<u> Update - North Marine Drive Project - Stacy Bluhm</u>

PDOT Project Manager Stacy Bluhm provided a project summary and schedule and reported the design phase is nearing completion. At the Port Planning Commission hearing on December 13<sup>th</sup> the Port of Portland will be seeking the Commission's authorization of additional funds needed to complete the project. At this time it is underfunded by approximately \$2 million. PDOT has accounted for \$600,000 to \$700,000 out of federal transportation funds and the Port of Portland will be providing the balance. The next step is the City Council hearing on Wednesday, December 20<sup>th</sup>, at 9:30 a.m. in Council Chambers. In that forum Bluhm will be discussing the project elements, the process taking place and request authorization for funding of construction. She sought Elaine Stewart's testimony at the Council hearing and that of any interested committee member.

Recognizing that turtles nest along the shore where the stormwater outfall replacements are going in, Stewart requested ODFW and DSL alter the permit to allow an "in-water work window" of May to avoid any turtle nests in the ground. That request will likely be granted. She will also have recommendations for Bluhm to incorporate into the Request for Bid (RFB). The construction period is scheduled for spring of 2001 to fall of 2002. Bluhm asked about an entrance gate to the wildlife area, and whether it was premature to put the gate in before new recreational facilities were built. Stewart said she would get back to Bluhm about it.

In a related issue, Bill Bach spoke of discussions on the possibility of trading properties - the Port's "triangle piece" for Metro's Expo property adjacent to the "radio tower site". Currently environmental studies are being conducted on each of the properties. Bach terms this a good solution for both parties.

Update - Ramsey Rail Yard - Tim VanWormer

In an overview of the plan VanWormer spoke of the construction of the rail storage yard, a new main lead in Rivergate that will serve that yard and stormwater facilities. Natural resource evaluations are also components of the pre-design. Construction is likely two to three years away.

# <u> Update - Portland Parks/Metro Trail IGA - Jim Sjulin</u>

Sjulin discussed the overall objectives of this "mini-master plan IGA": to do a refinement plan deciding on trail alignment through the Management Area, and to acknowledge the fact of Title 3 and that there may be new considerations in terms of sensitivity to wildlife and disturbance of habitat. Also Metro's Regional Environmental Management Dept. (REM) is included in the IGA with a contribution of up to \$10,500 and assistance in building the trail route.

Sjulin stated, however, he is unable to recommend his agency sign the agreement in its current form, due to "limitations imbedded into the . . . language". In particular, he alluded to the provision for a pedestrian route only. A number of those working on this project, he felt, envisioned bicycle routes at least through the Management Area. The constraints were included in the agreement by Metro. Bicycles, it was noted, are not allowed on the Interlakes Trail in the Wildlife Area. The prohibition of bikes there is due primarily to the emphasis on natural resources in the Management Plan for Smith & Bybee Lakes.

A number of committee members agreed to form a trails sub-committee to make recommendations to the full committee. Those persons include: Jim Sjulin, Troy Clark, Gerry Meyer, Holly Michael and Jim Morgan. In addition, the following are listed as potential sub-committee members who will be invited: Pam Arden, Susan Barthel of BES, and Tom McGuire of Portland Planning. Dennis O'Neil of REM will be listed as an interested party. Sjulin will e-mail sub-committee members to set up a meeting.

### Review and Approval of September and October Meeting Notes

September meeting notes were approved with abstentions by Frank Opila and Holly Michael. October meeting notes were approved with one abstention by Jim Sjulin.

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# <u> Update - Water Control Structure Sub-Committee - Troy Clark</u>

There has been no meeting of the sub-committee since the last Management Committee meeting. However, Clark stated that the Friends of Smith & Bybee Lakes has evaluated this issue and sent a letter to the Management Committee with its conclusion recommending against spending money on a feasibility study at this time. A copy of the letter and Stewart's reply was distributed. One of the tasks of the sub-committee was to evaluate the feasibility of installing an additional opening between the slough and the western arm of Bybee Lake.

The sub-committee would like to see elevation data for the lakes and North and Columbia Sloughs. Stewart reported she obtained elevations for about half of the lakes' area last summer. As water levels rise she will be able to complete the work.

#### Additional Update

Related to the county jail facility going in on Ledbetter Peninsula, a public hearing by the Regional Arts and Cultural Council (RACC) will be held Wednesday, December 13. RACC will be responsible for choosing the 1% for art public displays in the area. The citizens working group on the jail was supportive of funding for interpretative displays at the wildlife area. Stewart will be attending, providing information about the Management Committee and the Management Plan.

