WHEREAS, the Oregon Convention Center requires landscape maintenance services for the main facility and two offsite locations, (OCC main campus, OCC plaza across MLK, aka block 26, and MLK Heritage Marker Plaza at confluence of Grand Ave and MLK north of OCC); and

WHEREAS, Section 7(B) of the Metropolitan Exposition Recreation Commission's ("MERC")
Contracting and Purchasing Rules, requires competitive sealed bids under ORS Chapter 279C for public improvements such as this project; and

WHEREAS, MERC staff has evaluated the bids and ValleyScapes, is the lowest responsive and responsible bidder with a bid amount of one hundred fifteen thousand, nine hundred seventy & 00/100 (\$115,970.00); and

WHEREAS, the agreement allows for renewal options for up to 2 additional years;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Metropolitan Exposition Recreation Commission:

- Selects ValleyScapes as the lowest responsive and responsible bidder in response to the Request for Bids for the Oregon Convention Center – Landscape Maintenance Services.
- Approves the contract with ValleyScapes, in the form substantially similar to the attached Exhibit A.
- Authorizes the Deputy Chief Operating Officer of Metro to execute the contract on behalf of MERC.

#### **MERC Staff Report**

**Agenda Item/Issue:** For the purpose of approving a contract with ValleyScapes Environmental Solutions for Landscape Maintenance Services at the Oregon Convention Center.

**Resolution No:** 15-13

**Date:** July 1, 2015 **Presented by:** Scott Cruickshank

**Background**: OCC requires landscape maintenance services for the main facility and two offsite locations (OCC main campus, OCC plaza across MLK, aka block 26, and MLK Heritage Marker Plaza at confluence of Grand Ave and MLK north of OCC), while adhering to specific criteria for Salmon-Safe & LEED certifications. In addition, the landscape service contractor agrees to follow both Metro's and the OCC's Integrated Pest Management Plans while performing the required landscape maintenance services. The contractor will provide all labor, supervision, travel, equipment, tools, materials, supplies, tax and permits.

To provide a greater opportunity for attracting minority owned, women owned, or emerging small business contractors, staff separated the initial RFB into three separate contract opportunities (one for each site location). Additionally, MERC contracting code requires competitive sealed bids under ORS Chapter 279C for public improvements. As such, MERC is required to accept the lowest responsive and responsible bid. Through the venues' commitment to contracting with firms owned by and employing individuals from diverse backgrounds, MERC staff included in the bid documents good faith program requirements for outreach to the State of Oregon Certified Minority-Owned, Women-Owned and Emerging Small Business (MWESB) community and the First Opportunity Target Area (FOTA) community.

The program establishes procedures to maximize utilization of MBEs, WBEs and ESBs for MERC projects. The following steps required to help MERC monitor the usage of these firms, were outlined in the RFB and were included in the evaluation of bids:

- 1. Identify areas in which Bidder intends to use sub-contractors.
- 2. Attend the Pre-Bid meeting if held. Meet any MBE/WBE/ESB firms at the Pre-Bid meeting.
- 3. Contact several (or all) certified MBE/WBE/ESB firms listed (with the State of Oregon) to perform the work needed.

Metro Procurement Services can provide Bidder with a list of firms upon request bidsandproposals@oregonmetro.gov.

- 4. Negotiate with interested, available and capable MBE/WBE/ESB firms who submit competitive bids.
- 5. Report to MERC all sub-contractors contacted. Please include their response and price quoted.
- 6. List all sub-contractors that Bidder intend to use on this project.

Please note a selected MBE/WBE/ESB firm must be used unless MERC authorizes a substitution after contract award.

The following MBE/WBE/ESB Program forms are to be completed and returned as part of your Bid submission. Contact Procurement services at bidsandproposals@oregonmetro.gov if additional information is required.

On March 9, 2015, MERC staff posted the solicitation with three separate contract opportunities in OPRIN, as well as published it in the online version of El Hispanic News and the Daily Journal of Commerce. Staff received no MWESB or FOTA bids on any of the 3 sites.

On May 14, 2015, MERC staff re-posted a solicitation in ORPIN that combined the three areas into one contract opportunity. MERC staff received two bids from qualified landscaping contractors. Neither firm was FOTA or MWESB certified. The lowest responsible and responsive bidder was ValleyScapes Environmental Solutions.

Fiscal Impact: This contract expense is budgeted in the OCC budget on an annual basis.

