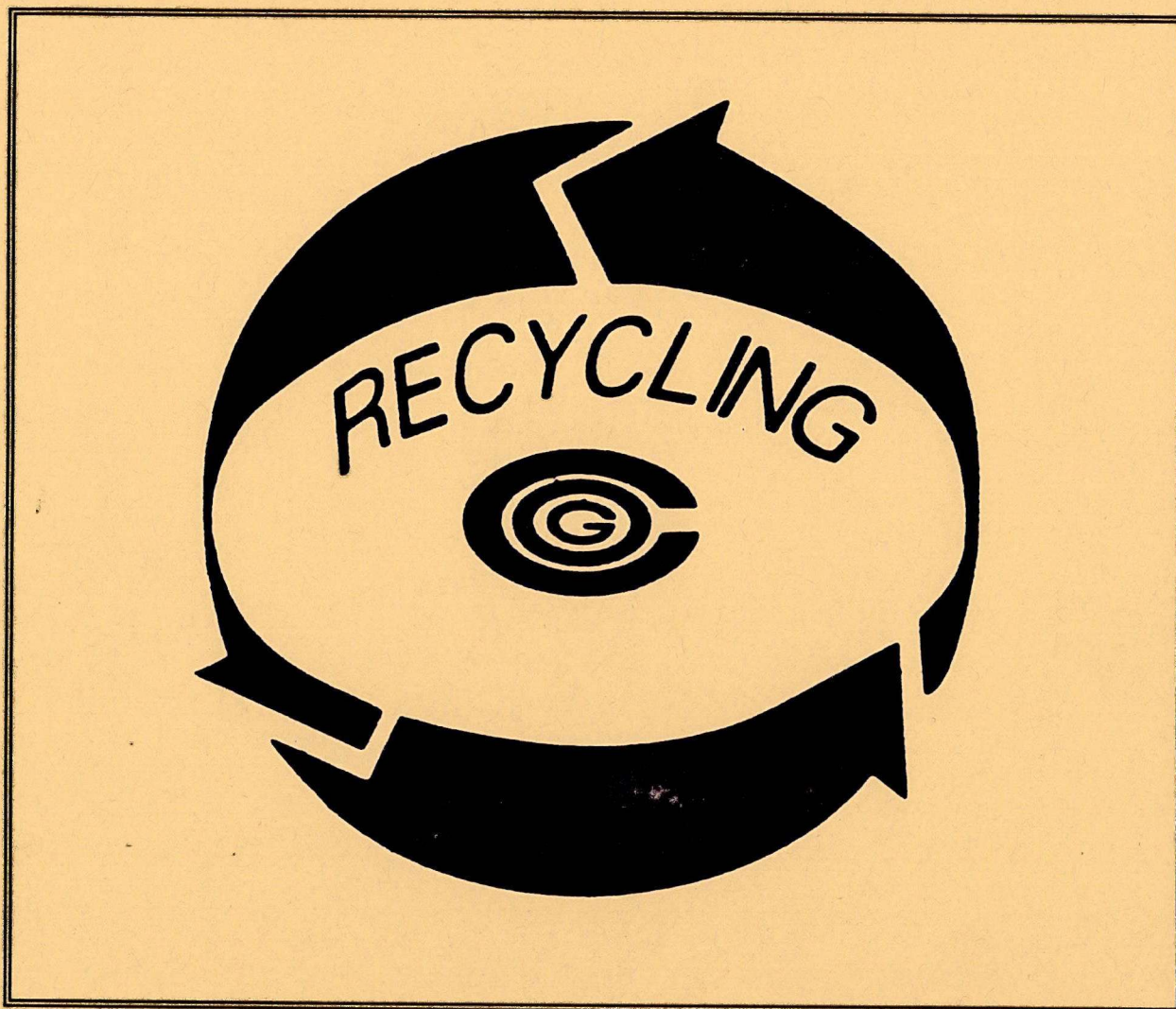

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Report

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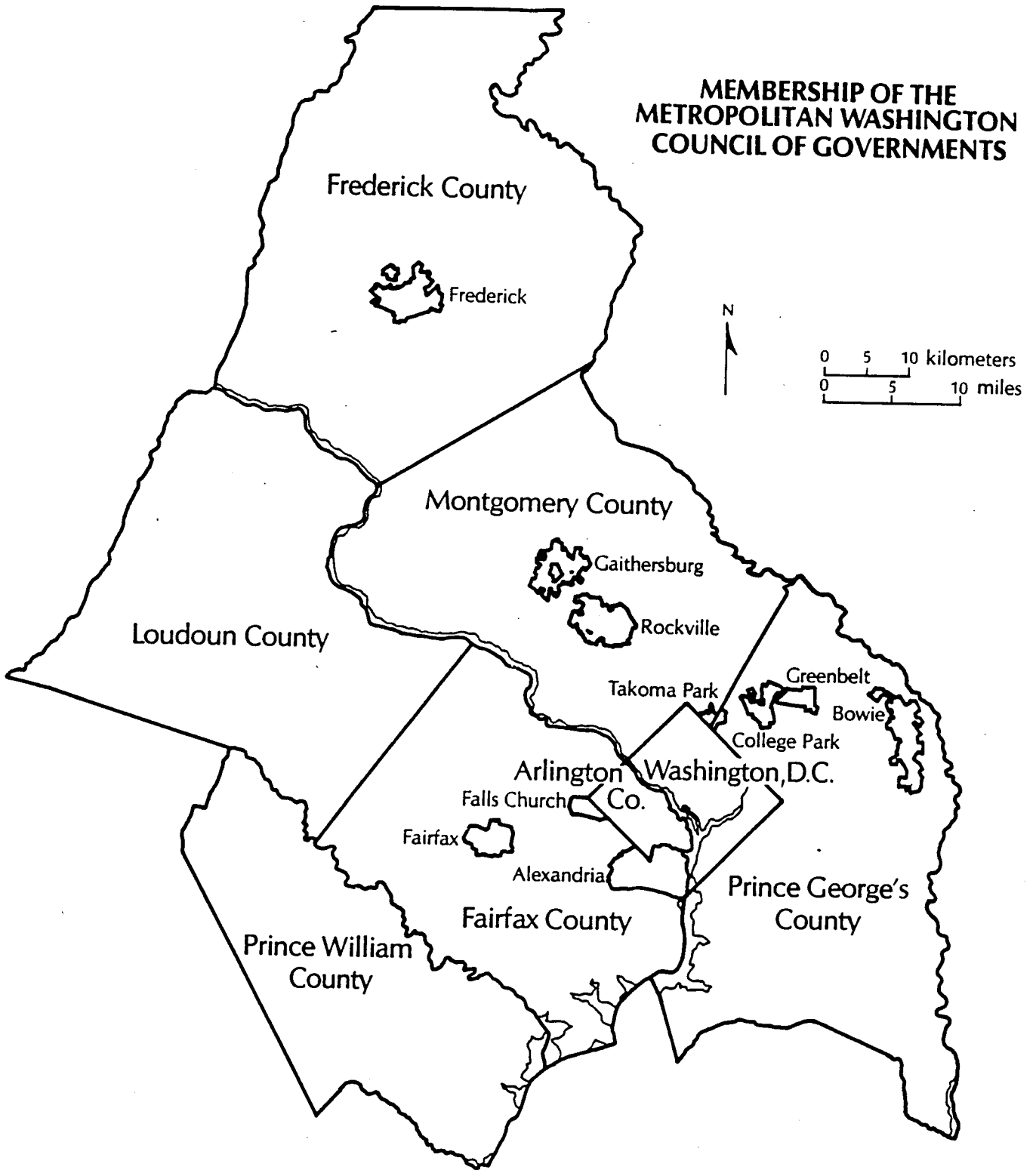

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Introduction

This updated directory of the local government recycling practices demonstrates the dynamic nature of recycling programs in the Washington metropolitan region. It contains information about new government programs, expanded recycling services, and new private recycling opportunities for the fiscal year 1990. Since the data for this directory was collected, however, there have been even more changes. In 1991 local governments are intensifying recycling efforts in order to divert a greater amount of materials from the waste stream.

The year 1990 saw several local governments expand their curbside recycling programs to more residents. Montgomery County, Prince George's County, Bowie and Takoma Park in Maryland added more neighborhoods to their collection program.

Several Northern Virginia communities introduced pilot multi-material curbside pilot programs since the end of the 1990 reporting period. Results from new pilot programs in Arlington, Alexandria, Fairfax County, and Prince William County will appear in next year's directory. Curbside programs in the City of Falls Church, Herndon, and Manassas which are very popular were also adopted since the end of last year.

In 1990 the number of recycling dropoff locations increased in the District of Columbia to fourteen and in Fairfax County to twelve, giving more residents the opportunity to recycle. Also, most jurisdictions held special seasonal collections, such as for Christmas trees.

