamond route dubbed Leap of Faith, which I eventually discover requires jumping from a tightrope and onto a platform — more than five stories off the ground.

Hoarse from involuntarily yodeling like Tarzan and quaking at the knees with excitement, I land with a thud on

a wooden platform where I meet Curt Landis, a forty-something cabinetmaker who's wearing a grin befitting the Kool-Aid Man that festoons his red T-shirt.

"There's nothing like the feeling you get being up in the trees," he says, clipping into another safety line before descending a rope ladder to a lower platform where his wife, Tammy, sporting a matching Kool-Aid T-shirt — and mile-wide grin — steps onto a trapeze and vaults into the void.

Then he follows, yelling, "THIS IS SO COOL!"

I couldn't agree more.

## **COLUMBIA RIVER GORGE**

## Legend of the Falls

Feast your eyes on the gorge's scenic waterfalls.

ed by glaciers and swollen by snowmelt and prodigious winter rains, the waterfalls of the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area - an 80-milelong swath carved out by ancient floodwaters – plunge from sheer cliffs, hidden slot canyons and rock grottos rimmed by massive trees and moss in a thousand shades of emerald and jade. In all, 90 major cascades flow here, alongside countless other smaller falls. Luckily for visitors, many of these misty gems are accessible year-round, either by short hikes or from roadside pullouts on the Historic Columbia River Highway (www.byways.org) which parallels Interstate 84.

Multnomah Falls (503.695.2372; www.fs.usda.gov/crgnsa), located just 30 minutes east of Portland on I-84 (Exit 31), is Oregon's most visited site for a reason. A short walk from the large parking lot, you'll see the lacy sheet of water dropping a staggering 620 feet before a natural amphitheater

of dark basalt. A stone arch bridge above the falls' lower tier and the rustic 1920s-era Multnomah Falls Lodge tie the scene together. Don't expect to be alone here, but do expect to be wowed. A little more than a mile up the paved trail, you'll reach a scenic overlook above the falls, and above the crowds. Avid hikers can continue on a challenging 5.4-mile loop past four more waterfalls. Back at the lodge, the visitor center offers

insights about the area's many falls and its fascinating geological history.

Less than two miles to the east on the historic highway, **Lower Oneonta Falls** appeals to the adventurous: To find the 100-foot falls, hikers must pick their way over a log jam and wade hip-deep through an icy stream in a funnel of slender canyon walls.

In contrast, to enjoy the adjacent 176-foot **Horsetail Falls**, simply roll down the car window and feel the mist wafting from this gusher near a pullout between mileposts 34 and 35. If you want to get your boots dirty, head past the trailhead here to **Ponytail Falls**, an 80-foot spray set in a shaded basalt bowl. Hike another two miles uphill for a look at **Triple Falls**.

Further east on I-84, the immensely popular Eagle Creek Trail (Exit 41) holds a trove of splendor, including springtime wildflowers, high canyon walls, huge trees and seven dramatic waterfalls. Longer hikes are required to see all the chutes, as is some fortitude: The cliff-lined path is narrow, so acrophobes should sit this one out. For a quick sample of the trail's bounty, hike two miles to sublime Lower Punchbowl Falls, which plunges 15 feet into a green pool lined with sunstruck river rocks.

Families in search of falls can do no better than a trip to multitiered

Wahclella Falls (Exit 40). Tucked into a towering box canyon, the easy one-mile trail along Tanner

Creek is speckled with wildflowers and small swimming holes. At the falls, iridescent lichen-cloaked boulders line the basin, and a small beach invites tykes to splash their feet.

For another perspective on the river, check out the **Bonneville Lock** and Dam (*Exit 40; 541.374.8820; www. nwp.usace.army.mil*) and its different kind of waterfalls: fish ladders. Watch from overhead platforms and through underwater windows as giant salmon wiggle and leap upstream right before your eyes, leaving a lasting impression of the gorge's rushing water.

## High & Mighty

Historic Timberline Lodge is a timeless treasure.

et more than a mile high on the flanks of Oregon's tallest mountain, 11,239-foot Mount Hood, **Timberline Lodge** (503.272.3311; www.timberlinelodge. com) was never meant to stand out. "It was our hope not to detract from the great natural beauty of the area," explained Forest Service architect Linn Forrest years after he helped to construct the lodge in 1937. "The entire exterior was made to blend as nearly as possible with the mountainside."

And did they ever nail it. Built at the height of Great Depression as a Works Progress Administration project, the lodge was crafted from giant ponderosa pines and basalt boulders that were gathered on site and hewn into a structure that tucks into the slopes as naturally as a stand of fir trees.

Yet Timberline has always been a beacon to skiers, hikers and anyone else who passes by these parts. And on the eve of its 75th anniversary in 2012, Timberline is set to sparkle like never before, with \$4 million in federal


stimulus funds dedicated to restoring the national historic landmark's floors and exterior.

The lodge's menu may see some respectful updates soon, too, as new

executive chef Jason Stoller Smith succeeds 31-year veteran Leif Eric Benson in the lodge's kitchen. One thing that won't change: one-of-a-kind dining experiences like the exclusive Winemaker's Dinner Series, which pairs a six-course meal with Oregon wines high above the main lodge in the rustic Silcox Hut. Outside, the lodge's famed access to year-round skiing is being expanded. Plans are in the works for a lift-accessed, summer mountain bike park designed by the crew behind the world-famous Whistler Mountain Bike

Park in British Columbia.