**Recommendation:** Staff recommends that the Metropolitan Exposition-Recreation Commission, by Resolution No. 15-13, approve the contract award and written contract (attached hereto) with ValleyScapes Environmental Solutions for Landscape Maintenance Services for the Oregon Convention Center; for a period of one year in the amount of one hundred fifteen thousand, nine hundred seventy & 00/100 (\$115,970.00). This agreement may be renewed or extended for two additional one-year periods at MERC's sole discretion, for a total amount of three hundred seventy-five thousand and 00/110 dollars (\$375,000).

#### For Public Contracts \$50,000 & Above

THIS Contract is entered into between Metropolitan Exposition Recreation Commission (MERC), an appointed commission of Metro, whose address is 600 NE Grand Avenue, Portland, Oregon 97232-2736, and ValleyScapes, whose address is PO Box 3461, Gresham, OR 97030, hereinafter referred to as the "CONTRACTOR."

THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

#### ARTICLE I SCOPE OF WORK

CONTRACTOR shall perform the work and/or deliver to MERC the goods described in the Scope of Work attached hereto as Attachment A. All services and goods shall be of good quality and, otherwise, in accordance with the Scope of Work.

#### ARTICLE II TERM OF CONTRACT

The term of this Contract shall be for the period commencing **July 1**, **2015** through and including **June 30**, **2018**. This agreement may be renewed or extended for two additional one-year periods at MERC's sole discretion.

### ARTICLE III CONTRACT SUM AND TERMS OF PAYMENT

Contractor shall perform the above work for a maximum price not to exceed **Three Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand AND NO/100<sup>TH</sup> DOLLARS (\$375,000.00)**.

The maximum price includes all fees, costs and expenses of whatever nature. Each of MERC's payments to Contractor shall equal the percentage of the work Contractor accomplished during the billing period. Contractor's billing invoices shall include the MERC contract number, Contractor name, remittance address, invoice date, invoice number, invoice amount, tax amount (if applicable), and an itemized statement of work performed and expenses incurred during the billing period, and will not be submitted more frequently than once a month. Contractor's billing invoices shall be sent to metroaccountspayable@oregonmetro.gov. The MERC contract number and contractor name shall be referenced in the email subject line. MERC requests that contractors submit billing invoices for services within 10 business days of performance. Payment shall be made by MERC on a Net 30 day basis upon approval of Contractor invoice.

#### ARTICLE IV LIABILITY AND INDEMNITY

CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor and assumes full responsibility for the content of its work and performance of CONTRACTOR'S labor, and assumes full responsibility for all liability for bodily injury or physical damage to person or property arising out of or related to this Contract, and shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless MERC, its agents and employees, from any and all claims, demands, damages, actions, losses, and expenses arising out of or in any way connected with its performance of this Contract. CONTRACTOR is solely responsible for paying CONTRACTOR'S subcontractors and nothing contained herein shall create or be construed to create any contractual relationship between any subcontractor(s) and MERC.

#### ARTICLE V TERMINATION

MERC may terminate this Contract upon giving CONTRACTOR seven (7) days written notice. In the event of termination, CONTRACTOR shall be entitled to payment for work performed to the date of termination. MERC shall not be liable for indirect, consequential damages or any other damages. Termination by MERC will not waive any claim or remedies it may have against CONTRACTOR.

#### ARTICLE VI INSURANCE & BONDS

CONTRACTOR shall purchase and maintain at the CONTRACTOR'S expense, the following types of insurance, covering the CONTRACTOR, its employees, and agents:

- A. The most recently approved ISO (Insurance Services Office) Commercial General Liability policy, or its equivalent, written on an occurrence basis, with limits not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$1,000,000 aggregate. The policy will include coverage for bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, contractual liability, premises and products/completed operations. CONTRACTOR'S coverage will be primary as respects METRO;
- B. Automobile insurance with coverage for bodily injury and property damage and with limits not less than minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence;
- C. Workers' Compensation insurance meeting Oregon statutory requirements including Employer's Liability with limits not less than \$500,000 per accident or disease.

METRO, MERC, its elected officials, departments, employees, and agents shall be named as ADDITIONAL INSUREDS on Commercial General Liability and Automobile policies.

CONTRACTOR shall provide to MERC 30 days notice of any material change or policy cancellation.

