WHEREAS, Metro owns and operates Lone Fir Cemetery, one of 14 Historic Cemeteries owned and operated by Metro in Multnomah County; and

WHEREAS, Metro Code Section Chapter 10.01 provides regulations governing the use of Metro owned or operated Regional Parks and Greenspaces, and Metro Code Section Chapter 10.01.020(d) classifies Lone Fir Cemetery as a Park subject to said regulations; and

WHEREAS, Metro Code Section 10.01.200 provides that “. . . no person shall bring into or consume alcoholic beverages in any park, provided however, that Council may, from time to time, designate certain parks or park areas where alcohol may be brought (and consumed) . . . after the proper permits are secured from the Director . . .”; and

WHEREAS, the Metro Council has so designated Blue Lake Park, Oxbow Park, and Howell Territorial Park, and now wishes to designate Lone Fir Cemetery as a park where alcohol may be brought and consumed after the proper permits are secured from the Director; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Metro Council designates Lone Fir Cemetery as a park where alcoholic beverages may be consumed subject to the terms and conditions imposed by the Director by special use permit.

### IN CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION NO.14-4551, FOR THE PURPOSE OF DESIGNATING LONE FIR CEMETERY AS A PARK AREA IN WHICH ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES MAY BE CONSUMED SUBJECT TO A SPECIAL USE PERMIT

## BACKGROUND

Lone Fir Cemetery is one of fourteen Historic Cemeteries operated by Metro. As part of Metro's mission to sustainably and responsibly care for this property, Metro coordinates with volunteers and non-profit organizations to plan events that raise funds and awareness for projects that benefit the cemetery. The Friends of Lone Fir Cemetery ("The Friends") is an important community partner—since 2000, this committed group of volunteers has devoted time and resources to education, preservation, and restoration efforts. The Friends have organized an event for August 16, 2014 that is intended to support these valuable efforts. Specifically, the event will raise money and awareness for the restoration of the Bottler Tomb, a notable historic landmark at Lone Fir. In keeping with the occupation of the tomb's pioneer namesake, the event will be a free beer tasting. Fifteen local home brewers will provide two-ounce beer samples and attendees will vote for their favorite. The winning brew will receive the honorary title of "Boettler Bier."

In order for this event to take place as intended, Council must designate Lone Fir Cemetery as a park area in which alcohol may be consumed. The designation would further enable cemetery staff, independently or in cooperation with community organizations such as The Friends, to plan future events that will benefit the property and assist in Metro's overall operation of the Historic Cemeteries. Any such events involving alcoholic beverages would be subject to the Director's approval of a special use permit, ensuring the safe and respectful use of cemetery property.

## ANALYSIS/INFORMATION

### 1. Known Opposition

There are no known opponents to the proposed legislation.

### 2. Legal Antecedents

Metro Code Section Chapter 10.01 provides regulations governing the use of Metro owned or operated Regional Parks and Greenspaces. Lone Fir Cemetery is classified as a Park subject to these regulations under Section 10.01.020(d). Section 10.01.200 further provides that "...no person shall bring into or consume alcoholic beverages in any park, provided however, that Council may, from time to time, designate certain parks or park areas where alcohol may be brought (and consumed)...(a)fter the proper permits are secured from the Director..."

### 3. Anticipated Effects

By adoption of the proposed legislation, Council would designate Lone Fir Cemetery as a park where alcoholic beverages may be consumed subject to the terms and conditions imposed by special use permit. The Friends' beer tasting event could proceed as planned on August 16, 2014, and cemetery staff could coordinate or facilitate future events involving the consumption of alcoholic beverages at Lone Fir.

WHEREAS, a Primary Election was held in the State of Oregon on May 20, 2014 (Primary Election); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to ORS 268, the following candidates for Metro appeared on the Primary Election in accordance with ORS Chapter 249: and

- 1. Metro Council President;
- 2. Metro Councilor, Sub District 1;
- 3. Metro Councilor, Sub District 2;
- 4. Metro Councilor, Sub District 4; and
- 5. Metro Auditor; and

WHEREAS, ORS 255.295 requires that the Multnomah County Director of Elections Division canvass the official abstract of votes cast for members of the Metro Council, deliver the official Abstract of Votes to Metro for acceptance and determination of qualification , and cause the Multnomah County Elections Division election officer to issue certificates of election to the winners; and

WHEREAS, the Metro Charter, Chapter V, section 19 sets forth the qualification criteria for Metro Councilors and provides that the Metro Council “is the judge of the election and qualification of its members;” and Chapter VI, section 29(1) of the Metro Charter further provides that “if one candidate for a Metro office receives a majority of the votes cast at the primary election for all candidates for that office, that candidate is elected;” and

WHEREAS, the Metro Council finds that each of the four candidates who received a majority of votes cast at the primary election is qualified to serve pursuant to the terms and conditions of the Metro Charter; and

WHEREAS, the Abstract of Votes and regional results of the Primary Election for the Metro Area were received by the Metro Council, attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit A; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. That the Metro Council hereby accepts the results of the Abstract of Votes for the May 20, 2014 Primary Election; and
- 2. That the voters of the Metro Area have elected Tom Hughes for the position of Metro Council President, for a term commencing January 5, 2015 and ending on January 4, 2019; and

3. That the voters of the Metro Area, District 1, have elected Shirley R. Craddick a for the position of Metro Councilor, for a term commencing on January 5, 2015 and ending on January 4, 2019; and
4. That the voters of the Metro Area, District 2, have elected Carlotta Collette for the position of Metro Councilor, for a term commencing on J January 5, 2015 and ending on January 4, 2019; and
5. That the voters of the Metro Area, District 4, have elected Kathryn Harrington for the position of Metro Councilor, for a term commencing on January 5, 2015 and ending on January 4, 2019; and
6. That the voters of the Metro Area have elected Brian Evans for the position of Metro Auditor Officer for a term commencing on January 5, 2015 and ending on January 4, 2019.
7. That the Metro Council authorizes Metro Council President Hughes to sign the Multnomah County Elections Division statement attached hereto as Exhibit B instructing the Multnomah County Elections Officer to issue certificates of election to the above persons.







