Moving forward with the regional Solid Waste Management Plan

We are forming a new planning partnership to update the regional solid waste plan. Our members, who represent citizens, refuse haulers, cities, counties, DEQ, the Port of Portland and Metro, serve on policy and technical committees.

These committees are expected to meet once a month to build a comprehensive solid waste system for the metropolitan area. Regional consensus on waste reduction and recycling, the types of facilities necessary, how they will be sited and where they will be located, will be the result of the project.

Major goal of the project is to reach consistency between the Solid Waste Management Plan, local land use plans and state programs.

Solid Waste Policy Committee

The Policy Committee, a 14-member group of elected/appointed officials, coordinates and guides the regional solid waste management planning program. The Policy Committee provides recommendations to the Metro Council on policy guidelines for the Regional Solid Waste Management Plan, including:

- the work program
- compliance with state requirements
- reduction goals
- identification of necessary facilities
- site selection process
- local comprehensive plan consistency
- citizen involvement

The Policy Committee will review and comment on work prepared by the Technical Committee. The Policy Committee will formulate recommendations for review and adoption by the Metro Council.

Solid Waste Technical Committee

The Technical Committee, a 22-member group of local government staff, solid waste industry representatives and citizens provides technical support to guide and coordinate the regional solid waste management planning process.

The committee will work closely with Metro staff and Metro's consultant team to develop all aspects of the Solid Waste Management Plan, including the following:

- project work program
- waste reduction goals and programs
- plan inventory review
- local comprehensive plan consistency
- regional values and criteria
- facilities
- site selection process
- citizen involvement

Recommendations from the Technical Committee will be reviewed by the Policy Committee prior to review and adoption by the Metro Council.