But when you're looking for reasons to celebrate Timberline, nothing seems to top a puppy. In 2010 Timberline welcomed Heidi, the latest in a storied line of Saint Bernards who have served as official mascots for the lodge. The friendly hounds have greeted millions of visitors here over the years and have become as much a beloved complement to the mountain's landscape as the lodge itself.

Boat, bike and bird-watch in Columbia County.

mere 20 miles from the lights of Portland sits the tucked-away countryside of Columbia County. Here, the pace of life is as calm as the ebb and flow of the tides in Scappoose Bay, a glassy side channel that lazily siphons water from the county's namesake, the mighty Columbia River. With quiet back roads stretching past scenic farmland, the diverse area is ripe for a variety of outdoor adventures.

One of the easiest ways to start is with Scappoose Bay Kayaking (www. scappoosebaykayaking.com), which offers kayak veterans and novices alike guided tours of the area, as well as boat rentals. Paddlers can slip quietly into the secluded marshes of the bay for prime bird-watching, or venture to the western tip of bird-rich Sauvie Island, the site of a 19th-century shipbuilding operation that's now home to river otters, bald eagles and a host of migratory birds. Also on offer: Multiday guided trips down the Columbia, trailed by a 24-foot heated pontoon boat loaded with fresh salmon and other fixings to provide paddlers with a full gourmet spread. "We call it our 'bloat and float," jokes owner Steve Gibbons.

Bird-watchers can also sate their appetites around **Vernonia Lake** (*www.vernonia-or.gov*). A former mill pond for Oregon-American Lumber Company, the largest outfit of its kind during the early 20th century, this trout-stocked body of water attracts colorful rufous hummingbirds and the black-headed grosbeak, whose bright orange plumage belies its rather mundane name. And come winter,

there's even more reason to visit: Massive flocks of elegant snow geese swoop down into the lake to take rest before heading farther south. Visitors can see these and other birds while walking along the easily accessible nature trail that encircles the lake. (Hikers, take note: Be sure to check the trailhead for information on daily parking permits.)

The lake is on the **Columbia Loop** (www.willamettebirding.org), part of the Willamette Valley Birding Trail. Passing through farmland and forest and down to the Columbia River, the route offers ample opportunities to view raptors, rainforest species and migrating waterfowl.

Cyclists flock to Columbia County, too. From Vernonia, riders can choose one of two new routes. The **Crown Zellerbach Trail**, a reclaimed logging road, offers mountain bikers 17 miles of rugged path descending to Scappoose. From there, it's less than 10 miles to shopping and dining in the historic "Olde Towne" district of St. Helens. Vernonia is also connected via an extension trail to the **Banks**-

Vernonia State Trail (www. oregonstateparks.org), one of the region's premier cycling paths. This 21-mile, multiuse, fully paved path is the state's first completed "rails-to-trails" project, repurposing a route that was once used to haul lumber from old-growth forests to Portland. Most popular with cyclists, the trail also draws walkers and equestrians, but birds like the red-capped pileated woodpecker far outnumber people.

The prodigious flora and fauna along the trail provide a welcome respite from civilization, while the rough-shod wooden struts of the 600-foot-long Buxton train trestle serve as reminders of an age when raw industry ruled the land in these parts. Such encounters are likely to make you appreciate the surrounding wilderness that much more.



## Grape Escape

Sip in the views of Yamhill County's wine country.

he Willamette Valley, justly famous for its world-class Pinot noirs, has six distinct grape-growing regions, or American Viticultural Areas. One of them, Yamhill-Carlton, boasts a concentration of superb wineries — 30 at last count — nearly all within an easy drive of Portland.

Off Highway 99W in Carlton, the spectacular **Anne Amie Vineyards** (6580 N.E. Mineral Springs Road, Carlton; 503.864.2991; www.anneamie. com; \$10 tasting fee; open daily March-Dec., weekends Jan.-Feb.) is high on a

ridge with sweeping views of the Coast Range. Soak in the scenery, then settle into the barrel-lined tasting room with a complex L'iris Pinot noir or a crisp, pear-scented Pinot gris.

At Lemelson Vineyards (12020 N.E. Stag Hollow Road, Carlton; 503.852.6619; www.lemelsonvineyards. com; \$10 tasting fee; open Thur.-Mon.), Eric Lemelson tends six organic vineyards and employs a unique mobile platform for precision grape sorting. Such attention to detail results in extraordinary Pinots (and a striking reserve neutral-oak Chardonnay).

In nearby Yamhill, **WillaKenzie Estate** (19143 Laughlin Road, Yamhill;
503.662.3280; www.willakenzie.com;
\$15 tasting fee; open daily) is known for
sourcing its Pinot varietals solely from
its own 420-acre property. Don't miss
the earthy Jory Hills Pinot noir, aged
for 12 months in French oak, and a buttery 2009 Chardonnay, once reserved
for the owner's personal collection.

Not every visit has to involve wine, however. **Kookoolan Farms** (*15713 Highway 47, Yamhill; 503.730.7535;*  www.kookoolanfarms.com), a familyrun organic farm, offers crash courses in the slow-food lifestyle. Dive right in with relaxed pursuits like cheesemaking: Offerings such as Mozzarella 101, Washed Curds and Italian Hard Cheeses include generous tastings paired with homemade kombucha tea.