Subject: Canvass of Votes

ORS 255.295 provides for the district election authority to canvass the official abstract of votes cast for members of the district board and to cause the election officer to issue certificates of election to the winners.

## BACKGROUND

On May 20, 2014, a Primary Election was held in the State of Oregon. In that election, the following candidates appeared on the Primary Election ballot in accordance with ORS Chapter 249:

1. Metro Council President;
2. Metro Councilor, Sub District 1;
3. Metro Councilor, Sub District 2;
4. Metro Councilor, Sub District 4; and
5. Metro Auditor

Oregon law requires that the Multnomah County Director of Elections Division canvass the official abstract of votes cast, deliver the official Abstract of Votes to Metro for acceptance and determination of qualification, and to cause the Elections Division election officer to issue certificates of election to the winners. On June 9, 2014 Metro received the official Certified Results of that election, and the canvass of the official Abstract of Votes, from the Multnomah County Elections Division.

Metro Charter, Chapter V, Section 19 sets forth the qualification criteria and provides that the Metro Council “is the judge of the election and qualification of its members;” and Chapter VI, section 29(1) of the Metro Charter further provides that “if one candidate for a Metro office receives a majority of the votes cast at the primary election for all candidates for that office, that candidate is elected.” The successful candidates all meet the qualification standards for holding office as set forth in the Metro Charter.

WHEREAS, Metro has issued its Natural Areas General Obligation Bonds, Series 2007 (the “2007 Bonds”) and has approximately \$73,315,000 of 2007 Bonds remaining; and,

WHEREAS, under current market conditions refunding all or a portion of the 2007 Bonds may produce present value debt service savings; and,

WHEREAS, it is now desirable to authorize the refunding of the 2007 Bonds to achieve present value debt service savings; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Metro Council as follows:

**Section 1. Refunding Bonds Authorized.**

The Metro Council hereby authorizes the issuance of General Obligation Bonds to refund all or any portion of the outstanding 2007 Bonds that achieve present value adequate debt service savings. The bonds authorized by this Section 1 (the “Bonds”) shall be sold and issued as provided in this resolution pursuant to ORS 268.525 and the applicable provisions of ORS Chapter 287A including ORS 287A.365 to 287A.380. The Bonds may be issued in an amount sufficient to pay and redeem the 2007 Bonds that are being refunded, plus an amount sufficient to pay estimated costs related to the refunding and the Bonds.

**Section 2. Delegation.**

The Chief Operating Officer or the person designated by the Chief Operating Officer to act under this resolution (the “Metro Official”), on behalf of Metro and without further action by Metro Council, may:

- 2.1 Issue the Bonds in one or more series that may be sold at different times.
- 2.2 Participate in the preparation of, authorize the distribution of, and deem final the preliminary and final official statements and any other disclosure documents for each series of the Bonds.
- 2.3 Establish the final principal amounts, maturity schedules, interest rates, sale prices, redemption terms, payment terms and dates, record date and other terms of each series of the Bonds.
- 2.4 Publish a notice of sale, receive bids and award the sale of each series of Bonds to the bidder complying with the notice and offering the most favorable terms to Metro, or

- select one or more underwriters, commercial banks or other investors and negotiate the sale of any series of the Bonds with those underwriters, commercial banks or investors.
- 2.5 Undertake to provide continuing disclosure for each series of the Bonds in accordance with Rule 15c2-12 of the United States Securities and Exchange Commission.
  - 2.6 Appoint and enter into agreements with a paying agent, verification agent, escrow agent, registrar and any other professionals and service providers that the Metro Official determines are desirable in connection with the Bonds.
  - 2.7 Apply for ratings for each series of Bonds, determine whether to purchase municipal bond insurance or obtain other forms of credit enhancements for each series of Bonds, enter into agreements with the providers of credit enhancement, and execute and deliver related documents.
  - 2.8 Prepare, execute and deliver a bond declaration for each series of Bonds specifying the terms under which each series of Bonds is issued, and making covenants for the benefit of Bondowners. The bond declarations may also contain covenants for the benefit of any credit providers.
  - 2.9 Determine whether each series of Bonds will bear interest that is excludable from gross income under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, is includable in gross income under that code, or is eligible for federal interest subsidies or tax credits. If a series bears interest that is excludable from gross income or eligible for federal interest subsidies or tax credits under that code, the Metro Official may enter into covenants to maintain the tax status of that series of Bonds.
  - 2.10 File an advance refunding plan for the 2007 Bonds with the State of Oregon.
  - 2.11 Determine whether the savings produced by refunding are adequate to justify the refunding, and select the portions of the outstanding 2007 Bonds that will be refunded.
  - 2.12 Enter into escrow deposit agreements and take any other actions to call, defease and refund the bonds that are refunded.
  - 2.13 Appoint and enter into agreements with escrow agents, paying agents, verification agents and other professionals and service providers for the Bonds.
  - 2.14 Issue, sell and deliver the Bonds and execute any documents and take any other action in connection with the Bonds which the Metro Official finds will be advantageous to Metro.