CONTRACTOR shall provide MERC with a Certificate of Insurance complying with this article upon return of the CONTRACTOR signed agreement to MERC. Certificate of Insurance shall identify the MERC contract number.

CONTRACTOR shall not be required to provide the liability insurance described in this Article only if an express exclusion relieving CONTRACTOR of this requirement is contained in the Scope of Work.

In addition, for public works subject to ORS 279C.800 to 279C.870, CONTRACTOR and every subcontractor shall have a public works bond required by 2005 Oregon Laws Chapter 360 filed with the Construction Contractors Board before starting work on the project, unless exempt under Section 2 of 2005 Oregon Laws Chapter 360.

#### ARTICLE VII PUBLIC CONTRACTS

All applicable provisions of ORS chapters 187 and 279A, 279B, and 279C and all other terms and conditions necessary to be inserted into public contracts in the State of Oregon, are hereby incorporated as if such provision were a part of this Agreement. Specifically, it is a condition of this contract that CONTRACTOR and all employers working under this Agreement are subject employers that will comply with ORS 656.017 as required by 1989 Oregon Laws, Chapter 684.

For public work subject to ORS 279C.800 to 279C.870, the CONTRACTOR shall pay prevailing wages. If such public work is subject both to ORS 279C.800 to 279C.870 and to 40 U.S.C. 276a, the CONTRACTOR and every subcontractor on such public work shall pay at least the higher prevailing wage. The CONTRACTOR and each subcontractor shall pay workers not less than the specified minimum hourly rate of wage in accordance with Section 7 of 2005 Oregon Laws Chapter 360. MERC shall pay an administrative fee as provided in ORS 279C.825(1) to the Bureau of Labor and Industries pursuant to the administrative rules established by the Commissioner of Labor and Industries. CONTRACTORS must promptly pay, as due, all persons supplying to such contractor labor or material used in this contract. If the CONTRACTOR or first-tier subcontractor fails, neglects, or refuses to make payment to a person furnishing labor or materials in connection with the public contract for a public improvement within 30 days after receipt of payment from the public contracting agency or a contractor, the CONTRACTOR or first-tier subcontractor shall owe the person the amount due plus shall pay interest in accordance with ORS 279C.515. If the CONTRACTOR or first-tier subcontractor fails, neglects, or refuses to make payment, to a person furnishing labor or materials in connection with the public contract, the person may file a complaint with the Construction Contractors Board, unless payment is subject to a good faith dispute as defined in ORS 279C.580. CONTRACTOR must pay any and all contributions and amounts due to the Industrial Accident Fund from contractor or subcontractor and incurred in the performance of the contract. No liens or claims are permitted to be filed against MERC on account of any labor or material furnished. CONTRACTORS are required to pay the Department of Revenue all sums withheld from employees pursuant to ORS 316.167.

For public improvement work all CONTRACTORS must demonstrate that an employee drug-testing program is in place.

### ARTICLE VIII MODIFICATIONS

MERC may approve changes and modifications to the original contract, including deletions of work, order of additional materials, and additional services reasonably related to the original work scope. Contractor may propose changes in the work that Contractor believes are necessary, will result in higher quality work, improve safety, decrease the amount of the contract, or otherwise result in a better or more efficient work product. If such changes are approved by MERC, they shall be executed by written contract amendment signed by both parties. Such changes shall not relieve Contractor of any obligation or warranty under the contract. No oral statements by either party shall modify or affect the terms of the contract.

# ARTICLE IX QUALITY OF GOODS AND SERVICES

Unless otherwise specified, all materials shall be new and both workmanship and materials shall be of the highest quality. All workers and subcontractors shall be skilled in their trades. CONTRACTOR guarantees all work against defects in material or workmanship for a period of one (1) year from the date of acceptance or final payment by MERC, whichever is later. All guarantees and warranties of goods furnished to CONTRACTOR or subcontractors by any manufacturer or supplier shall be deemed to run to the benefit of MERC.

## ARTICLE X OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

Unless otherwise provided herein, all documents, instruments and media of any nature produced by CONTRACTOR pursuant to this agreement are Work Products and are the property of MERC, including but not limited to: drawings, specifications, reports, scientific or theoretical modeling, electronic media, computer software created or altered specifically for the purpose of completing the Scope of Work, works of art and photographs. Unless otherwise provided herein, upon MERC request, CONTRACTOR shall promptly provide MERC with an electronic version of all Work Products that have been produced or recorded in electronic media. MERC and CONTRACTOR agree that all work Products are works made for hire and Contractor hereby conveys, transfers, and grants to MERC all rights of reproduction and the copyright to all such Work Products.