As new markets develop, the list of materials being recycled is growing. In 1990 plastic beverage containers and bimetal containers were added to some municipal collections in addition to glass, aluminum, and newspaper. More jurisdictions are adding plastics and bimetal cans to their programs in 1991, and some are seeking new materials to collect. In addition to plastic and bimetal, Takoma Park added corrugated cardboard and mixed paper.

It should be noted that the public curbside collection information presented in this directory does not include private curbside collection service, which is available in many parts of the region. The information presented here represents government programs only, with the exception of private dropoff or buyback businesses, which are listed in this directory.

This directory is intended to serve as an information resource for local government recycling staff, public works/environmental service officials, businesses, and interested citizens. Funds for the preparation of this directory were provided by COG member jurisdictions. The staff sincerely thanks the local government recycling coordinators of the Washington area for their assistance in preparing this report.

Recycling Directory Terms

Aluminum	Aluminum beverage cans; some private recyclers take aluminum scrap metal.
Antifreeze	Ethylene glycol antifreeze used in automotive cooling systems.
Batteries	Lead-acid automobile batteries; this does not include household dry-cell (alkaline) batteries.
Bimetal	Includes combination aluminum/steel, steel beverage cans, and tin-plated steel food cans.
Boxboard	A sheeted fibrous product thicker than paper used in the manufacture of cartons and rigid boxes.
Commercial Recycling	Recycling services available to businesses and government. Local governments usually include multi-family dwellings in commercial recycling programs. Definitions vary in each jurisdiction.
Compost	The humus-like organic compound generated from the microbial degradation of organic matter into a useful product.
Curbside Collection	Collection of recyclable materials that have been set at the curb by residents.
Dropoff	A recycling collection location where citizens can deliver separated secondary materials, such as newspapers, glass containers, metal cans and plastic bottles. The typical center is unattended.
Energy Resource Recovery Facility (E/RR)	A combustion facility that burns municipal solid waste at high temperatures and uses the heat generated to convert steam into electricity.
Ferrous	Scrap ferrous metal.
Glass	Brown, green, and clear glass bottles and jars.
High-Grade Paper	Wastepaper with the most value, consisting of the pulp substitute and deinking high grade categories; white office paper.
Igloo	A half-sphere container used at dropoff centers for the receipt and storage of residential recyclable materials, such as glass and metal containers.
Materials Recovery Facility (MRF)	A term commonly used for facilities that separate mixed recyclables by material and process them for sale to end users.

Mixed Paper	A general grade of wastepaper which includes colored paper, file cards, file folders, envelopes (no labels, no windows), and sometimes telephone books.
Multi-material	A collection or processing system handling more than one secondary material.
MSW	Municipal Solid Waste: wastes generated by residents, businesses and institutions.
M/V	Indicates whether recycling a material is mandatory (M) or voluntary (V) in a jurisdiction.
Plastic	The types of plastic collected by the public and private sectors vary widely and are in a state of change. Generally the term implies PET (#1) and HDPE (#2) narrow neck bottles of all colors. Please check with local governments and private recyclers to determine exactly which types of plastic they will take.
Recycling	The diversion of materials from the solid waste stream and the beneficial use of such materials.
Residential Recycling	Recycling services available to single-family homes, townhouses, and sometimes multi-family dwellings. Definitions vary in each jurisdiction.
Tires	Automobile and truck tires.
TPD	Tons per day.
Waste Oil	Used automotive motor oil.
Waste to-Energy Facility (WTE)	A combustion facility that burns municipal solid waste at high temperatures and uses the heat generated to convert steam into electricity.
White Goods	Scrap ferrous metal generally in the form of household appliances such as refrigerators, washers, and stoves.
Yard Waste	This term usually refers to grass clippings. It can include leaves, brush and branches, depending on the local program. Check with local jurisdictions to verify their definition.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Alexandria has had mandatory curbside recycling for newspapers since 1972. Alexandria began a multi-material curbside collection pilot program for 5,000 single-family homes in the City in March 1991. The City expects to offer curbside recycling to the 19,500 single-family households by 1992. Alexandria operates three dropoff centers for newspapers and six igloo multi-material centers. The City composts leaves for public distribution as a soil conditioner and enricher. Used motor oil, antifreeze, and auto batteries are collected at the two household hazardous waste collection days each year for recycling. The City government offices participate in an office paper recycling program and City schools are beginning to phase-in waste paper recycling. In addition, the City has been recycling asphalt from roads for nearly three years. Alexandria, with Arlington County, sponsors an 850 ton-per-day waste-to-energy facility owned and operated by Ogden Martin.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Arlington County began a curbside collection pilot program serving 5,600 single-family households during February 1991. The current goal is for County-wide recycling by the fall of 1992. All recycling programs are voluntary, with two multi-material dropoff centers in operation and three or four more planned for 1991. The County also has yard waste, concrete, and public office paper recycling programs. All recycling programs are funded by a surcharge at the joint Alexandria/Arlington Waste-to-Energy Facility.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Bowie has a multi-material recycling program for 13,000 single-family homes. The service is available to all residents, schools and churches. Materials are curb-sorted and processed at the public works yard. The City has ordered a conveyer system that will allow it to process plastic recyclables. Bowie also collects old street materials for use as road base by developers.

