Welcome and introductions

Peter Mohr welcomed the committee and thanked them for attending.

Parks and Nature director recruitment

Interim Parks and Nature director Don Robertson said the director recruitment was posted in mid-March and is scheduled to close on April 21. He anticipates a decision being made in mid-June, with a new director on board in late July or early August. Don will continue his role as interim director and is open to helping with the transition.

Program updates

Acquisition

Dan Moeller announced the following properties were acquired since the last committee meeting:

- A trail easement in the Westside Trail target area secures land needed to continue the development of the Westside Trail as it bypasses an extremely steep slope on the north side of Bull Mountain. Securing this trail segment ensures that the City of Tigard will be able construct this segment of the Westside Trail, connecting local residents to several natural areas and parks in the immediate vicinity including the future Sunrise Park and Cach Natural Area to the southwest, the Ascension Trail to the east, and Northview Park and Barrows Park to the north.
- A 1.4-acre property in the Deep Creek target area along the Cazadero Trail in Boring will further Metro's efforts to preserve the canyons and streams of Deep Creek. The acquisition contributes toward increasing the impact of the 40-acre Metro-owned Deep Creek Natural Area and also allows Metro to remove the remaining house immediately adjacent to the Cazadero trail, improving the safety and visitor experience on this portion of the regional trail.
- A small, three-acre property in the East Buttes target area is surrounded to the north by approximately 200 acres of open space owned by the City of Gresham. It is also near Metroowned Gabbert Hill east and Gabbert Butte, forming an additional 100 contiguous acres of protected land. A significant amount of wildlife activity has been observed in and around

Gabbert Butte and the acquisition of this property provides additional protection of a habitat corridor. This property will also be included in the ongoing master planning effort for Gabbert Butte and it is expected that it will support a future formal trail alignment.

Dashboard reports

Brian Kennedy reviewed the dashboard reports. He noted staff are currently reviewing the trails dashboard to assess current progress and will report in more detail at the next committee meeting.

Local share and capital grant programs

The local share dashboard displays just those jurisdictions that have not yet completed their local share spending. Approximately 96 percent of local share funds have been spent to date. All of the capital grant funds have been awarded.

Bond capital projects

Brian reviewed the bond capital project dashboard. For some of the projects, planning efforts have taken a little longer to get started than others. All projects are on track except the Marine Drive Trail project, which has been delayed while an IGA is negotiated with the levee district.

Financial report

Brian noted Metro has paid more than \$1 million in local share reimbursements and \$1 million in capital grant reimbursements to date. Overall administrative costs are under 8.3 percent. There is still \$28.5 million in bonds yet to sell. Staff are working with the finance department to determine the best possible time to sell those bonds, targeting spring 2018.

Committee recruitment, changes to Metro Code

With passage of the second levy, the Metro Council required citizen oversight of that program. Instead of creating a new committee, staff are recommending adding that charge to the Natural Areas Program Performance Oversight Committee. Some of the requirements are embedded in Metro Code and legislation will be submitted recommending this change, as well as recommendations to reduce the minimum number of committee members from 13 to nine, and sunsetting the capital grant review committee. Staff also anticipate adding several new committee members this summer. Council would still have authority to approve additional grants in the event current awards fall through.

Capital projects update

Parks Planning manager Rod Wojtanik talked about the work of the parks planning team. He shared a map showing developed and future park facilities. Discussion was held about the equity component and Connect with Nature program, which helps direct and facilitate parks planning conversations with underserved communities.

Gabbert Butte Natural Area

Parks planner Olena Turula provided an update on the Gabbert Butte Natural Area project (see attached presentation).

Farmington Paddle Launch

Parks planner Tannen Printz spoke about the Farmington Paddle Launch project (see attached presentation).

Acquisition update

Dan Moeller said during a discussion with Metro Council several months ago, they asked about staff's strategy for spending the remaining bond funds. The attached pie chart shows the projections for spending when the bond passed in 2006. The acquisition team meets weekly to discuss acquisition priorities and opportunities.

Next meeting

The next meeting will be in June 2017.