- A. CONTRACTOR and subcontractors shall maintain all fiscal records relating to such contracts in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. In addition, CONTRACTOR and subcontractors shall maintain any other records necessary to clearly document:
  - 1. The performance of the CONTRACTOR, including but not limited to the contractor's compliance with contract plans and specifications, compliance with fair contracting and employment programs, compliance with Oregon law on the payment of wages and accelerated payment provisions; and compliance with any and all requirements imposed on the CONTRACTOR or subcontractor under the terms of the contract or subcontract;
  - 2. Any claims arising from or relating to the performance of the CONTRACTOR or subcontractor under a public contract:
  - 3. Any cost and pricing data relating to the contract; and
  - 4. Payments made to all suppliers and subcontractors.
- B. CONTRACTOR and subcontractors shall maintain records for the longer period of (a.) six years from the date of final completion of the contract to which the records relate or (b.) until the conclusion of any audit, controversy or litigation arising out of or related to the contract.
- C. CONTRACTOR and subcontractors shall make records available to METRO, and its authorized representatives, including but not limited to the staff of any METRO department and the staff of the METRO Auditor, within the boundaries of the METRO region, at reasonable times and places regardless of whether litigation has been filed on any claims. If the records are not made available within the boundaries of METRO, the CONTRACTOR or subcontractor agrees to bear all

of the costs for METRO employees, and any necessary consultants hired by METRO, including but not limited to the costs of travel, per diem sums, salary, and any other expenses that Metro incurs, in sending its employees or consultants to examine, audit, inspect, and copy those records. If the CONTRACTOR elects to have such records outside these boundaries, the costs paid by the CONTRACTOR to METRO for inspection, auditing, examining and copying those records shall not be recoverable costs in any legal proceeding.

- D. CONTRACTOR and subcontractors authorize and permit METRO and its authorized representatives, including but not limited to the staff of any METRO department and the staff of the METRO Auditor, to inspect, examine, copy and audit the books and records of CONTRACTOR or subcontractor, including tax returns, financial statements, other financial documents and any documents that may be placed in escrow according to any contract requirements. METRO shall keep any such documents confidential to the extent permitted by Oregon law, subject to the provisions of section E.
- E. CONTRACTOR and subcontractors agree to disclose the records requested by METRO and agree to the admission of such records as evidence in any proceeding between METRO and the CONTRACTOR or subcontractor, including, but not limited to, a court proceeding, arbitration, mediation or other alternative dispute resolution process.
- F. CONTRACTOR and subcontractors agree that in the event such records disclose that METRO is owed any sum of money or establish that any portion of any claim made against Metro is not warranted, the CONTRACTOR or subcontractor shall pay all costs incurred by METRO in conducting the audit and inspection. Such costs may be withheld from any sum that is due or that becomes due from METRO.
- G. Failure of the CONTRACTOR or subcontractor to keep or disclose records as required by this document or any solicitation document may result in disqualification as a bidder or proposer for future METRO contracts as provided in ORS 279B.130 and Metro Code Section 2.04.070(c), or may result in a finding that the CONTRACTOR or subcontractor is not a responsible bidder or proposer as provided in ORS 279B.110 and Metro Code Section 2.04.052.

#### ARTICLE XI SUBCONTRACTORS

CONTRACTOR shall contact MERC prior to negotiating any subcontracts and CONTRACTOR shall obtain approval from MERC before entering into any subcontracts for the performance of any of the services and/or supply of any of the goods covered by this Contract.

MERC reserves the right to reasonably reject any subcontractor or supplier and no increase in the CONTRACTOR'S compensation shall result thereby. All subcontracts related to this Contract shall include the terms and conditions of this agreement. CONTRACTOR shall be fully responsible for all of its subcontractors as provided in Article IV.

## ARTICLE XII RIGHT TO WITHHOLD PAYMENTS

MERC shall have the right to withhold from payments due CONTRACTOR such sums as necessary, in MERC's sole opinion, to protect MERC against any loss, damage or claim which may result from CONTRACTOR'S performance or failure to perform under this agreement or the failure of CONTRACTOR to make proper payment to any suppliers or subcontractors. In addition for public improvement work, if a CONTRACTOR is required to file certified statements under ORS 279C.845, MERC shall retain 25 percent of any amount earned by the CONTRACTOR on the public works until the contractor has filed all required certified statements with MERC.