The City received a grant to build the processing facility. It also receives funding from Prince George's County's rebate program towards the recycling program.

College Park has mandatory curbside collection for newspapers. Leaves are picked up in season, brush and branches upon request. Curbside collection of glass and aluminum began in January 1990 at 5,000 single-family homes and plastic was added in October. Waste oil can be dropped off at the Public Works Yard. The City offices are also recycling office paper.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Mandatory residential curbside collection of newspaper began in October 1989. Single-family residences and condominiums are scheduled to receive curbside service for glass, bimetal, aluminum and plastic in May 1991. Dropoff is available only on Saturdays for glass, bimetal, and aluminum and will soon include plastic. Commercial establishments are required to separate glass, scrap metal and paper products. Officials will be able to write tickets for non-compliance in 1991. In 1991, the City will begin its household hazardous waste program and will hold a procurement for recycling marketing services. Haulers of recyclable materials are required to register with the Office of Recycling and to send quarterly reports of their recycling tonnages to the Office of Recycling.

The City operates one dropoff center and plans to expand it. City Hall recycles office paper and cardboard.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Fairfax County has a recycling goal of 25% by July 1992. County-wide curbside collection of newspapers began in January 1989 and includes multi-family dwellings. A mandatory pilot multi-material curbside program for the 36,600 single-family homes receiving County refuse collection began in Spring 1991. Some of the County's 30-plus private haulers are providing voluntary curbside collection to their customers for materials such as aluminum and glass. The County has 12 multi-material dropoff centers. Wood and leaf mulch is shredded at the I-66 Transfer Station and the I-95 Landfill and then distributed to residents free of charge. Brush is prohibited from disposal beginning April 1, 1991; scrap metal and white goods have been banned from the landfill since 1987. Fairfax County employees recycle office paper, and the County has a ten percent price preference for the purchase of recycled paper products. A yard waste ban at the landfill will begin January 1, 1993 and expansion of the composting facility is under consideration. Compost is sold to the public for \$7.50/ cu. yd. The County is planning to build a permanent household hazardous waste facility to open in mid-1992. Commercial recycling is currently voluntary. The County plans to implement mandatory commercial recycling in 1991. Collectors of recyclables from any County business will need to report tonnages. Larger employers (with 250 or more employees) will be required to recycle and report to the Department of Environmental Protection. The County is developing legislation to remove mercury batteries from the waste stream. The recycling staff will focus on source reduction, including backyard composting, in 1991. The procurement law for the jurisdiction specifies 80% post-consumer content in paper beginning in June 1991.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Prince George's County has a voluntary recycling program. Legislation passed in 1989 sets six recycling goals which must be achieved or legislation may be passed making the program mandatory. The first goal is to recycle 10% by 1991, and the last goal is to achieve 35% recycling by 1999. In early 1991, the County will expand its multi-material curbside collection program from 34,000 to 48,000 households. The curbside program will encompass the entire County when a centralized materials recovery facility, currently in the contractual stage, opens. The County will expand its yard waste collections to 20,000 households from April to October 1991, increasing to 60,000 in November 1991. The apartment recycling pilot provides weekly collection from centralized recycling containers for 15,000 residents in 15 apartment complexes. The pilot program will broaden to include steel, bimetal, and plastic, and will continue through early 1992. By July 1, 1992, licensees and owners of multi-family rental facilities must provide an opportunity for tenants to recycle. The County has a multi-material dropoff center at the landfill with a tire schools beginning Fall 1991. A grant program provides start-up funds for municipal and limited private recycling projects. The County sponsors commercial recycling seminars for large businesses, apartment managers, and haulers. Its commercial program requires reporting from every business and hauler. The County's procurement office has a price preference for products made principally of recycled raw materials.
