WHEREAS, the Transportation Priorities 2006-09 program will be awarding \$57.75 million in transportation funds; and

WHEREAS, Metro provides regional transportation services that meet the objectives of the Transportation Priorities program; and

WHEREAS, Metro is an eligible recipient of these transportation funds to support its transportation activities; and

WHEREAS, Metro, as a regional transportation agency, may apply for transportation funding on behalf of local transportation agencies for projects and programs that cross local jurisdictional boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the Transportation Priorities 2006-09 program requires the governing body of an applicant agency to adopt at a public meeting a list of that agency's transportation project or program applications; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Metro Council endorses the list of applications identified on Exhibits A and B as Metro's priorities for Transportation Priorities funding.

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#### **STAFF REPORT**

#### IN CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION NO. 04-3466, FOR THE PURPOSE OF APPROVING METRO'S PRIORITIES FOR APPLICATION FOR REGIONAL FLEXIBLE TRANSPORTATION FUNDS THROUGH THE *TRANSPORTATION PRIORITIES 2006-09* PROGRAM.

#### BACKGROUND

Every two years, Metro conducts the Transportation Priorities program to select projects and programs for funding from the federal Surface Transportation Program and Congestion Mitigation/Air Quality funding sources. JPACT and the Metro Council recently adopted policy guidance for the award of these funds, identifying support of economic development in the regions priority land use areas (2040 mixed-use and industrial areas) as the primary objective of the program, along with other policy objectives. Metro is also eligible to apply to the Transportation Priorities program for funding or transportation projects, programs or planning.

The Transportation Priorities program intends to identify approximately \$57.75 million of transportation projects and programs for expenditure in the years 2008 and 2009. These funds represent approximately 4% of the transportation funds expended in the Metro region each year. Applications for the current program are due by June 30, 2004.

Applications to the Transportation Priorities program must be approved by the governing body of the applicant agency at a meeting open to the public as the priority of that agency for Transportation Priorities funding. Approval of this resolution intends to serve this purpose for Metro applications.

Exhibit A identifies potential Metro applications to the Transportation Priorities program for approval by Council. These include traditional Metro transportation programs previously funded from through the Transportation Priorities program such as federally required planning, the Transit Oriented Development program, and Corridor Planning. It also includes one-time projects to improve Metro's planning capabilities and services.

Exhibit B identifies potential Regional applications to the Transportation Priorities program in which Metro will participate as a regional partner with other agencies in the delivery of the project or program. Typically, these are large projects that serve or are located across more than one local jurisdiction and in which there is a regional coordination or planning role for Metro. These include planning and funding for rail transit and trail projects and the Regional Travel Options program.

#### ANALYSIS/INFORMATION

A summary of the applications, the amount of funding requested, relationship to previous funding awarded to these planning categories or programs, and relationship to Metro policies are summarized in Exhibits A and B.

- 1. Known Opposition None known at this time.
- 2. Legal Antecedents The applications recommended for Council endorsement respond to the Transportation Priorities 2006-09 policy guidance, adopted by Metro Resolution No. 04-3431 (FOR THE PURPOSE OF ADOPTING THE POLICY DIRECTION, PROGRAM OBJECTIVES, PROCEDURES AND CRITERIA FOR THE TRANSPORTATION PRIORITIES 2006-09 ALLOCATION PROCESS AND METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (MTIP), adopted March 18, 2004).
- **3.** Anticipated Effects Adoption of this resolution makes the applications to the Transportation Priorities 2006-09 program listed in Exhibits A and B eligible for consideration.
- 4. **Budget Impacts** Adoption of this resolution has no direct effect on the Metro budget. However, applications selected for funding will provide Metro with either planning or program funds that require a minimum 10.27% match from Metro funds. In some cases, match funds may be provided by other local agencies. Fund requests are provided in Exhibits A and B. Funding requests are for federal fiscal years 2008 and 2009 but in some cases may be advanced up to years 2006 or 2007.