If a liquidated damages provision is contained in the Scope of Work and if CONTRACTOR has, in MERC's opinion, violated that provision, MERC shall have the right to withhold from payments due CONTRACTOR such sums as shall satisfy that provision. All sums withheld by MERC under this Article shall become the property of MERC and CONTRACTOR shall have no right to such sums to the extent that CONTRACTOR has breached this Contract.

#### ARTICLE XIII SAFETY

If services of any nature are to be performed pursuant to this agreement, CONTRACTOR shall take all necessary precautions for the safety of employees and others in the vicinity of the services being performed and shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state and local safety laws and building codes, including the acquisition of any required permits.

# ARTICLE XIV INTEGRATION OF CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

All of the provisions of any procurement documents including, but not limited to, the Advertisement for Bids, Proposals or responses, General and Special Instructions to Bidders, Proposal, Scope of Work, and Specifications which were utilized in conjunction with the bidding of this Contract are hereby expressly incorporated by reference. Otherwise, this Contract represents the entire and integrated agreement between MERC and CONTRACTOR and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations or agreements, either written or oral. This Contract may be amended only by written instrument signed by both MERC and CONTRACTOR. The laws of the state of Oregon shall govern the construction and interpretation of this Contract.

### ARTICLE XV COMPLIANCE

CONTRACTOR shall comply with federal, state, and local laws, statutes, and ordinances relative to the execution of the work. This requirement includes, but is not limited to, non-discrimination, safety and health, environmental protection, waste reduction and recycling, fire protection, permits, fees and similar subjects.

### ARTICLE XVI INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

Pursuant to ORS 279A and the Metro public contract code, Metro participates in an Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing program by which other public agencies shall have the ability to purchase the goods and services under the terms and conditions of this awarded contract. Any such purchases shall be between the Contractor and the participating public agency and shall not impact the Contractor's obligation to Metro under this agreement. Any estimated purchase volumes listed herein do not include volumes for other public agencies, and Metro makes no guarantee as to their participation in any purchase. Any Contractor may decline to extend the prices and terms of this solicitation to any or all other public agencies upon execution of this contract. Unless the Contractor specifically declines to participate in the program by marking the box below, the Contractor agrees to participate in the Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing program. Contractor declines to participate in the Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing program or is not applicable to this Contract as indicated by the following initials \_\_\_\_\_\_\_.

#### ARTICLE XVII SITUS

The situs of this Agreement is Portland, Oregon. Any litigation over this agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Oregon and shall be conducted in the Circuit Court of the state of Oregon for Multnomah County, or, if jurisdiction is proper, in the U.S. District Court for the District of Oregon.

# ARTICLE XVIII ASSIGNMENT

CONTRACTOR shall not assign any rights or obligations under or arising from this Contract without prior written consent from MERC.

#### ARTICLE XIV SEVERABILITY

The parties agree that any provision of this Contract that is held to be illegal, invalid, or unenforceable under present or future laws shall be fully severable. The parties further agree that this Contract shall be construed and enforced as if the illegal, invalid, or unenforceable provision had never been a part of them and the remaining provisions of the Contract shall remain in full force and effect and shall not be affected by the illegal, invalid, or unenforceable provision or by its

Any failure by MERC to enforce a provision of the Contract is not to be construed as a waiver by MERC of this right to do so.

#### 1. Purpose and Goal of Work

Perform weekly and seasonal landscape services for the Oregon Convention Center and two satellite site locations while adhering to the specific pesticide application practices and reporting requirements outlined in contract.

