WHEREAS, the Council, convened as the Budget Committee, has conducted a public hearing on the FY 2022-23 Proposed Budget; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Oregon Budget Law, the Council, convened as the Budget Committee, must approve the FY 2022-23 Budget, and said approved budget must be transmitted to the Multnomah County Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission for public hearing and review; now, therefore,

### BE IT RESOLVED,

1. That the Proposed FY 2022-23 Budget as amended by the Metro Council, convened as the Budget Committee, which is on file at the Metro offices, is hereby approved.

2. That property tax levies for FY 2022-23 are approved as follows:

### **ISSUE STATEMENT**

Marissa Madrigal, Chief Operating Officer, acting as the Budget Officer, will present the FY 2022-23 Proposed Budget to the Metro Council at the April 5, 2022, Council meeting. This will be a public hearing where the Council, sitting as the budget committee, will receive testimony from interested members of the general public and agency stakeholders. This is the first of many meetings over the next month where Council will have robust discussion and provide feedback on the Agency's budget.

### **ACTION REQUESTED**

Council to receive the proposed budget, budget message and provide feedback on the budget process as the budget committee. Council will gavel into the budget committee meeting but will not gavel out until action and vote happens on May 5, 2022.

### **IDENTIFIED POLICY OUTCOMES**

To progress with a vote on May 5, 2022, for Resolution 22-5252 *approving* the FY 2022-23 budget, setting property tax levies and transmitting the approved budget to the Multnomah County Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission, Council will help departments with feedback and discussion to develop, approve and eventually adopt a FY 2022-23 Oregon Metro budget that aligns with Council priorities.

### **POLICY QUESTION**

Does the budget, as proposed, reflect Council priorities, policies, and goals?

What information is needed to understand and communicate how departments are reflecting the strategic framework and equity outcomes throughout the budget?

## POLICY OPTIONS FOR COUNCIL TO CONSIDER

Each of the departments' and venues' budgets have individual items that should achieve outcomes specifically addressed by Council through the strategic framework. Council can support the budget in whole or in part and modify individual items or larger program requests.

### **STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS**

The Chief Operating Officer and Chief Financial Officer recommend Council receive the budget message and proposed FY 2022-23 Metro Budget, listen to public comments, and discuss the budget process that will eventually lead to voting on Resolution 22-5252 approving the FY 2022-23 budget and authorizing the Chief Operating Officer to submit the approved budget to the Multnomah County Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission.

### STRATEGIC CONTEXT & FRAMING COUNCIL DISCUSSION

The FY 2022-23 budget development process includes five informational meetings to be held for department presentations throughout the month of April. Two other public meetings (beside this April 5<sup>th</sup> meeting) will be held where Council will receive testimony from interested members of the general public and agency stakeholders. No further action or vote will be taken on the budget at any of these meetings. These meetings are setup to have robust conversation and give Council opportunities to guide and develop the FY 2022-23 budget where action and approval will happen on May 5, 2022.

### Relationship to Metro's Strategic Plan, racial equity, and climate action goals

By approving the FY 2022-23 proposed budget, the Agency is one step closer to adopting a budget that will focus on programming related to our guiding principles of racial justice, climate justice and resiliency and shared prosperity.

### Known Opposition: None known.

**Legal Antecedents:** The preparation, review and adoption of Metro's annual budget is subject to the requirements of Oregon Budget Law, ORS Chapter 294. The Chief Financial Officer, acting in their capacity as the designated Budget Officer, is required to present a balanced budget to Council, acting in their capacity as our Budget Committee.

## BACKGROUND

In the past, Metro Council spent a shorter time-period, as the budget committee, reviewing and discussing the proposed budget and applied their influence, discussion, and changes to the budget, as the governing body. Over the last year, Council has instructed staff that it would like to have bigger public conversations and provide direction that will allow for more transparency to the Agency's budget and the budget process.

To support this approach, staff created more space during the proposed-to-approved phase of the budget process. This will allow departments to give presentations to Council, along with any additional materials they deem necessary, in a public setting and Councilors can ask questions, have good conversations, and give feedback on any program and budget modifications they deem appropriate.

The above meetings are the interim steps between initial proposal of the budget and approval of the budget on May 5<sup>th</sup>. Oregon Budget Law requires that Metro approve and transmit its budget to the Multnomah County Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission (TSCC). Members of the TSCC are appointed by the Governor to supervise local government budgeting and taxing activities in Multnomah County. The TSCC will hold a virtual public hearing on Metro's budget on Thursday, May 26, 2022, at 12:30 p.m. Following the meeting, the TSCC will provide a letter of certification for Metro's budget.