Posh digs like the Allison Inn & Spa (2525 Allison Lane, Newberg; 503.554.2525; www.theallison.com) make spending an entire weekend in the valley a tempting possibility. First-class service is matched with a standout restaurant, a full spa, and spacious rooms where fireplaces and shoji-screened baths create a Tokyomeets-wilderness-lodge vibe.

Accommodations at the Inn at Red Hills (1410 N. Highway 99W, Dundee; 503.538.7666; www.innatredhills.com) are less formal. But with touches like glass-tile showers, hardwood floors and leather ottomans, luxury still rules. And each room provides multiple views of the countryside, which means plenty of chances to raise a toast to this wondrously verdant valley.

## **A Perfect** Caper

The Oregon Coast's Three Capes Drive is a natural escape. By Lora Shinn

orget stopping to smell the roses: It's time to sniff the sea air. Stretching some 30 miles from Tillamook to Pacific City, Oregon's Three Capes Drive parallels some of the country's most dramatic coastline. Along the way, each stop reveals a mesmerizing array of wavethrashed cliffs, cloud-sashed mountains and unspoiled beaches. Drive it from the north. Tour it from the south. The only way to go wrong is to rush.

Seventy miles west of Portland in Tillamook, red-barn-dotted dairy farms, not beaches, are king. This fact is driven

home inside the Tillamook Cheese Factory (4185 Highway 101 North; Tillamook; 800.542.7290; www. tillamookcheese.com), where you can take a self-guided tour of the cheesemaking process and, more important, sample some of the 38 flavors of ice cream. The Tillamook Air Museum (6030 Hangar Road, Tillamook; 503.842.1130: www.tillamookair.com) also makes a worthy detour. Built in 1942, the imposing wooden hangar rises 15 stories and houses more than two dozen vintage war planes.

Eight miles west stands Cape Meares (www.oregonstateparks.org), a rocky headland 200 feet above the Pacific. Walk down a short, paved path to tour the historic lighthouse. Watch for seals and Steller sea lions, as well as migrating gray whales (nearly 18,000 pass Oregon's shores annually).


From Cape Meares, take Bayshore Drive south to Oceanside. Dig your toes into the sand and view Three Arch Rocks National Wildlife Refuge (www. fws.gov/oregoncoast/3archrocks). A half-mile offshore, these photogenic sea stacks host thousands of birds.

To the south, Cape Lookout State Park (www.oregonstateparks.org) draws hikers and campers with its large selection of campsites - and stunning natural beauty. The park sits on a sand spit dividing the ocean and Netarts Bay and offers miles of trails through old-growth rain forest.

At the southern end of the Three Capes Drive, Pacific City and the beach at Cape Kiwanda (www.oregonstate parks.org) are ideal for unwinding. Nab a spot on the back deck of Pelican Pub & Brewery (33180 Cape Kiwanda Drive, Pacific City; 503.965.7007; www. pelicanbrewery.com) and gaze at the vast, craggy face of Haystack Rock. Beneath the rock, surfers harness the swells and dory fishermen haul in catches of halibut and salmon.





## STREET SWEEPS

## PORTLAND'S MONTHLY ART WALKS KNOCK ART LOVERS OFF THEIR FEET.

By Anna Sachse

Portland's art scene isn't something that's easy to pin down. For proof, look no further than the city's beloved art walks. Held on the first and last Thursday, and first Friday, of every month, these events bring art to the streets and sidewalks. Serious collectors mingle with families, students and legions of artists as one and all stream past a collage of studios, street performers, airy cafés, boutiques and tables loaded with local crafts. Call it community at its creative height.

## **FIRST THURSDAY**

Portland's art-walk pioneer, First Thursday (www. firstthursdayportland.com), which began some 25 years ago, winds its way from the stylish Pearl District to the brick storefronts of Old Town to bustling downtown.

Charles Froelick, owner of Froelick Gallery (714 N.W. Davis St.; 503.222.1142; www.froelickgallery.com), a contemporary art gallery in the Pearl, says he's watched First Thursday transition from a decidedly local event into one that lures buyers from around the world. "Portland has truly gifted — and affordable — artists who are just embarking on their careers," he says, while noting that they're often cutting their teeth alongside seasoned players whose works also hang in museums.

## COMMAND PERFORMANCE

Portland's dance, theater and music companies draw rave reviews.

Creativity takes many forms in Portland. Whether you prefer straightforward entertainment, thought-provoking dramas or something entirely different, the town's crowdpleasing companies always deliver.

The celebrated **Oregon Ballet Theatre** (www.obt.org; 503.222.5538; September-April) wows audiences and critics with classics, original works and edgy collaborations, while **BodyVox** (www.bodyvox.com; 503.229.0627; October-May) presents imaginative, modern dance. **White Bird Dance** (www.whitebird.org; 503.245.1600; September-March) regularly brings innovative choreographers from around the world to Portland.

Theater companies like **Artists Repertory Theatre** (www.artistsrep.org; 503.241.1278;
September-May) and **Portland Center Stage** (www.pcs.org; 503.445.3700; September-June)
produce acclaimed works and groundbreaking premieres. **Broadway Across America** (www.broadwayacrossamerica.com/portland; 503.241.1802) lets you see the hottest musicals in the nation right in downtown Portland.

