<u>Committee Recommendation</u>: The Solid Waste Committee voted 4 to 0 to recommend Council adoption of Resolution No. 89-1145. Voting: Councilors Hansen, Buchanan, DeJardin and Wyers. Absent: Ragsdale. This action taken October 3, 1989.

<u>Committee Discussion/Issues</u>: A selection committee reviewed 29 nominations for recycling recognition awards. They recommended that the following receive awards:

- 1. Ed Druback Individual recycling
- 2. Peace Mennonite Church/Red Barn Recycling Non-profit organization award
- 3. Fred Meyer, Inc. Business (non-recycling related) award
- 4. Far West Fibers Business (recycling-related) award
- 5. Allen Hurst/Oregon State Highway Division new project award

The Solid Waste Committee noted that the "non-recycling related" award is for a business not in the recycling business, that has made a significant contribution to reducing the amount of waste it produces.

There being no issues raised and no further discussion, the Committee voted to recommend adoption of the resolution.

Factual Background and Analysis

For-the past-three years, the Metro Executive and Council have recycling recognition awards. The awards, presented at the first council meeting in October, are part of the Recycling Awareness

> Week celebration and are a way to honor those companies and individuals who have significantly reduced solid waste going to area landfills or who have furthered recycling efforts in the region.

Award Definition

1. Individual - an individual whose actions have been significant in reducing solid waste or in furthering recycling in the region. Organization/School - a non-profit organization or school that 2. has made significant contributions to waste reduction and/or recycling through an internal program at its facility or facilities. 3. Business/non-recycling related - a business that has made a significant contribution to reducing the amount of waste it

produces.

4. Business/recycling related - a business whose major operational activity is recycling/waste reduction and one which has significantly reduced the amount of waste going to regional landfills or has developed new programs to further recycling efforts in the region.

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for new projects was created and the business and non-recycling related business.

Nominations forms were sent to companies, agencies and interested individuals through the Recycling Information Center's Monthly Report.

Twenty-nine nominations were received and reviewed by the selection committee; 10 in the individual category, 11 in the nonprofit organization category and 8 in the business category. Committee members were Gary Hansen, Metro Councilor, Jerry Powell, Editor of Resource Recycling Magazine and Charlotte Becker, Metro Recycling Information Center Coordinator.