Oregon Budget Law requires the Budget Committee of each local jurisdiction to set the property tax levies for the ensuing year at the time the budget is approved. Under budget law the Metro Council sits as the Budget Committee for this action. The tax levies must be summarized in the resolution that approves the budget and cannot be increased beyond this amount following approval. Metro's levy for general obligation debt reflects actual debt service levies for all outstanding general obligation bonds. The levy authorization for FY 2022-23 also includes the renewed 5-year local option levy for Parks and Natural Areas support as well as the levy for Metro's permanent tax rate for general operations.

The Council's adoption of the final FY 2022-23 budget is currently scheduled for its first read on Thursday, June 9, 2022, and voting for adoption on June 16, 2022.

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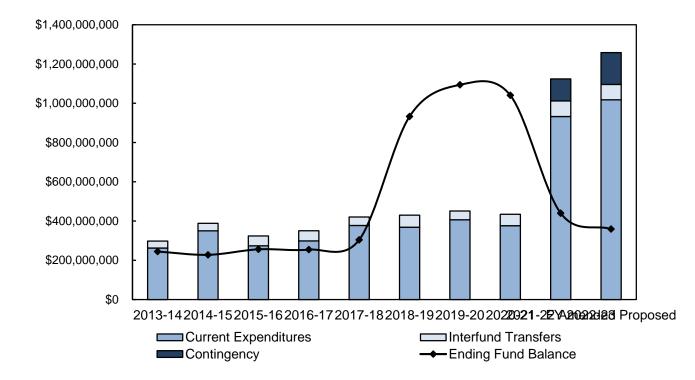

# **Category of expense**



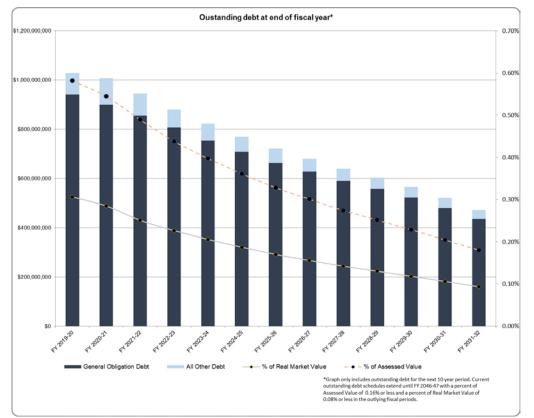
# **10-year expenditure history**

**RE: Solid Waste Disposal Fees** 

### Dear Council President Peterson and Members of the Council,

The Clackamas County Board of Commissioners have serious concerns about Metro's proposed disposal fees and how those fees link to regional priorities and Metro's budget.

Metro is proposing a 50% increase in solid waste disposal fees over 2020 levels, by 2027, to maintain existing services. In addition, a projection for successive increases of between 7.1% and 7.9% through 2027 was later approved by the Metro Council. When combined with recent increases, this is an increase of approximately 67% from 2020 to 2027.

As disposal and recycling services are essential for all residents, and these costs will be passed down to the rate payers, we oppose the action taken by Metro to choose the largest overall increase without collaborative regional engagement. In the interest of transparency and customer service to ratepayers, we ask you to respond to our requests related to the following issues.

**Basis for projected disposal fee increases.** Respond to the request from local governments as presented in the January 2022 listening session to provide further details about the rationale for projected disposal fee increases. We request that a comprehensive breakdown of the cost drivers for the new projected scenario be shared with our staff, elected officials and the public, including projections of what the increased revenue will be used for and how it will benefit customers throughout our county and our region.

**Enhanced engagement.** Bring proposed decisions that drive projected changes in disposal fees – including the most recent projection scenario –to public forums, such as MPAC, supplemented by staff-level discussions. Greater dialogue and consultation with the jurisdictions within Metro, with elected officials, community members and other stakeholders is urgently needed.

**Regional revenue sharing.** Revenue sharing to local governments for implementation of the Regional Waste Plan (RWP) has been uncertain. We request greater predictability and proportionality in revenue-sharing from the regional system fee that Metro shares with cities and counties to help offset RWP implementation costs.

The proposed rate increases have a negative impact on everyone in the region, especially in light of the economic challenges of the post-pandemic economy. On behalf of our mutual constituents, we look forward to productive discussions with you on these issues.