### **Section 3. Security For Bonds.**

Metro hereby pledges its full faith and credit to pay the Bonds. Metro hereby covenants for the benefit of the Owners to levy a direct ad valorem tax upon all of the taxable property within Metro which is sufficient, after taking into consideration discounts taken and delinquencies that may occur in the payment of such taxes, to pay all Bond principal and interest when due. Metro covenants to levy this tax each year until all the Bonds are paid. This tax shall

be in addition to all other taxes of Metro, and this tax shall not be limited in rate, amount or otherwise, by Sections 11 or 11b of Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

**Section 4. Effective Date.**

This resolution shall take effect on the date of its passage by the Metro Council.

### IN CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION NO.14-4552 FOR THE PURPOSE OF AUTHORIZING THE REFUNDING OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR PRESENT VALUE SAVINGS

#### BACKGROUND

In April, 2007 Metro issued the first series of bonds under the November 2006 General Obligation bond authorization for the Natural Areas program. The first series issued \$124,295,000 of the total \$227.4 million authorization. The bonds were issued with a 20 year life and a maturity date of June 2026. The estimated rate per \$1,000 of assessed value stayed well within the pledge of \$0.19 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

Currently, market interest rates are sufficiently lower than the rates of the existing bonds that a healthy net present value savings is projected. This provides Metro with an opportunity to refinance this outstanding debt by issuing a new bond. At the same time, Metro intends to restructure the debt shortening the maturity date of the bonds to June 2020. This allows us to better manage both the individual rate pledge for this authorization as well as the overall general obligation debt service levy rate.

The initial issuance plan called for the bonds to be issued in two series with the second series of bonds to be issued in the Spring of 2010. Debt service was to begin in FY 2010-11. The debt service on the 2007 bonds was structured such that when the 2<sup>nd</sup> series was issued the total debt service on both bonds issues would not exceed the pledge of \$0.19 per \$1,000 of assessed value. However, within a year of issuing the first bonds in 2007 the economy began a severe downturn and real estate sales slowed considerably.

The second series of bonds was not issued until the Spring 2012, two years later than planned. The second series issued \$75.0 million of the outstanding \$103,105,000 authorization. The bonds were again issued with a maturity date of June 2026. The revised issuance plan called for the remaining bonds to be issued in Spring 2015. The debt service on the 2012 bonds was structured such that when the third series was issued the combination of the three issues would not exceed the authorization pledge of \$0.19 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

The Chief Operating Officer and program staff are currently in discussions with the Council on the future direction and goals of the program. At this time, it does not appear that the program will be ready to issue the final series of bonds in Spring 2015. This will, once again cause a large reduction in the debt service levy rate and a subsequent large increase in the rate when the final series is issued. To better manage the debt service levy rate and avoid large spikes in the rate up or down staff is recommending a restructuring of the 2007 series Natural Areas Bonds. The refunded and restructured bonds are proposed to mature in June 2020.

The purpose of this resolution is to authorize Metro to issue tax-exempt general obligation bonds to refinance the callable portion of the outstanding 2007 series Natural Areas bonds. With the restructuring, it is anticipated the refunding will provide approximately \$12.2 million of gross savings over the life of the bonds, or about \$8.9 million in net present value savings – approximately 13.7 percent of the refunding

bond proceeds. The final structure of the bonds will be determined at a later date to provide the maximum benefit to Metro.

#### **ANALYSIS/INFORMATION**

1. **Known Opposition** – None.
2. **Legal Antecedents** – Metro is authorized by ORS Chapter 287A, and specifically ORS 287A.360-380 and also ORS 271.390 to enter into financing agreements to refinance real or personal property that the Metro Council determines is needed. Chapter III, Section 10 of the Metro charter supplements Metro’s authority to issue revenue bonds, and Metro Code Title VII, Chapter 7.02.020. authorizes Metro to issue bonds that are secured by Metro’s full faith and credit; and Metro Code Section 7.02.070 authorizes Metro to issue refunding bonds.
3. **Anticipated Effects** – Implementation of Resolution No. 14-4552 provide net present value savings of approximately \$8.9 million or about 13.7 percent over the life of the bonds, and ultimately smooth out the overall debt service levy rate for the agency avoiding large spikes in future levies.
4. **Budget Impacts** – As of May 30, 2014, the estimated net present value savings of the bonds is approximately \$8.9 million, or approximately 13.7 percent.



## Better alternative to CRC: Third Bridge

The "Third Bridge" from Portland to Vancouver most commonly refers to a concept also called "The Western Arterial." It is also called the "Port-to-Port" bridge, and was analyzed as an alternative by the Southwest Washington Regional Transportation Council in 1999. The Western Arterial was originally considered by the CRC project, but was dismissed because it was outside of the "(I-5) bridge influence area."

Well, no...really?

Now that the CRC project is (hopefully) dead, we should be able to get to realistic solutions. The big economic news in the area is that the Silicon Forest is gearing up for its next big wave of expansion. And with it will come increasing traffic congestion on the I-5. However, since the construction of the Fremont Bridge and I-405 back in the 1970's the contribution of traffic on to Interstate 5 from the western parts of the Portland Metropolitan area has been a factor planners have been slow to reckon with. And the burst of growth in high tech industries in the Beaverton Hillsboro area has been the largest contributing factor to I-5 congestion and now there will be more.