Traditionalists and casual fans alike will appreciate the anything-but-stuffy approach of the **Portland Opera** (www.portlandopera.org; 503.241.1802; September-April), while works from classical to pop fill out the repertoire of the **Oregon Symphony** (www.orsymphony.org; 503.228.1353; September-May). And the summer concerts presented by **Chamber Music Northwest** (www.cmnw.org; 503.294. 6400; June-July) come complete with catered picnics under the trees. — Karen Martwick





From April to November, many of those new talents can be found on Northwest 13th Avenue, when it's closed to traffic for the open-air First Thursday Street Gallery. Indoors,

galleries like Elizabeth Leach (417 N.W. Ninth Ave.; 503.224.0521; www.elizabethleach.com) and Butters Gallery (520 N.W. Davis St.; 800.544.9171; www.buttersgallery. com) showcase sophisticated works in media from paint to clay to wood.

### LAST THURSDAY

Although Last Thursday (lastthursdaypdx.ning.com) is a year-round affair, the event hits its creative stride in summer, when a nearly mile-long stretch of Northeast Alberta Street is closed off for a friendly flash mob of artists. You're also apt to find works for sale inside cafés, bars, pet stores and shoe shops.

The cheerful scene is a recent phenomenon, says **Guardino Gallery** (2939 N.E. Alberta St.; 503.281.9048; www.guardinogallery.com) co-owner Donna Guardino, who helped launch Last Thursday in the 1990s.

"Back then the area was like a Wild West town," says Guardino. "But we saw the possibilities." And now that the area is booming, she says there's a renewed focus on staying local.
"Most of the galleries here are
owner-occupied," says Guardino,
"which means visitors get to meet
the real people behind the art."


### FIRST FRIDAY

Founded in 2004, First Friday (www.firstfridayart.com) is the city's widest-ranging art-walk event. Set in the Central Eastside Art District's five separate areas, the event boasts close to three dozen galleries and studios and other venues to explore.

Established galleries like
23 Sandy (623 N.E. 23rd Ave.;
503.927.4409; www.23sandy.com)
anchor the scene, but what sets
First Friday apart is the focus
on edgier, emerging studios and
galleries, says Julia Gardner, chair
of the Central Eastside Art District.
Under-the-radar venues such as
Studio 2507 (2507 S.E. Clinton St.;
503.957.6800; www.studio2507.
com) and the newly opened
Fourteen 30 Contemporary (922


S.E. Ankeny St.; www.fourteen30. com) showcase alternative-media artists who aren't afraid to take creative chances.

"Many of these venues also feature guest curators," says Gardner, "which means the spaces aren't limited to a single vision." Considering its aesthetic richness and variety, she could almost be describing Portland itself.

## **BEST DRESSED**

PORTLAND DESIGNERS OFFER SHARP STYLE, SANS SALES TAX.

Portland local Janeane Marie Ceccanti's designs are the perfect infusion of the city elements that surround her: sleek, fashion-forward and eco-conscious. Ceccanti, a competitor on season seven of Project Runway (a reality TV show that has already crowned three winners from the Portland area), has a keen eye and skilled hand for sophisticated cuts and thoughtful details. Honored as an emerging designer during Portland Fashion Week 2009, she makes frocks that

are celebrated throughout the city. So when it comes to her own closet, where does this style maven search out her duds? Locally, of course. Here are five of Ceccanti's favorite Portland shops, each with looks that are guaranteed to get you noticed in any city.

## **EAST SIDE**

Hawthorne neighborhood shop Local 35 (3556 S.E. Hawthorne Blvd.; 503.963.8200; www.local35.com) stocks heritage brands like Pendleton alongside popculture pulse-readers such as Los Angeles' Warriors of Radness. Still, the carefully culled selection makes pulling off a cohesive look a snap, says Ceccanti. "All of their pieces really have an urban shape," she explains.

## **BRAND CAMPAIGN**

Famous designer labels are easy to come by in Portland.

Portland is nothing if not passionate about its local shops. But make no mistake: the Rose City's roster of nationally known brand names runs plenty deep, too.

The blocks surrounding Pioneer Courthouse Square have grown into the city's signature retail district. Macy's, Nordstrom and Tiffany & Co. are just a few of the names you can spot along these tree-lined streets. But the newest - and arguably splashiest — addition is Swedish retailer **H&M** (850 S.W. Fifth Ave.; 503.241.0257; www.hm.com), with three floors devoted to chic-on-the-cheap threads.

H&M is one of more than 70 retailers in Pioneer Place (700 S.W. Fifth Ave.; 503.228.5800; www.pioneerplace.com). Other favorites include renowned designers **Betsey** Johnson, Kate Spade and Louis Vuitton, not to mention an Apple Store.

Portland is loaded in the outdoors department, too. The flagship store of local legend Columbia Sportswear (911 S.W. Broadway; 503.226.6800; www.columbia.com) is right downtown, with Mountain Hardwear (722 S.W. Taylor St.; 503.226.6868; www.mountainhardwear.com) just around the corner. In the Pearl District, Icebreaker Touch Lab (1109 W. Burnside St.; 503.241.8300; www.icebreaker.com) is the first U.S. location for New Zealand's purveyor of sleek wool activewear. - Meghan Hilliard





Listed among GQ magazine's "Best of the West" shops, it's also a go-to for local handmade jewelry and accessories, like eyeglasses made of sustainably harvested rosewood, to help cap your ensemble.

Assembled like a gallery of style to-do's, Una (2802 S.E. Ankeny St.; 503.235.2326; no website) is a showcase for original works. "What you find here are gorgeous pieces that you aren't necessarily going to see on the streets," Ceccanti says of owner Giovanna Parolari's collection. Ceccanti recommends the silk and cotton shawls, each offered in vivacious palettes that add a punch of color into a gray day.

