For the purpose of selecting CMJ Construction, Inc as the lowest responsive and responsible bidder in response to Request For Bids relating to Oregon Convention Center Expansion Operations Remodel (Phase I), and authorizing the General Manager to execute a contract with CMJ Construction.

WHEREAS, the remodeling of the Oregon Convention Center Operations locker and break room areas is budgeted within the OCC Expansion Project, pending available funding; and

WHEREAS, funds have become available through savings in the OCC Expansion Project and are available to finance the OCC Operations Remodel (Phase I); and,

WHEREAS, Section 6.1 of the Commission's Purchasing Policies And Guidelines delegates authority to the General Manager to prepare and approve Request for Bids (RFB) documents and to solicit bids; and

WHEREAS, MERC staff, under the direction of the General Manager, prepared and issued a Request for Bids for the Oregon Convention Center Operations Remodel (Phase I); and

WHEREAS, four (4) bidders submitted bids in response to the Request for Bids for the OCC Operations Remodel Phase I; and

WHEREAS, Section 6.1 of the Commission's Purchasing Policies And Guidelines requires the Commission to select the lowest responsive and responsible bidder, approve the contract award, and approve the written contract by resolution; and

WHEREAS, MERC staff has evaluated the bids, and CMJ Construction, Inc. is the lowest responsive and responsible bidder.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED as follows:

- The Metropolitan Exposition-Recreation Commission selects CMJ Construction, Inc. as the lowest responsive and responsible bidder in response to Request For Bids for OCC Operations Remodel (Phase I);
- The Metropolitan Exposition-Recreation Commission approves the award of a contract, in a form substantially similar to the attached Exhibit "A," to CMJ Construction, Inc.:
- The Metropolitan Exposition-Recreation Commission authorizes the General Manager to execute the contract on behalf of the Commission.

MERC STAFF REPORT

Agenda Item/Issue: Accepting CMJ Construction, Inc.'s bid for the Oregon Convention Center Operations Remodel Phase I, and authorizing the MERC General Manager to execute a contract with CMJ Construction, Inc.

<u>Background</u>: The remodel of the Oregon Convention Center Operations' locker and break room areas (Phase I) was identified in the OCC Expansion Project as GMP Alternate #20. Funding for this work was originally approved via MERC Resolution 02-14 dated April 24, 2002 through Change Order #2 to the GMP contract with Hoffman Construction. However, Change Order #2 (REVISED) to the GMP, approved via MERC Resolution 02-33 on October 23, 2002, re-allocated the funds to other priority projects. The OCC Operations Remodel (Phase I) project was put on hold pending availability of future funding.

Due to recently identified GMP savings from the OCC Expansion Project, funds have become available to proceed with OCC Operations' Remodel (Phase I). An RFP for this work was released May 5, 2003. On May 29, 2003 bids were received from (4) general contractors. Bids were reviewed by Tary Carlson, OCC Expansion and Mark Hunter, MERC. On June 2, 2003 notice was given to all general contractor bidders that it was determined CMJ Construction, Inc. was the low responsive and responsible bidder with a bid of \$299, 347.00.

On June 6, 2003, the OCC Expansion Office received a letter from Pacific Coast Construction protesting the award of the contract to CMJ Construction, Inc. Pacific Coast Construction is the apparent second lowest responsive and responsible bidder with a bid of \$309,730, a difference of \$10,383. The basis of the protest was that CMJ Construction, Inc. had not complied with the bid documents which required that any certified minority subcontractor that attends the pre-bid meeting, documented by a published sign-in sheet, will be contacted as part of the good faith effort to involve minority subcontractors. The protest letter identified a minority subcontractor that had attended the May 15, 2003 pre-bid meeting, but was not listed as having been contacted by CMJ Construction, Inc on their good faith effort contact log.

CMJ Construction, Inc. was contacted at the request of Lisa Umscheid, Metro Counsel, and asked if they had contacted the minority subcontractor listed on the pre-bid sign-in sheet prior to bid. CMJ Construction, Inc. provided a fax indicating they had contacted this minority subcontractor prior to bid. It should be noted that CMJ Construction, Inc. also provided a fax indicating the proposed scope of work to be performed by the subcontractor mentioned above would, in fact, be self-performed by CMJ Construction, Inc.

The Acting MERC General Manager and Metro Legal Counsel reviewed Pacific Coast Construction's protest, and determined that Pacific Coast Construction's protest does not appear to have merit.

Fiscal Impact: OCC Operations Remodel Phase I was approved and budgeted within the OCC Expansion Fund at \$360,000.00 for the construction, design, fees and associated costs. Funds are available to finance this work through both FY 02-03 and FY 03-04.

Recommendation: Staff recommends that the Metropolitan Exposition-Recreation Commission accept CMJ Construction, Inc. as the lowest responsive and responsible bidder and authorize the MERC General Manager to execute a contract with CMJ Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$299,347.00 for the Oregon Convention Center Operations Remodel (Phase I).

SECTION 00500 CONSTRUCTION AGREEMENT

Contract # 925101

This Construction Agreement is made by and between CMJ Construction, Inc. PO Box 68374, Portland, OR 97268, hereinafter called Contractor and the Metropolitan Exposition-Recreation Commission; a metropolitan commission established by METRO to renovate, maintain and operate metropolitan convention, trade and spectator facilities pursuant to ORS 268.395, 268.400 and 268.310(6); hereinafter called MERC for the Oregon Convention Center, Operations Remodel Phase I Project.