Here's a popular concept of what the connections of the Western Arterial route could be, and please note that this is not a canyon like Interstate freeway. This has also received general, popular recognition as an effective alternative:

Start in Vancouver, WA at the I-5 and 39th Street exit. Conveniently, Washington State Route 500 also ties in here. Go west (possibly underground) to Fruit Valley Rd. and head south. This eventually ties in to an extension of Mill Plain Blvd. and wends its way on Thompson Ave. to the banks of the Columbia. Cross just west of the BNSF bridge and connect in near North Portland Rd. This connects Vancouver to the Rivergate area and the loop of N. Marine Drive and N. Columbia Boulevard. Head across the Willamette at the west end of this loop from N. Ramsey Blvd.

Connect to Hwy 30 with an interchange, and then head NW near the Newberry Rd. area. Connect to NW Kaiser Rd. and then to NW Cornelius Pass Rd. and then on to US 26. This puts it in the heart of planned expansion in this industrial area. There probably is a need for a tunnel under Skyline Blvd. since it would be a steep incline to go over the summit.

This is a shortcut, as opposed to going down Interstate 5 and then out US 26, and should appeal to both mass transit and to alternative transportation (i.e. cyclists). What deters many would be transit users are multiple transfers and lengthy rides. Shortcuts work to every traveler's advantage. And, for the most part, it makes use of existing Rights of Way. This can be a standard four lane highway—there are also concepts for an additional east side crossing, which can also alleviate some of the general interstate traffic burden. This route will also go close to METRO's West Side Trail system.

By using metal arch bridges fabricated on land, as was the Fremont, costs can be controlled. The CRC project with its concrete structure and risky, over the water construction, had a combination of expensive methods. Admittedly the Western Arterial would not be cheap, but it serves an area that presently does not have good access. It also allows for a large "travel shed" since numerous routes in both Washington and Oregon can intersect it, providing an alternative for traffic which is now confined to I-5. It also allows for an express transit bus system via the major highways. Supplemental routes (such as NW Cornelius Pass Rd) can have very limited, modest improvements. Vancouver has ample room for growth in its downtown area and there are three major industrial areas which can be served by the Arterial. Oregon also welcomes the tax dollars that Washington residents bring in.


# Immediate Congestion Relief

Adding a new opening to the existing railroad bridge will eliminate most of the bridge lifts by permitting more barge traffic to use the "hump" under the current I-5 bridges.

◆ **Decrease Lifts by 95% on I-5 bridges**

◆ **Install electronic warning sign boards on I-5 freeway stating bridge lift times**

◆ **Pleasure crafts lift "queuing system"**



**1. Lifts will decrease by 95% (CRC DEIS) with an upgrade to the BNSF rail bridge lift system.**

The addition of a mid-channel opening on the BNSF bridge in line with the I-5 "hump" will allow most barge traffic to avoid causing bridge lifts on the I-5 bridge. A mid channel opening will make it easier for marine traffic to use the main or barge channels. We have approximately 20-30 lifts a month during high water. With a new lift, approximately 95% of the vessels needing a I-5 lift would have better channel access not needing a lift.

### Benefits

- Highway - Less congestion and incidents from lifts
- Marine - Safety, wider lift opening, less maneuvering to us barge channels, more options to access channels for emergencies.
- Rail- Time savings – opening a new lift will be faster than the 1907 swing span.
- Air Quality- Less lifts helps to keep the traffic moving
- Historical - 95% less lifts means less wear and failures on the old I-5 lifts
- Cost Savings- Keeping traffic moving, keeping business traffic moving, less raising of bridge,

**2. Install electronic warning sign boards on I-5 freeway stating bridge lift times and make public announcements for commercial marine traffic.** ODOT/ WADOT currently manage I-5 bridges lifts, freeway warning signs, and public announcements about traffic. The DOTs need to include bridge lifts information into the current transportation warning system. The commercial marine traffic can notify their schedule prior to needing a lift.

**3. Lifts for pleasure crafts during non-restricted lift times will be regulated to a "queuing system"** It is common for marine pleasure craft traffic to "line-up" and have one bridge lift, at scheduled times, instead of individually as we do now.

**4. The lift upgrade has been recommended in transportation studies for decades.** Please see matrix

**5. Upgrading the BNSF rail bridge has many supporters**

**6. Federal funding must be sought to adding an additional mid-channel lift because it benefits the highway and marine traffic safety more the privately owned BNSF rail company.** The type of funding sought can be infrastructure, employment area grants, safety grants, and 4(f) Historical Resource grants for less lifts I-5 bridges.

**7. BNSF is willing and has added lifts to other rail bridges, in record time.** The lift upgrade on the Willamette River rail bridge took 72 hours, and is the largest in the world. I-5 Transportation and Trade Partnership in 2002 estimated \$42 million dollars and recommended upgrading the rail bridge.

## **Though Traffic Streamlining For immediate congestion relief on I-5 freeway.**

The I-5 freeway through Portland from Stafford in the south all the way to the I-5 bridge with Washington is considered to be antiquated and over capacity. The obsolescence comes from narrow lanes, short on and off merge lanes, lack of merge lanes, and no emergency pullout areas.

The location of the I-5 freeway in Portland through neighborhoods has made I-5 widening impossible. Widening the freeway when all the arterioles leading up to, and adjacent to, the I-5 freeway are over capacity now, and can not hold more traffic, will not relieve congestion or help the environment, and will be less safe. Leaving us to add capacity in other locations and maximize inside the current Right Of Way..