## NORTHWEST PORTLAND

Portland is loaded with great vintage stores. But when Ceccanti wants to be assured of scoring a treasure, she heads for Keep 'Em Flying (518 N.W. 21st Ave.; 503.221.0601; no website). The walls of Pamela Springfield's tucked-away gem are lined with mainly pre-1980 selections, including beautiful millinery, ornate jackets, dresses, blouses and men's suits poised for a Mad Men casting call. Ceccanti especially favors the shop's footwear selection: "I can always find boots in my size," she says. To spot the shop, look for the frocks hanging from the tree outside.

## **MORE THAN**

In addition to tax-free savings, these shopping centers all offer enticing extras.

The power shopper who craves one-stop retail satisfaction plus a little something more should try these destinations in and around town. — Karen Martwick

**LLOYD CENTER** Oregon's largest shopping center houses 200 stores, an eight-screen movie house and an indoor ice rink (which happens to be where former U.S. champion Tonya Harding learned to skate). Lloyd Center is within Portland's "Free Rail Zone," so the sevenminute ride to and from downtown on MAX light rail is free. N.E. Ninth Ave. and Multnomah St.; 503.282.25 | 1; www.lloydcentermall.com

**BRIDGEPORT VILLAGE** Let the valet handle parking while you browse the 50-plus stores — from major names like Saks Off Fifth to local favorites like



### DOWNTOWN

How hip is grandmother Connie Codding? Her downtown shop, Frances May (1013 S.W. Washington St.; 503.227.3402; www.francesmay.com), which she opened with her Pratt Institutetrained daughter Pamela Baker-Miller in 2008, has been namedropped by everyone from *Lucky* magazine to the London Times. Ceccanti adds to the accolades by calling out the pair's attention to garment construction, lines and fit. Look for modern dresses and shoes by Rachel Comey and Rag & Bone waxed canvas jackets.

### PEARL DISTRICT

Among the more than two dozen independent designers' works offered inside unisex boutique Parallel (1022A N.W. Johnson St.; 503.274.8882; www. parallelportland.com) you'll find some of Ceccanti's own pieces. Pair her dynamic prints and futuristic jackets with a cashmere scarf from Julie Park. Parallel also stocks effortlessly cool Hunter rain galoshes — staples in many a local's closet.

Mario's 3.10 — in this open-air mall 11 miles south of Portland. Wind down with dinner at one of 10 restaurants and a movie at the 18-screen theater. 7455 S.W. Bridgeport Road, Tigard; 503.968.1704; www.bridgeport-village.com





## **SPOKE CITY**

THEY SAY EVERYTHING IS CYCLICAL. IN PORTLAND, THAT'S NEVER BEEN MORE TRUE.

With 300-plus miles of designated bike lanes and trails and the most bike commuters in the nation, cycling is a way of life in Portland. For visitors, it's simply the best way to see the city at street level. And with more than 10 shops with bikes ready to rent (p. 67) and several hotels offering free loaners, it's easy — and cheap — to join the two-wheeled revolution.

#### **CRUISING ALLOWED**

Portland's most relaxing bike ride includes a cruise along the Eastbank Esplanade, the star attraction in a 2.6-mile loop between the Hawthorne and Steel bridges, offering close-up views of downtown and the Willamette River. After a circuit or two, bikers can continue upstream via the Springwater Corridor Trail, a former rail line that runs along Oaks Bottom Wildlife Refuge, home to one of the nation's largest urban colonies of blue herons.

#### **GARDEN** VARIETY

Portland's green spaces are a feast for the senses.

#### **BEST PLACE TO SMELL THE ROSES**

Portland's International Rose Test Garden, the oldest official continuously operated public rose test garden in the United States, boasts more than 8,000 roses and spectacular views of the skyline and Mount Hood. The best rose-viewing months are May-September. 400 S.W. Kingston Ave. (in Washington Park); 503.823.3636; www.portlandparks.org

BEST PICNIC SPOT Where better to unfurl a picnic blanket than Portland's highest point? From atop Council Crest, you can take in views of as many as five snowy volcanoes, as well as downtown Portland. At the end of S.W. Council Crest Drive; www.portlandparks.org

BEST URBAN PARK A public plaza built atop a parking garage, Director Park draws a vibrant lunchtime crowd that dines on offerings from the on-site café and nearby food carts. On warm days, families splash in the gentle jets of water shooting from a circular fountain. 815 S.W. Park Ave.; www.portlandparks.org

**BEST ESCAPE** Perched above the Rose Garden in Washington Park, the Portland Japanese Garden has been called one of the most authentic gardens of its kind outside of Japan. Intimate walkways and meandering streams lace the five distinct gardens. 611 S.W. Kingston Ave.; 503.223.1321; www.japanesegarden.com

#### PARK AND RIDE

The Springwater Corridor heads 20 miles out of town, but mountain bikers usually turn off at mile 12 and head up to Powell Butte Nature Park, which boasts nine miles of well-marked trails. A ride up this extinct cinder cone volcano is oxygen-depleting but rewarding - reach the summit on a clear day, and you'll be treated to views of five volcanic peaks.

Powell Butte might have a rep for Portland's best mountain biking, but it's not the city's biggest parkland. That would be Forest Park, with 27 miles of trails and fire roads offering varying grades and challenges. (Watch for trail signs marking legal bike paths.) Most bikers enter the park on Leif Erikson Drive at the top of Northwest Thurman Street, where a five-mile ride straight up leads to a view of snowy Mount Adams.