#### 2. Description of the Scope of Work

#### **General Requirements**

- a. Contractor shall follow OCC's Integrated Pest Management Plan IPM (Exhibit B) and Metro's Integrated Pest Management Policy (Exhibit C).
- b. Contractor shall adhere to the Salmon-Safe Certification Standards & "High Risk" Pesticides List (Exhibit D) for any pesticides used onsite. Proposed use of any pesticide on Salmon-Safe's "High Risk" list must be documented and approved prior to application and demonstrate a clear need for use, that no safer alternative exists, and that the method of application (such as timing, location, and amount used) presents negligible risk to water quality and fish habitat. The Oregon Convention Center may seek counsel from Salmon-Safe staff regarding the use of specific pesticides onsite to approval.
- c. Contractor shall follow the City and County of San Francisco's Guide to Reduced Risk Pesticide List (Exhibit E) and Hazard Tier Review of Pesticide Products reviewed by the City and County of San Francisco as required by LEED for pesticides used onsite (Exhibit F).
- d. Contractor shall notify OCC in advance if pesticides other than those identified as least toxic as defined by the City and County of San Francisco's pesticide hazard tier review list are going to be applied on site. OCC requires notification of intent to use of any pesticide listed as Tier I or Tier II on the San Francisco pesticide hazard screening list at least five (5) days prior to application. OCC is required to provide written notification to building occupants and site visitors no less than 72 hours before a Tier I or Tier II pesticide is applied on surrounding grounds under normal conditions. A least toxic chemical pesticide is any pesticide product for which all active ingredients and known inert ingredients meet the least toxic Tier III hazard criteria under the City and County of San Francisco's hazard screening protocol.
- e. OCC is required to inform site visitors of pesticide applications through the use of notification signs. Contractor will post these signs immediately before an application begins in clearly visible locations onsite.
- f. Contractor will use only organic fertilizer on landscaping.
- g. Contractor's employees must possess valid state pesticide applicator licenses at the time of planning and application of pesticides. The applicator license in the state defined category appropriate for the particular application is required.
- h. Contractor will ensure all pruning will be done in accordance with ANSI A300 standards
- i. Contractor will ensure Amur maples are pruned by ISA certified arborist
- Contractor will provide an account manager to work with the owner throughout the term of contract.

#### **Administrative Requirements**

- a. Contractor will provide a monthly work schedule for review by owner prior to any work being performed onsite. This is to ensure there are no conflicts with the building event schedule.
- b. Contractor's staff must check in/out each visit at the security office located on the main loading dock.
- c. Contractor must notify Oregon Convention Center (OCC) manager five days prior to applying any pesticide application (date, type of chemical, location, etc.) OCC will send a notice to employees and post the notice at the visitor information center for attendees to view and notifying them the intent to apply pesticides, etc.
- d. Notification signage will need to be set the day pesticide application takes place by a contractor. Contractor will pick up signs from OCC security office or main loading dock when they check in for the day. Contractor will place signs in visible areas where spraying application(s) is taking place. OCC will assign staff to remove signage at end of day and return to the signs to the security office on main loading dock for the next use.
- e. Contractor will be required to complete a pesticide application pre-approval form, submit the pesticide's SDS, and receive approval from OCC prior to any pesticide being used onsite (see Exhibit G).

- f. Contractor will maintain a detailed log of all pesticides/herbicides/and fertilizers used onsite, including dates, type, and amounts applied, etc. (see Exhibit H). Each month the contractor will mail a hard copy of the pesticide log and email an electronic Excel version of the pesticide log to owner.
- g. Contractor will submit a monthly total of all landscape generated debris recycled from the site.
- h. Contractor will submit in writing that their staff has been informed of the OCC and Metro Integrated Pest Management Policy, Salmon-Safe certification and associated LEED requirements.
- i. Contractor's account manager shall conduct monthly walkthroughs with owner to ensure work is being completed as described, identify issues or concerns and relay information to contractor's staff to be corrected during visits. This includes monitoring the overall health of all landscape, plants and trees, including irrigation needs, and make recommendations to remedy if issues exist.
- Contractor will invoice OCC monthly, listing services completed. Invoice shall include the date and type of service performed.

The Contractor will use the consumer price index to determine any annual price increases after year three of the contract.

#### **Additional Work**

The above landscape maintenance requirements are what have been identified as regular/routine maintenance. Additional work of the same nature may be required of the contractor, depending on different variables. Upon request by Metro, for non-routine maintenance, plant replacements, and renovations and for hourly rate work with adequate plans and specifications or written directions, the Contractor shall prepare and submit a written estimate of labor, equipment, and materials which will be required to perform work specified. Contractor must use the hourly rate submitted with its proposal in calculating estimates. This work may then be performed only with Metro's written authorization. Upon authorization, actual work shall not exceed the Contractor's estimate without Metro's prior written approval.

Metro reserves the right, for non-routine maintenance, plant replacements and renovations, to procure separately any of these projects.