### **Immediate and Cheap Congestion Relieve**

#### **Add capacity to I-5 bridge for emergency pullout lanes.**

Replace Jersey barriers on both sides of each I-5 bridge with steel panels attached to the bridge. Removing Jersey add 2' to 3' lane space each. The Jersey barriers have 18" between the freeway lane and the barriers. So with two barriers 4' to 6' plus the 18" this is 5'6" to 7'6" space for emergency pullout by re-striping the freeway bridge lanes putting the additional space together on one side.

#### **Warning signs**

Warning signs directing freight truck traffic to use left lanes avoiding continue start, stop, and extra pollution that comes from being in the slow lane as traffic merges in.

Warning signs directing though traffic approaching the I-5 bridges North and South to use the left lanes, leaving the right lane available to help short merge lanes just before the bridges.

#### **Less braking on freeway**

Enlarge exit entrance to SR-14 east from I-5, by 10' with painted line re-striping. The enlarging of exit entrance will keep drivers from braking on the bridge. Future realigning the entrance to SR-14 by raising and lengthening exclamation lane would make it easier to us.

#### **Relocate ODOT Truck Permit Center from Jantzen Beach to Hayden Meadows.**

Freight trucks needing an ODOT permit must use the very close to the bridge on and off ramps at Jantzen Beach to purchase a permit on the island. Hayden Meadow just south of the island had good on and off ramps for north and south access to I-5, truck friendly, and has available commercial space. The historic tolling building can be turned into a much needed community center and be restored for the 2017 bridge birthday party.

#### **Increase transit service with One Stop Hop express bus service**

Increase bus service from residential areas into specific employment centers. Currently express buses just go to transit transfer or city centers. The transit user must go from residences to transit, then, transfer once or twice to get to employment centers other than downtown Portland, requiring 2 to 4 transfers to and from work each day. The Rivergate, ports, industrial, and terminals areas are the number one destinations of commuter and are not near downtown and have poor to moderate bus service. Buses connecting with park and rides in residential areas and going directly into Swan Island, Hillsboro, Rivergate, Columbia Blvd. Corridor, or the airport are needed. One bus that goes to where the user is going from near their resident will attract ridership. Get on a bus in Salmon Creek and get off in the NW Industrial Area, or Hillsboro. It's a WINNER!

## **For immediate congestion relief on I-5 freeway.**

### **Open High Occupancy Vehicle to general purpose traffic**

The Oregon Transportation Commission controls the HOV lane and can open it at any time!

Oregon has only one HOV lane in all its freeway and highway miles and it causes congestion. The "third" lane carries a very small percentage of the lane's capacity during high demand commuter times, causing added pollution and safety issues in the adjacent neighborhoods when. These neighborhoods are already in the 2% worse air quality in the NATION and are damaged even more by the HOV. They are the ONLY neighborhoods to be damaged because all other neighborhoods had removed, or not had HOV lanes.

Oregon has only one short "temporary pilot" HOV and it is on I-5 north. The HOV lane is too short in length to be helpful and does not have separation barriers between it and general purpose lanes for speed and safety needed for HOV lanes. Other Portland area freeways have removed their HOV lanes and do not have HOV lanes now. I-84 HOV lanes were removed YET it has Vancouver bound buses. I-5 south of the Fremont Bridge all the way to California has no HOV lanes. HWY 217 has no HOV lanes, a HWY 26 study showed HOV would cause an enormous amount of additional congestion and has no HOV lane. I-205 has never had HOV lanes, YET it has Vancouver bound buses. The HOV lane, on I-5, in Vancouver was removed for causing congestion and pollution. There are no HOV lanes south on I-5 from Vancouver to Portland.

The General Purpose Lanes on HWY 217, HWY 26, I-5 South, I-84, and I-205 all carry buses, some including CTRAN buses bound for Vancouver. **The Portland area needs to stop the IMMORAL attack on the financially challenged neighborhoods of North and Northeast Portland, and on the non voting, yet tax paying commuters of the State of Washington!** Washington residents pay a significant amount of taxes to the State of Oregon yet have no voting rights.

The North and Northeast neighborhoods are already punished enough by the 1000's of vehicles that drive through our neighborhoods every day putting us in the 2% worse air quality in the nation, because I-5 is over capacity and the HOV lane make it worse.

The Oregon Transportation Commission controls the HOV lane and can open it at any time! It's cheap and every easy.... The Oregon Transportation Commission orders the Oregon State Police to not enforce the HOV, and remove the signs. Which can be done today.

# Free the Elephants and Orcas in Captivity [Editorial]

Such large, intelligent animals suffer when stuffed in a zoo

Having finally joined the rest of the world in severely restricting medical testing on chimpanzees, the U.S. is currently relocating hundreds of government-managed chimps to sanctuaries. One reason for these changes is that the animals are not as essential to biomedical research as they used to be—we have learned to use genetically engineered mice and cell cultures instead. For many people, an even more persuasive argument is that performing medical research on chimpanzees is inhumane because, like us, they are highly intelligent, emotional and self-aware.

As with chimps, the intelligence of orcas and elephants is undeniable. Boasting some of the most intricate brains around, all three animals have recognized themselves in mirrors, indicating that they, too, have a concept of self. All are cooperative problem solvers. Teams of orcas sometimes hunt by producing and directing waves at icebergs to knock seals and penguins into the water. Elephants are also adept toolmakers, fashioning switches with which to shoo flies and chewing bark into balls to plug small drinking holes, thereby preventing evaporation.

Chimps, killer whales and elephants are just as dependent on companionship as we are. A killer whale mother stays with most of her descendants throughout life, sometimes shepherding as many as four generations. Related matriline, each of which has its own dialect, unite in pods, which merge into clans, which intermingle in large communities—akin to tribes and nations.