#### SAUVIE ISLAND



#### **ROAD RULES**

Cyclists who ride north on Highway 30 can choose their own adventure in terms of distance and difficulty. Hill-seekers can take a left and climb any of the winding slopes up to Northwest Skyline Boulevard, where sweeping views of Mount Hood and Mount St. Helens (and an easy descent) are waiting as a reward. Iron-thighed riders can tackle super-steep Logie Trail Road, which rises more than 1,000 feet in less than three miles, while Cornelius Pass Road is the better choice for



tamer rides.

Also found on Highway 30 is a bridge to **Sauvie Island** (www. sauvieisland.org), which lies only 10 miles from Portland's Northwest Industrial District but a world away in terms of tranquility and natural charm.

There, the loop road passes berry farms and pumpkin patches and provides access to a string of sandy Columbia River beaches.

#### **NO NEED TO BYOB**

Tour operators and rental shops will get you rolling like a local.

For guided bike tours, two outfitters have you covered. **Portland Bicycle Tours** (345 N.W. Everett St.; 503.360.6815; www. portlandbicycletours.com) leads rides around several bridges, breweries and parks of Portland; **Pedal Bike Tours** 


(133 S.W. Second Ave.; 503.877.2453; www. pedalbiketours.com) provides coffee- and volcano-themed jaunts in town and trips to the wine country and the Columbia River

Gorge. Both companies also offer custom-designed tours.

To explore the city on your own, Waterfront Bikes (10 S.W. Ash St.; 503.227.1719; www.waterfrontbikes.net) provides rentals and necessary accessories including a pump, a helmet and a bike bag. At the Fat Tire Farm bike shop (2714 N.W. Thurman St.; 503.222.3276; www.fattirefarm. com) located near Forest Park, you'll find top-notch mountain bikes.

Local bike maps are available at the Travel Portland Information Center in downtown's Pioneer Courthouse Square. And you'll find cyclist-submitted tours from around the region at **Ride Oregon Ride** (www.rideoregonride.com).



## **TRUE BREW**

TAP INTO PORTLAND'S YEAR-ROUND STATE OF "BEERVANA."

On a warm, breezy Portland evening, there's no better way to blend in with the locals than by sipping a refreshing, mahogany-tinted pint of Old Silenius Ale in the courtyard of Migration Brewing Co. (2828 N.E. Glisan St.; 503.206.5221; www.migrationbrewing. com). Here, at one of the town's newest brewpubs, you can receive the sudsy sacrament under the shade of a repurposed boat sail among some of the most devout beer drinkers in America.

In the city that churns out more craft-brewed suds than any other, exceptional beer has become the rule. For the residents of "Beervana," it seems that only an ever-expanding roster of brewers and flavors will do.

The smell of bubbling malt swirls freely about the city, where nearly 40 breweries are now in full swing. You can follow your nose to the steaming brew kettles of Oregon's oldest operating craft brewery, **BridgePort Brewing** (1313 N.W. Marshall St.; 503.241.3612; www.bridgeportbrew.com), located at the north end of the Pearl District. Started in 1984 in a former rope factory, the vast industrial space has been artfully remade into a thriving brewpub. On the city's east side, you'll find the state's largest brewery:

## STAGE PRESENCE

Portland's vibrant music scene is on full display at these venues.

Portland's collection of A-list musicians — indierock heroes the Decemberists, neo-tango-band sophisticates Pink Martini, punk combo the Thermals, just to name a few — is nothing if not varied. Likewise, the Rose City boasts a wide array of music halls.

Legendary jazz drummer Mel Brown, with his septet, quartet and B3 organ group, is in residence three nights a week at Jimmy Mak's (221 N.W. 10th Ave.; 503.295.6542; www.jimmymaks.com). The Pearl District club has been ranked by Down Beat magazine as one of the top 100 places in the world to hear jazz. On the east side, the rocket-ship-meets-logcabin décor of the Doug Fir Lounge (830 E. Burnside St.; 503.231.9663; www.dougfirlounge. com) exudes chic charm. Expect a regular lineup of nationally and internationally known indie bands, often buoyed by trend-setting local openers. The vibe is also fiercely independent at Mississippi Studios (3939 N. Mississippi Ave.; 503.288.3895; www.mississippistudios.com) in North Portland. Shows at this recording studio/performance space have included mellow record-release parties and a unique mash-up between the Oregon Ballet Theatre and a local folk band.

When the sun is shining, **Edgefield** (2126 S.W. Halsey St., Troutdale; 503.669.8610; www. edgefieldconcerts.com) reigns supreme. Located on the site of a historic poorhouse and farm, the venue is part of the McMenamins empire of interesting sites masterfully restored as hotel resorts. Just 20 minutes east of Portland by car, Edgefield has a popular summer Concerts on the Lawn series that's hosted everyone from the Doobie Brothers to Vampire Weekend.

Widmer Brothers (929 N. Russell St.; 503.281.3333; www.widmer. com), makers of the famous golden hefeweizen that first popularized wheat beer in America.

If you enjoy your beer with a side of local history, don't miss the dozens of pubs operated by the McMenamin brothers (www.mcmenamins.com). You'll find their trademark beers and pub fare at locations that include reclaimed historic buildings such as the Kennedy School (5736 N.E. 33rd Ave.; 503.249.3983) — once an elementary school, now a hotel complete with a saltwater soaking pool — and Southeast Portland's iconic Bagdad Theater & Pub (3702 S.E. Hawthorne Blvd.; 503.467.7521), a restored 1920s movie house.

