

As a member of the Metro council I agree to the following:

Meetings

- 1. I will come prepared to meetings, familiarize myself with the material and seek to address individual needs prior to the meeting.
- 2. I will strive to hold questions until the end of presentations (unless it is essential to promote understanding).
- 3. Facilitation of meetings will focus on balancing participation and achieving desired outcomes.
 - o The Council President is the primary facilitator
 - o The councilor leading the work is the secondary facilitator
 - o All council members are encouraged to redirect discussion if it becomes imbalanced or off-focus
 - o Facilitators will set a time limit for talking and the number of individual contributions on a given topic
 - We as a council will provide feedback to staff on presentations.

Engagement

- 1. I will follow meeting ground rules (page 3).
- 2. I will seek to avoid surprising my colleagues during meetings.
- 3. I will seek to find agreement when dialogue is lost/compromised:
 - Anyone can say, "Take it off line" or "Let's talk later"
 - o Individuals can continue their conversation later one-on-one

Communication

- 1. After significant meetings with elected officials or key stakeholders the Council President will make a point to brief Metro councilors that may be impacted.
 - The Council President will work with individual councilors on their expectations for briefings and the best way to provide that information
- 2. I will seek to provide opportunities to communicate with fellow councilors outside of meetings.
 - o Take advantage of texts, emails and phone calls
 - Schedules will be cleared 30 minutes (when possible) prior to Council meetings to provide increased opportunities for briefings and conversations

Conflict Agreements

1. When resolving conflict, I will speak directly to the person involved.

- 2. I will take time to cool off before discussing an issue of conflict.
- 3. If needed, I will signal for a discussion time-limit or process-check.
- 4. I will ask for feedback, such as "how did I do?"
- 5. I will not engage staff in personal conflict or ask them to take sides.
- 6. I share the expectation with members of the Council to listen and contribute to a productive dialogue.

Workload balance

- 1. I agree to the current workload balancing process.
- 2. The Council President will provide a general discussion when assignments are set up (annually or as needed).

Maintaining the gain

- 1. I agree to monitor agreements and group dynamics on an ongoing basis.
- 2. It is the Council President's responsibility to review these agreements periodically with councilors.

Metro Council Ground Rules

Everyone participates. Strive to be concise, stay on topic, and seek participation from all council members.

Different opinions and participation styles are welcome. Recognize that some individuals are comfortable sharing "draft" ideas and opinions, and others won't express an opinion until fully thought through.

Start and finish on time. Sometimes, a topic will need more time for discussion than allotted. If so, acknowledge this, and agree on how the group will address this need.

One conversation at a time. Limit sidebar conversations. We all interrupt on occasion by mistake, or to build on others statements; however, strive to allow each person the space to finish their thought.

Be present. Use of laptops and smart phones should be limited to the needs of the current meeting (note taking, asking for fact checking by others, etc.), and used in as limited a manner as possible.

Silence is agreement. It isn't acceptable to remain silent in a meeting and then later say you do not agree with a group decision.

Challenge ideas, not individuals. Strive to keep conversations from taking on a personal tone, and be prepared to share your reasoning.

Praise in public; criticize in private.

Do what you say you will do. Council members are accountable for following through on agreed actions and the group should hold each other mutually accountable.

Respect and accept your group. We all are individuals, have our own perspectives, and process information and communicate in different ways.

Seek to avoid surprises. We strive to inform other councilors when we have new information or ideas, or when we are going to ask the Council for support on a position that may be controversial.