Likewise, related elephant mothers and their offspring form tight-knit clans in which they share parenting duties and shield children from predators. When a clan member dies, elephants mourn—there is no other word for it. At Kenya's Samburu National Reserve, zoologist Iain Douglas-Hamilton and his team witnessed elephants from various families tending to an ailing matriarch named Eleanor. Another matriarch used her tusks to lift Eleanor to her feet when she collapsed. Even after Eleanor died, elephants repeatedly visited and caressed her body. Cynthia Moss and other researchers

have also reported elephants sprinkling their dead with soil and covering them with branches and leaves.

A number of other species share similar humanlike traits, among them gorillas, orangutans, dolphins and porpoises. What distinguishes orcas and elephants—what makes holding them in captivity so uniquely fraught—is one of the same features that makes them so attractive to zoo-goers: their immense size. African elephants can weigh as much as 15,000 pounds and are used to traveling between watering holes and feeding sites hundreds of miles apart. Confined elephants often spend their time standing around in cramped quarters. Killer whales can reach a length of 32 feet and a weight of 22,000 pounds. The approximately four dozen orcas now in captivity are forced to trade the ocean for a bathtub. At Miami Seaquarium, the aging Lolita lives in a tank that is not even twice as wide as she is long.

These tortuous conditions inflict serious physical and psychological damage on such smart and sensitive animals. Zoo elephants die young, often after becoming obese and infertile. They frequently develop psychological tics such as swaying and head bobbing. Citing ethical reasons, several large zoos in the U.S., Canada, the U.K. and India have closed their elephant exhibits.

Captive orcas are unusually aggressive, biting and ramming one another as well as trainers. Many researchers think the animals behave this way because they are so stressed; some have suggested that longtime confinement makes cetaceans psychotic. In February 2010 SeaWorld orca Tilikum pulled 40-year-old senior trainer Dawn Brancheau underwater, shook her violently, scalped her and severed her spine. It was the second time he had killed a trainer. Wild orcas have never killed anyone.

Orcas and elephants are not the only intelligent species that deserve our respect and attention, but they face unique hardships in captivity. Even though many zoos and sea parks raise awareness about the plight of animals in the wild, the suffering of captive orcas and elephants in particular overshadows this worthy goal. Some currently confined individuals may not survive if released, but the ones that can be, should be, and captive breeding programs should be terminated.

Good afternoon President Hughes and Metro Councilors...and the viewing audience of Portland Community Media. Today, I want to focus on separating fact from fiction in regards to the elephant program at the Oregon Zoo. I think it's important that the public know the truth about how the elephants are faring at the zoo, so they can make an informed decision about what their future should be. Three celebrity activists including Bob Barker and Dame Daphne Sheldrick recently wrote letters to Metro and the zoo asking for Packy to be released to sanctuary. Packy is now in isolation and to my knowledge has not been seen by the public since his birthday on April 14. Since Mr. Hughes has denied our request for an exam by an outside vet, we need to see an indepth vet report and some video and photos of Packy so we can determine the truth of how he is doing.

The zoo has been busy spreading happy news stories about the new Elephant Lands exhibit. However, the zoo is making statements that are at variance with the facts. For instance, in the July 1 Oregonian a story ran about baby Lily splashing around in a pool. In the article was this statement: Soon, the [whole herd of eight](#) will be able to soak together when [Elephant Lands](#) is completed in 2015. Has elephant management changed that dramatically that now all 8 elephants are going to now mingle together? That has never happened at the Oregon Zoo, or any zoo that I am aware of. Elephants are managed in herds. And per Metro's own documents, each bull elephant is managed as a separate herd. So unless council has some new information about how the elephants are managed, this is simply fiction.

What isn't fiction unfortunately, according to this Metro document from 2011, and as you recall President Hughes, you said the mission has not changed, therefore it is the case that the zoo plans to breed female elephants starting at 8 years of age, and Rose-Tu is going to be bred so that she has a baby every 4 years. Since elephants are pregnant for 22 months, that doesn't give Rose-Tu a lot of time without being pregnant. She has already had two babies, so for her motherhood is a continuous and ongoing process. Is that really in her best interest? The zoo talks a lot about matriarchal herds, but not much about the the mother's welfare. And other breeding females and males will be purchased to increase the zoo's existing herd of 8 to a proposed total of 19 when and if the remote elephant center is developed. If there is not sufficient room, then the excess elephants will be shipped out to other zoos or sold possibly once again, as in the past to circuses.

Mention is made in this 2011 document about foot disease that the elephants suffered prior to 1980. But no mention is made about it after that time period, when in fact, the elephants have continued to suffer from foot disease. And in all these happy Elephant Land stories, there is no mention of Tusko, Rama or Packy and the TB that they all are infected with.

The truth they say sets you free. My hope and fervent wish is that it will indeed set the elephants free someday, and Packy free now, so that he can have SOME time before he dies in a place that really and truly has the ability and space to care for elephants. It's a fiction to say that Packy or any of the elephants are thriving at the zoo. The truth is that Packy needs to be released to sanctuary. So that we can honor him for his 52 years of devoted and selfless service. Free Packy now.

Meeting Minutes

July 31, 2014

Metro, Council Chamber

Councilors Present: Deputy Council President Sam Chase, and Councilors Shirley Craddick, Kathryn Harrington, Bob Stacey, Carlotta Collette, and Craig Dirksen

Councilors Excused: Council President Tom Hughes

Deputy Council President Chase noted a quorum was present and called the regular council meeting to order at 2:02 p.m.