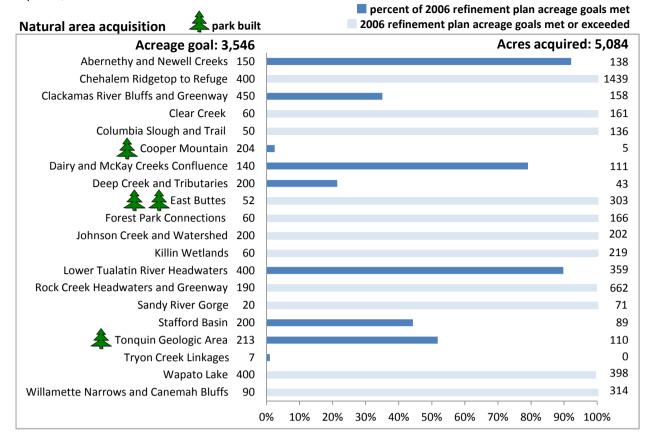

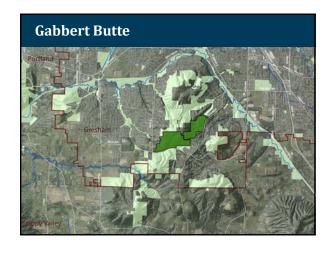


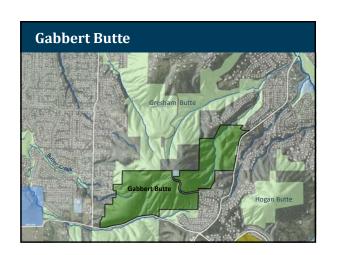


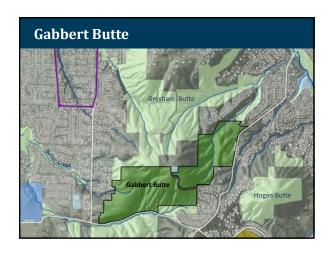


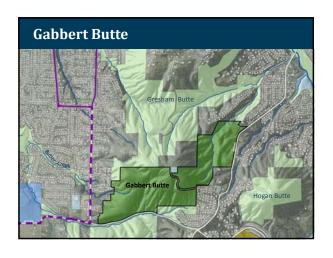


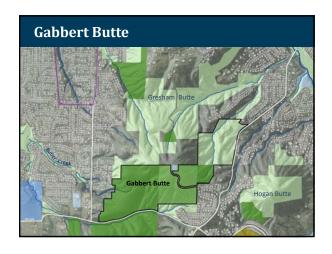




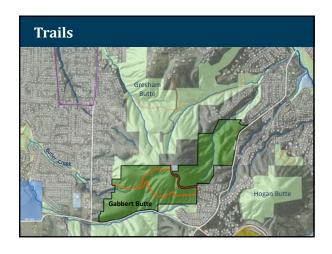


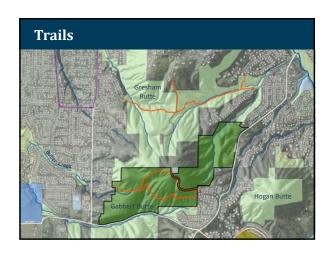














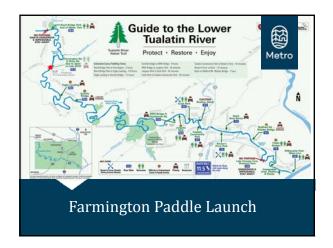


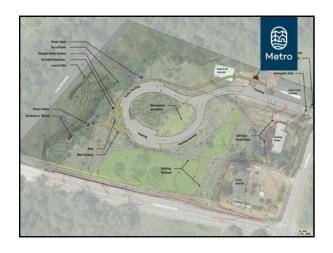


















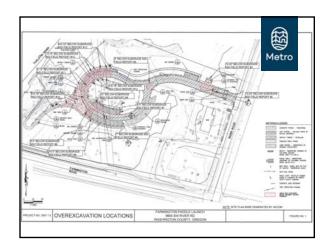














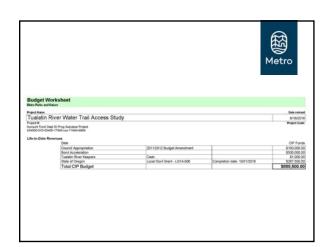










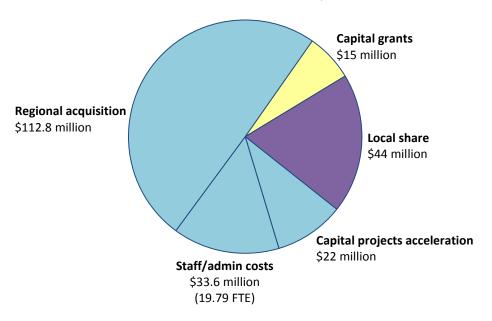




2006 Natural Areas bond program

The 2006 natural areas bond measure has funded 52 Nature in Neighborhood capital grant projects, and more than 100 additional community projects through the local share component. Regional acquisition in 27 target areas has focused on high-quality habitat and closing trail gaps. Capital improvement projects are underway at several Metro sites.

2006 natural areas bond total allocation: \$227.4 million



Bond funds remaining: \$55.8 million

Capital grant disbursements remaining: **\$8.3 million**Local share disbursements remaining: **\$2.7 million**Capital project costs remaining: **\$13.9 million**

Staff and administrative costs through June 2020: \$12.2 million

Funds remaining for acquisition and stabilization: \$18.7 million