Yet Portlanders' thirst for something new persists. The freshly

#### minted Cascade Barrel House

(939 S.E. Belmont St.; 503.265.8603; www.cascade brewing barrelhouse.com) is particularly interesting, serving beers aged for up to 18 months in oak barrels and lambic-style sour beers flavored with apricot or cherry.

Another popular newcomer is Upright Brewing (240 N. Broadway; 503.735.5337; www. uprightbrewing.com), tucked away in the basement of the Leftbank Building across from the Rose Garden arena. The tasting room, open only Friday through Sunday (and before weekday Trail Blazers home games), is where those in the know quaff pints of Belgianinspired, farmhouse-style ales in what feels like the Batcave of Portland beerdom.




And with the heart of American hops production (the Yakima and Willamette valleys) just a short distance away, Beervana is also graced with an annual bloom of uncommon, aromatic ales made with farm-fresh hops, rather than the more traditional dried buds. Look for the fresh-hop ales at local taprooms (such as Laurelwood Brewing, 5115 N.E. Sandy Blvd.; 503.282.0622; www. laurelwoodbrewpub.com) for a brief period each October, shortly after harvest time.

Hop season is followed by the march of spiced, dark winter beers, showcased at the Holiday Ale Fest (www.holidayale.com) the first week in December. Beneath the majestically decorated tree in Pioneer Courthouse Square, brewers pour more than 50 varieties of fortifying brews.

But without question the town's signature beer event is the Oregon Brewers Festival (www. oregonbrewfest.com), held on the last full weekend of July. ## PLAN A FAMILY WEEKEND WITHOUT WHEELS IN PORTLAND.

Norman Rockwell had it wrong: Families don't need to jam into a giant sedan in search of fun. At least not in Portland. Here, just your own two feet and a sense of adventure (and maybe a bike or two) will do. Hop on Portland's rails, cycle-ready paths and futuristic aerial tram, and discover why kids of all ages fall for the Rose City.

#### DAY I

Begin the morning with a short ride on the MAX Blue or Red light rail line (www.trimet.org/max) from downtown to Washington Park. You'll disembark in Robertson Tunnel — at 260 feet below the surface, it's the deepest transit station in North America. Back up at ground level, choose from three fantastic family options located right outside the station.

The 64-acre **Oregon Zoo** (4001 S.W. Canyon Road; 503.226.1561; www.oregonzoo.org) brings the world to you — scour Africa's savannahs for lions, Asia's jungles for elephants, and North America's forests for bald eagles and cougars. A vintage miniature train also


Post-OMSI, take a quiet trail ride along the adjacent Springwater Corridor, a paved bike path with a stretch along the river. In less than three miles you'll encounter Oaks Bottom Wildlife Refuge

(www.portlandparks.org), a 140acre wetland park that shelters hundreds of species of birds including Portland's official flier, the stately great blue heron. Just across from the wildlife area, a haven of retro-fueled fun awaits at Oaks Amusement Park (7805 S.E. Oaks Park Way; 503.233.5777; www.oakspark.com), home to a Ferris wheel, roller coasters, a roller-skating rink and an antique carousel.

After turning in your stylin' cycles, you could enjoy sweet

Wind down — or rev up — at one of Portland's iconic coffeehouses.


You'll have no trouble finding outposts of the familiar green-and-white coffee purveyor in Portland, but locals are fiercely loyal to homegrown cafés. Take a break from sightseeing and drink in a little local flavor at one of these quintessential locales.

On your way to visit the gardens of Washington Park or before a day of shopping in Nob Hill, start with a cup at Coffeehouse Northwest (1951 W. Burnside St.; 503.248.2133; no website). Here, baristas offer two different espresso selections every day, as well as a hot cocoa handmade at the shop using chocolate imported from France. The chic interior and communal table invite patrons to linger for a morning or afternoon treat.

If Pioneer Courthouse Square is "Portland's living room," then Powell's City of Books is its den. At the World Cup Coffee & Tea (1005 W. Burnside St.; 503.228.4651; www. worldcupcoffee.com) inside, you can cozy up to a warm beverage and read, browse books from the shelves, or just watch passersby through the large windows that face bustling Burnside Street.

A must when visiting downtown is the world-famous Stumptown Coffee Roasters(128 S.W.Third Ave.; 503.295.6144; www. stumptowncoffee.com). Stop in and feel the buzz for yourself. A loftlike space, long bar and large magazine rack make the Old Town café a favorite for drinking in Portland's culture and renowned espresso drinks. — Lila Martin



In a city that takes its suds seriously, it's only natural that one should be able to curl up with a pint while catching a movie. Indeed, Portland's beloved slew of pub theaters more than 10 in the metro area - run the gamut from funky to swanky, serving up all manner of brews, food and flicks.


More cosmopolitan film buffs will feel right at home in the lustrous ambience of downtown's Living Room Theaters (341 S.W. 10th Ave.; 971.222.2010; www.living roomtheaters.com), where you can pair a Rogue Hazelnut Brown ale or a glass of local Pinot noir with espresso-encrusted flanksteak skewers for a multisensory cinematic experience.

In the east side's tucked-away Montavilla neighborhood, the freshly restored 1940s-era Academy Theater (7818 S.E. Stark St.; 503.252.0500; www.academytheaterpdx.com) rounds out its menu of second-run films with hearty pizza from Flying Pie Pizzeria next door, light salads and sushi, plus plenty of microbrews on tap. If parents want to enjoy a screening on their own, the on-site child care offers toys and craft activities to keep the kids happy (call ahead to reserve a spot).