**1. INTRODUCTIONS**

There were none.

**2. CITIZEN COMMUNICATIONS**

Ellen Ino, Portland:

Ms. Ino, a temporary employee at the Oregon Zoo, reported back to the Council on her community education program, which seeks to inform communities about labor issues at the Zoo, with a focus on parking affordability and treatment of temporary workers.

Matt Ellison, Vancouver:

Mr. Ellison, a restaurant worker at the Oregon Zoo, also spoke on Zoo labor issues, with specific reference to staffing and wage-related problems, and their effects on customer service and employee well-being.

**3. CONSIDERATION OF COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES FOR JULY 24, 2014.**

Motion:	Councilor Carlotta Collette moved to adopt Council Meeting Minutes for July 24, 2014.
Second:	Councilor Bob Stacey seconded the motion.

Vote: 

Deputy Council President Chase, and Councilors Craddick, Harrington, Collette and Stacey voted in support of the motion. Councilor Dirksen abstained. The vote was 5 ayes and 1 abstention, the motion <u>passed</u> .
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**4. RESOLUTIONS**

4.1 **Resolution No. 14-4538**, For the Purpose of Endorsing the Oregon Zoo’s Education, Outreach and Research Efforts to Reduce Lead Exposure in Wildlife and Humans from Spent Lead Ammunition.

Motion:	Councilor Bob Stacey moved to approve Resolution No. 14-4538.
Second:	Councilor Shirley Craddick seconded the motion.

Deputy Council President Chase called on Metro Deputy Conservation Manager David Shepherdson to present. Mr. Shepherdson, along with State Supervisor of the Oregon Office of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), provided a presentation on reducing lead exposure to wildlife and humans. Key elements included:

- The toxicity of lead to humans and wildlife.
- Decline in major sources of lead poison, including in paint and gasoline.
- Spent lead ammunition as one of the few remaining sources of lead poisoning in wildlife and humans.
- The vulnerability of certain protected species, including the bald eagle, golden eagle, and especially the California condor.
- The availability of non-lead copper bullets, which reduce fragmentation and toxicity.
- Existing legislation, such as the lead ammo ban passed in California.
- Outreach through voluntary incentive programs, which require the participation of hunters, who are key stakeholders in the issue.
- The Oregon Zoo’s participation in the condor recovery effort, which includes breeding and releasing condors into the wild, as well as opening *Condors of the Columbia*, which houses Condors from the recovery program that cannot be released into the wild.
- The possibility of condors returning to Oregon.
- Lead in wildlife as one of three priority conservation issues at the Zoo.
- Action taken by the Oregon Zoo, including funding and assisting with research, workshops, interpretive graphics, media releases, proposing an outreach coordinator position, and Mr. Shepherdson’s own efforts with the USFWS’s golden eagle lead study.

Mr. Shepherdson showed a video that plays at the Zoo’s condor exhibit. Mr. Shepherdson then introduced Mr. Henson, who spoke to issues including:

- The 1991 USFWS ban on lead ammunition for water fowl hunting, and the need to expand that conservation effort to include lead reduction efforts in all wildlife habitats.
- The Oregon Zoo’s role as a leader in outreach and education surrounding this conservation issue.
- USFWS’s support for Metro and the Zoo in enacting this legislation.

**Council Discussion**

Councilor Collette asked about statewide legislation to ban lead ammunition, and spoke to issues including military efforts to reduce lead exposure, and difficulties of enforcement. Councilor Harrington expressed her appreciation for the presentation, and her support for the legislation as part of Metro’s larger conservation efforts. Councilor Dirksen mentioned the importance of research and education in addressing this issue. Councilor Craddick expressed her support for the Zoo’s condor conservation initiatives, and inquired about next steps if the resolution is passed. Mr. Shepherdson mentioned a plan to include stakeholders in formulating the program during first year, enacting it over the next two years, and conducting reviews of the program annually. Councilor Collette reiterated her support for the Zoo’s conservation efforts, and Deputy Council President Chase offered his appreciation and support for the initiative.

Vote:	Deputy Council President Chase, and Councilors Craddick, Harrington, Dirksen, Collette and Stacey voted in support of the motion. The vote was 6 ayes, the motion <u>passed</u> unanimously.
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**4.2 Resolution No. 14-4532, For the Purpose of Adopting the 2015-2018 Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Program for the Portland Metropolitan Area.**

Motion:	Councilor Craig Dirksen moved to approve Resolution No. 14-4532.
Second:	Councilor Shirley Craddick seconded the motion.

Deputy Council President Chase called on Metro staff to present a staff report. Mr. Dan Kaempff, Principal Transportation Planner at Metro, provided an overview of the 2015-2018 Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Program, which included:

- Definition of the MTIP.
- Key players in MTIP development, and their requirements for developing the MTIP.
- Funding sources for the MTIP, including ODOT Administered Funds, Regional Flexible Funds, transit funding, and local funding.
- Contents of the MTIP.
- Information regarding the public comment period.
- Additional actions and next steps.

**Council Discussion**

Deputy Council President Chase called for questions from the Metro councilors. Councilor Stacey asked about retention of the overall assessments of Title 6 in Environmental Justice Conformity for Acceptable Levels of Disparate Impact, given the changes referred to in the staff report. Mr. Kaempff clarified that public investment in the MTIP would remain comparable, despite changes in timing and revenue source. Councilor Stacey then asked about the inclusion of a new, specific element on the project list. Councilor Collette inquired about the total funding level, as well as funding sources, while mentioning the importance of disseminating information regarding the successful public

process embodied in the MTIP, and celebrating the implementation of regional transportation projects.

