WHEREAS, the Council President has appointed Shayna Snyder a resident of the Northwest District Neighborhood, and who maintains a deep connection natural environment, is subject to confirmation by the Metro Council; and	
WHEREAS, Metro Code Chapter 2.19.030 states that advisory committee members are limited to two consecutive two-year terms; and	
WHEREAS, Shayna Snyder is a member in good standing and her appointment is supported by the Committee Chair; and

ISSUE STATEMENT

A vacancy has occurred in the Metro Central Station Community Enhancement Committee (hereinafter referred to as MCSCEC) membership. The vacancy in the MCSCEC membership currently exists due to reaching maximum term length for a member representing the environmental community.

ACTION REQUESTED

Lynn Peterson, Council President, and Councilor Mary Nolan, chair of the MCSCEC recommend adoption of this resolution to confirm the appointment of Shayna Snyder to serve on the MCSCEC.

IDENTIFIED POLICY OUTCOMES

With adoption of this resolution, Shayna Snyder will be appointed to one, two-year term on the MCSCEC with the option to serve a second, two-year term.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS

Staff recommends adoption of this resolution to appoint Shayna Snyder to the MCSCEC. Snyder's interest form articulates their passion for community enhancement and their lifelong connectedness to the community she lives in and the natural environment. In addition, Snyder is recommended by current MSCCEC members for their active antiracism work.

Snyder also serves as a volunteer crew leader with Friends of Trees by actively engaging in neighborhood plantings. Additionally, Snyder professional work is centered on building trusting and caring relationship through collaboration with diverse stakeholder groups. Snyder's connectivity to the natural environment, active volunteering and ability to create collaborative relationship make them an especially well-positioned candidate for the MCSCEC.

STRATEGIC CONTEXT & FRAMING COUNCIL DISCUSSION

How does this advance Metro's racial equity goals?

The inclusion of a committee member representing environmental interests and the environment's impact on communities reflects our commitment to advancing environmental justice through Metro Central grants.

• How does this advance Metro's climate action goals?

Snyder is actively engaged in improving the health of our natural environment through volunteering and feedback groups. Along with their residency in the Northwest District Association Neighborhood this makes them uniquely suited to address the diverse geography of the Enhancement Grant boundary and promote community-based solutions to the environmental issues of communities in the grant target boundary area.

There is no known opposition to appointment of Shayna Snyder to the MCSCEC.

• Legal Antecedents

Chapter 2.19 of the Metro Code Relating to Advisory Committees; Section 2.19.120 provides for a Metro Central Station Community Enhancement Committee and sets forth guidelines for representation.

Anticipated Effects

Adoption of this resolution would confirm the appointment of Susan Andrews to the MCSCEC.

BACKGROUND

The MCSCEC is charged with helping develop plans to administer grant funds, solicit and review grant applications, and select for funding improvement projects that benefit the area directly affected by the Metro Central transfer station, including portions of Northwest and North Portland.

Mary Nolan, Councilor of Metro district 5, chairs the seven-member committee. Members are required to reside within the boundaries of their respective neighborhood associations. The business and environmental representatives have no residency requirement but must maintain interest in the enhancement boundary. This requirement does not apply to the Metro Councilor appointed to the committee.

A recruitment to fill the positions began in January of 2022, seeking replacement to represent Environmental Community on the MCSCEC. Metro staff broadly engaged current MCSCEC members, current and past grantees whose work is focused on the natural environment, and community partners, who service historically marginalized communities within the enhancement boundary in attempt to recruit a member. Metro staff ended up with two referrals and solicited feedback from current MCSCEC members. Staff recommends Shayna Snyder for the environmental community MCSEC seat.

I live within the gran boundary area. I specifically moved to this area out of a love for the land and nature found here. I have lived in Portland on and off since 1999, and continuously since 2008, and this part of the city has always been held my heart. I grew up in a home of environmentalists and my mother, Gail Snyder, was the ED of Friends of Forest Park and was instrumental in the transition of that organization into the Forest Part Conservancy.

Members of the Metro Central Enhancement Committee contribute a wide variety of complementary skills and experiences. Please describe any relevant knowledge, professional and/or lived experience that you would bring to the committee, including knowledge and experience about environmental justice or protecting the environmental quality of communities.

I am a volunteer crew leader with Friends of Trees and spend many weekends working to help build tree canopy and improve environmental wellbeing in Portland. I do not have science or forestry background, but I do bring a care, concern, and love of this land. I have also learned from my mother's work that environmental work is done best and most effectively when respect and a true desire to listen to all parties is implemented. Demonizing people who appear to be "on the other side" is not a useful approach, and we often have more shared goals than not.

Please explain how you keep informed and aware of the community's diverse needs and priorities.

I believe that nearly all work is based on relationships and I am good at building trusting and caring relationships. If I were chosen to serve in this capacity, I would work to learn more from those already serving as well as the community.

I am an advisor at Portland State University and I am experienced at leading collaborative work in groups with many different stakeholders. In my role, I am detail oriented and skilled at working with diverse groups with sometimes competing interests. Advocacy is central to my work, and I believe I could bring this to the committee.