One of many McMenamins brew-'n'-view outposts in town, the Mission Theater (1624 N.W. Glisan St.; 503.223.4527; www. mcmenamins.com) is the perfect place to gather for recent releases, cult classics, art films or even Monday Night Football. The casual but ornately decorated space features a wideranging menu of handcrafted McMenamins ales and pub fare.

All of the shows at these theaters cost less than \$10, and some even run less than the price of a pint. Call it a happy hour and a half.


#### NONSTOP FLIGHTS TO PORTLAND ARRIVE

from all of the spots you'd expect: Chicago, New York, Los Angeles and Washington, D.C. But they also originate from a few surprising places, such as Tokyo and Amsterdam. In all, Portland offers nonstop service to nearly 50 cities worldwide.

Portland International Airport (PDX) is convenient and comfortable, with a reputation for efficiency and ample amenities. The airport is handy to both the Oregon Convention Center and Portland's dynamic city center - 20 minutes by car or 38 minutes by light rail to downtown.

Speaking of Portland's light rail system - nicknamed "MAX" - it boasts 52 miles of track that connect PDX, the convention

center, downtown and the Portland Expo Center. And riders can easily transfer to the Portland Streetcar, which travels to the city's hottest shopping

Best of all, riders can use MAX and the streetcars for free in a 330-square-block area known as the Free Rail Zone. This transit-friendly district encompasses the entire downtown hotel and retail core, and crosses the river to the Oregon Convention Center.





mean it literally. The hills that rise just west of downtown shelter Forest Park, a tree-filled, 5,156-acre expanse crisscrossed by 70 miles of hiking and mountain biking trails.

# Portland is the perfect starting point for day trips.

Urban hikers will find an inviting walking route just behind the Oregon Convention Center: the 1.5-mile Vera Katz Eastbank Esplanade, which features works of art, water-level views of downtown and the country's longest floating walkway (1,200 feet). Plus, it

connects to the Springwater Corridor Trail, a 17-mile bicycling byway.

Portland's proximity to abundant natural wonders makes it the perfect starting point for delegate-friendly day trips. Within a 90-minute drive of downtown, you can:

- visit the vineyards and tasting rooms of Oregon's scenic wine country, famous for its Pinot noir;
- hike past Multnomah Falls or any of the nearly 100 waterfalls in the Columbia River Gorge;
- ski and snowboard day or night, nearly year-round — on nearby Mount Hood; or
- explore the towns and beaches of the dramatic, rugged Oregon Coast.

With so many options for further exploration, the hardest part may be setting foot on the plane to return home.





#### WITH NEARLY ONE MILLION SQUARE FEET,

the Oregon Convention Center (OCC) reigns as the largest convention facility in the Pacific Northwest.

The facility offers 255,000 square feet of contiguous exhibit space, 50 meeting rooms, two grand ballrooms, full-service catering and an 800-space, weather-protected parking garage. Even without a car, the OCC is exceedingly accessible. The facility is located on TriMet's MAX light rail and has its own station. Since the OCC, like the downtown hotel core, falls within Portland's Free Rail Zone, connections between it and the downtown lodging properties are always complimentary. Visitors can even get to and from Portland International Airport with ease.

In addition to its eco-friendly light rail connection, the center has several other green features. Large windows wash hallways and lobbies in natural light, reducing the need for electricity.

The innovative Rain Garden — designed to masquerade as an elegant water feature — actually scrubs pollutants from the rainwater that drains from the center's massive roof. The water moves through a cleansing series of waterfalls, settling ponds and native grasses before entering the nearby Willamette River.

In October 2008, the OCC was recertified with the LEED-EB Silver rating from the United States Green Building Council, making it the first convention center in the nation to achieve recertification at a higher rating. The new rating required proven sustainability accomplishments among areas of operation, maintenance and capital improvements.

In January 2009, the OCC began offsetting 100 percent of the carbon emissions from its natural gas use through the Smart Energy program. The program is designed to support projects that reduce greenhouse gas emissions, such as a biodigester at an eastern Oregon farm that captures methane gas from cow manure and uses it as a renewable energy source.

The center has also been acknowledged for its forward-thinking practices by a BEST Award from the City of Portland's Office of Sustainable Development, a Salmon-Safe certification and IAAM's Venue Excellence Award.






# What is diesel particulate matter?

#### Combination of:

- Elemental carbons
- Heavy metals
- Nitrates
- Polycyclic Aromatic Hydrocarbons
- Additional toxic compounds
   Mercury-Toluene-Lead-Cadmium



The smaller the particle, the stronger its potential impact on human health because it can be more easily inhaled.







- Premature births
- Heart attack
- Cancer

#### **Metro region**

- 1,132 tons particulate matter emitted per year (all sources)



# **Compressed natural gas**

- · Future ability to power vehicles on Bio-methane/Landfill gas



# **Allied Waste Truck #1247**

- 2004 Peterbilt
- Prior to filter install, emits 1.2 lbs of Particulate Matter per day or 312 lbs per year
- DPF reduces emission level 90%
- Post treatment particulate matter reduced to 1.92 ounces emitted per day or 31.2 lbs per year

#### Avoided costs and filter benefits for Allied Waste truck

Yields approximately \$219,024 of avoided human health costs over 5 year life of the project.