Vote:

Deputy Council President Chase, and Councilors Craddick, Harrington, Dirksen, Collette and Stacey voted in support of the motion. The vote was 6 ayes, the motion <u>passed</u> unanimously.
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## 5. **ORDINANCES – SECOND READ**

### 5.1 **Ordinance No. 14-1336**, For the Purpose of Amending Maps in Titles 4 and 14 of the Urban Growth Management Functional Plan to Conform with Changes Enacted by the Oregon Legislature in House Bill 4078.

Deputy Council President Sam Chase called on Metro Principal Regional Planner Tim O'Brien to present a staff report. Mr. O'Brien came forward, and began by explaining the history and effects of House Bill 4078, including:

- Senate Bill 1011, which established a new method to designate urban and rural reserves in 2007.
- The passage of HB 4078 in 2014, which made significant changes to the designation of urban and rural reserves in Washington County, and made final Metro's 2011 UGB expansion.

Mr. O'Brien suggested that Functional Plan Title 14, which contains the Urban Growth Boundary and Urban and Rural Reserves Map (Exhibit A), be amended to represent the changes to the UGB and the reserves as directed by HB 4078. Mr. O'Brien also mentioned that Functional Plan Title 4, which contains the Industrial and Other Employment Areas Map (Exhibit B), should be amended, as HB 4078 added employment area land to the UGB in three locations in Forest Grove and Hillsboro. He also mentioned updates to the 2040 Growth Concept Map, as well as UGB additions adjacent to Cornelius, which will be designated for residential use.

Mr. O'Brien pointed out that the staff report for Ordinance No. 14-1336, drafted in April 2014, does not reflect known opposition from a group of property owners in the Cornelius/Hillsboro area, who oppose being added to the UGB. Mr. O'Brien also referenced a letter from 1,000 Friends of Oregon, in which the group expressed concerns regarding the accuracy of placement of the UGB line in Maps A and B. Mr. O'Brien suggested that he responded to this letter by indicating that the mapping is consistent with HB 4078. He concluded by stating his support for Ordinance No. 14-1336.

### ***Council Discussion***

Councilor Craddick inquired about discussions regarding differences in various land designations, and about ensuring an adequate supply of such lands. Mr. O'Brien mentioned that, in developing this ordinance, Metro staff worked with Forest Grove and Hillsboro to determine the best designations for employment and industrial lands. Metro Attorney Alison Kean suggested that Council save further comments for a work session on the upcoming Urban Growth Report

discussion. Councilor Stacey stated that the powers and responsibilities of the Metro Council are limited with regard to this ordinance. In response to Council clarification, Ms. Kean assured the Council that the ordinance is a nondiscretionary action to conform Metro maps to comply with state law.

#### **5.1.1 Public Hearing on Ordinance No. 14-1336**

Deputy Council President Chase opened a public hearing and asked for public testimony. Deputy Council President Chase called on Amanda Spahn to testify.

##### Amanda Spahn, Hillsboro

Ms. Spahn presented to the Council a petition from residents of NW 334<sup>th</sup> Ave. Ms. Spahn expressed her understanding for the Council's position on this ordinance. She feels HB 4078 bypasses public due process, as she and others were not notified of what she considers a "backroom deal" to include property on NW 334<sup>th</sup> Ave. in the UGB. Ms. Spahn described the burden of area landowners to comply with zoning changes, and the unwillingness of officials and organizations to offer help. Ms. Spahn asked for the Council's help in any way possible, and mentioned some willingness on the part of NW 334<sup>th</sup> Ave. residents to become a rural district.

##### Richard Howell, Hillsboro

Mr. Howell indicated that he would like to represent a growing group of concerned and active citizens on NW 338<sup>th</sup> Ave., which is adjacent to NW 334<sup>th</sup> Ave.

##### Matt Heinrich, Hillsboro

Mr. Heinrich expressed concerns pertaining to the shape of the UGB near his property, and suggested that favoritism may have influenced the way in which the boundary was drawn. He also showed concern about the lack of notification he received regarding the proceedings surrounding HB 4078.

#### ***Council Discussion***

Councilor Harrington asked Mr. O'Brien to clarify that the area colored in orange on the first attached map was previously considered urban reserve, and is now within the UGB. Councilor Stacey acknowledged Ms. Spahn's concerns, specifically with regard to the lack of public process in the Legislature's proceedings surrounding HB 4078.

Seeing no more citizens who wished to testify, Deputy Council President Chase closed the public hearing .

Motion:	Councilor Kathryn Harrington moved to approve Ordinance No. 14-1336.
Second:	Councilor Bob Stacey seconded the motion.

Vote: Deputy Council President Chase, and Councilors Craddick, Harrington, Dirksen, Collette and Stacey voted in support of the motion. The vote was 6 ayes, the motion passed unanimously.

**6. CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER COMMUNICATION**

- Metro is co-sponsoring an event with Portland Mayor Charlie Hales and Indianapolis Mayor Ballard about sustainability practices in the two cities. The event will be at 6pm on July 31 at the Elliott Center. Mayor Ballard will also be at the Policymakers Bike Ride tomorrow.
- July 31 is the Plaza-Palooza at the Convention Center, where the artist will be Pepe and the Bottle Blondes.
- Metro has a film contest for the “Let’s Talk Trash” series, to bring stories to life that showcase the role of trash in everyday life. Finalists’ films will be premiered at the Let’s Talk Trash Film Gala, and the grand prize is \$500.