The Contractor and MERC agree as follows:

1. Contract Documents

The Contract Documents consist of this Construction Agreement, the Advertisement for Bids, the Invitation to Bid, the Instructions to Bidders, the Bid Forms (including Bid price sheet with signature pages, Surety name request, Resident/Non-resident Bidder Status, Non-Collusion Affidavit, Bid Bond, MBE/WBE Business Program Compliance forms, MBE/WBE Utilization forms, the Certificate of Compliance for Recycled Materials), Prevailing Wage Rate Compliance, the Performance and the Labor and Materials Payment Bonds, the General Conditions, the Supplementary Conditions, the Technical Specifications, the Drawings, the approved and updated Construction Schedule, and other information and data as listed in the Supplementary Conditions, and any modifications of any of the foregoing in the form of Addenda or Change Orders in accordance with the terms of the Contract. Where applicable, reference to this Construction Agreement herein shall be deemed to refer to all of the Contract Documents.

These documents form the Contract and are, by this reference, expressly incorporated herein. All are as fully a part of the Contract as if attached to this Construction Agreement and repeated fully herein. No amendment made to this Contract nor Change Order issued shall be construed to release either party from any obligation contained in the Contract Documents except as specifically provided in any such amendment or Change Order.

2. Scope of Work

Contractor agrees to provide all labor, tools, equipment, machinery, supervision, transportation, permits and every other item and service necessary to perform the Work described in the Contract Documents. Contractor agrees to fully comply with each and every term, condition and provision of the Contract Documents.

3. Contract Amount

As consideration for Contractor's performance hereunder, MERC agrees to pay Contractor the Contract Amount as adjusted by approved Change Orders issued pursuant to the Contract Documents. Contractor agrees to accept the Contract Amount as full payment for Contractor's performance of the above described Work. Contractors must promptly pay, as due, all persons supplying to such contractor labor or material used in this contract. If the contractor or first-tier subcontractor fails, neglects, or refuses to make payment to a person furnishing labor or materials in connection with the public contract for a public improvement within 30 days after receipt of payment from MERC or a contractor, the contractor or first-tier subcontractor shall owe the person the amount due plus shall pay interest in accordance with ORS 279.314. If the contractor or first-tier subcontractor fails, neglects, or refuses to make payment the person may file a complaint with the Construction Contractors Board unless to a good faith dispute as defined by ORS 297.445. Contactor must pay any and all contributions and amounts due to the Industrial Accident Fund from contractor or subcontractor and incurred in the performance of the contract. No liens or claims are permitted to be filed against METRO or MERC on account of any labor or material furnished. Contractors are required to pay the Department of Revenue all sums withheld from employees pursuant to ORS 316.167.

The Contract Amount is \$299,347.00 (Two hundred ninety-nine thousand, three hundred forty-seven and 00/100 dollars). MERC shall make payments to Contractor in the manner and at the times provided in the Contract Documents.

4. Additional or Deleted Work

Contractor shall, when so instructed by MERC under the procedures of the Contract Documents, perform additional Work or delete Work in accordance with the Contract Documents. Any increase or decrease in the Contract Amount shall be determined pursuant to the applicable provisions of the Contract Documents.

5. Time of Completion; Adjusted Payments

Time is of the essence of this Construction Agreement. The Contract Time shall commence upon issuance of the Notice to Proceed which is anticipated to be issued upon execution of the contract by the last week in July. Contractor shall commence work under this Contract within no more than (10) calendar days after issuance of written Notice to Proceed. Contractor shall bring the work to substantial completion no later than August 31, 2003, final completion within (30) days. By executing this Construction Agreement, Contractor confirms and accepts that the Contract Time so stated is a reasonable period for performance of all of the Work.

If Contractor fails to substantially complete the Work, within the Contract Time, as determined by MERC in accordance with the Contract Documents, Contractor may be subject to liquated damages to MERC as described in the Contract Documents, General Conditions, section 700.

6. Bonds

Contractor submits herewith a Performance Bond and a separate Labor and Materials Payment Bond, both in a form acceptable to MERC and otherwise in accordance with the Contract Documents and each in the Contract Amount to ensure full compliance, execution and performance of this Contract by Contractor and payment by Contractor of labor and material Suppliers as more fully described in the Contract Documents.

7. Remedies for Default

If Contractor fails to perform as specified in the Contract Documents, MERC shall be entitled to all the rights and remedies which this Contract provides, as well as all remedies provided by law. This Contract shall not be construed as limiting or reducing the remedies provided by law which MERC would have in the absence of any provision of the Contract.

8. Laws of Oregon Apply

The laws of Oregon shall govern the interpretation and construction of this Construction Agreement and all of the Contract Documents.

9. Entire Agreement

The Contract Documents constitute the final written expression of all of the terms of this Construction Agreement and are a complete and exclusive statement of those terms. Any and all representations, promises, warranties, or statements by either party that differ in any way from the terms of this written agreement shall be given no force and effect. This Contract shall be changed, amended, or modified only by written instrument signed by both MERC and Contractor. This Contract shall not be modified or altered by any course of performance by either party.