Dear committee members,

It has come to our attention that there is currently an active sub-committee investigating the feasibility of placing a tidegate structure connecting the Columbia Slough and Bybee Lake. The Friends of Smith and Bybee Lakes (The Friends) believe this evaluation of options for a tidegate and the expenditure of funds to study options is premature.

We believe there are more pressing matters in the management area such as beaver control, siltation in the lakes, enforcement of buffer requirements and a vegetation master plan.

Going forward with resource expenditures based on a possible scenario at this time is not justified in our opinion. There are claims that there is polluted water moving around the Lakes/slough system. But despite years of water quality data gathered by METRO the public has yet to receive any summarized water quality data for the lakes, the North Slough and the water bodies around the landfill. Without data supporting the placement of a tidegate between the Columbia Slough and Bybee Lake it seems a waste of time to proceed with this evaluation.

The Friends are also concerned with issues involving permits, long term maintenance of a possible tidegate and a cost/benefit analysis. These are questions that need to be addressed.

The Friends recommend that the committee looking into the tidegate feasibility issue either be put on hold or proceed slowly. We further suggest that the management committee develop an action plan for the lakes based on OWEB guidelines. An action plan would identify the most pressing concerns within the management area, prioritize them and develop strategies for addressing these concerns.

The Friends are bound by our mission statement advocating the conservation, maintenance, restoration and enhancement of the lakes as an historical remnant of the Columbia River system. We are particularly concerned with the restoration of the lakes, as much as is practicable, to mimic its historic courses and functions.

Dear Jeff:

I received the Friends of Smith and Bybee Lakes (FOSB) letter to the Smith and Bybee Lakes Management Committee last week. I will see that the committee gets the letter and hears your recommendation against funding a feasibility study for a tidegate at the southwest arm of Bybee Lake at this time. Thank you for taking the time to weigh in on the issue.

The FOSB recommendation to put the tidegate feasibility study on hold or proceed slowly is in keeping with the Wetland Technical Advisory Committee's and management committee's recommendations. The TAC suggested replacing the current structure first, and then evaluating the necessity of a tidegate at the southwest arm of Bybee Lake. The management committee endorsed that approach twice, in 1996 and 2000. Your representative has been active in the sub-committee looking into the tidegate issue, and I anticipate that his report to the management committee will include the FOSB recommendation.

There are a number of other issues raised in the letter that I should address as manager of the wildlife area. Beaver control is one of several pressing matters listed in the letter; this often refers to trapping efforts, but I believe you intended a more generic meaning. Beavers are an important part of Smith and Bybee lakes, and their current population size is a response to the lakes' increased carrying capacity due to the dam. Attempts to remove animals will be ultimately ineffective, because births and immigration will offset removals. The most effective way to regulate the number of beavers is to stop impounding water in the lakes and restore more innate hydrologic processes that will profoundly change the lakes' habitat. The carrying capacity for beavers will be lower, and their population size will change accordingly. This habitat management approach is my preferred method for managing all native wildlife at the lakes.

Another issue listed was the development of a vegetation plan. I am continuing previous managers' efforts on vegetation planning on three fronts: controlling invasive species, creating a working master plan for the entire wildlife area and proceeding with revegetation efforts. I am glad that you agree this is essential, and I would like to review my plans with FOSB at one of your meetings.

Regarding water quality data, no summary for the management area has been provided to the general public. For citizens actively participating in management issues, like FOSB, Metro continues to provide detailed presentations on the lakes' environmental quality. For example, at the September 2000 management committee meeting, Metro provided a detailed briefing on sediment and water quality monitoring and a summary page on landfill leachate. I have enclosed a copy of the handouts and notes from that meeting for your information; please let me know if you have questions about the data.

FOSB recommends an action plan based on OWEB guidelines. I like to take advantage of all good information sources that are available, and I will look into the guidelines. There is an existing management plan for the lakes that outlines and prioritizes the goal and objectives for managing the lakes, and forms the basis for management actions. I believe that the management plan objectives are as relevant today as they were 10 years ago, when the plan was adopted. This particular comment in your letter tells me that I need to attend more of your meetings and help you stay better informed on activities and plans for the wildlife area. Although you have a representative on the management committee, it is often engaged in landuse issues. I have been working to re-focus some of the management committee meetings on short- and long-term management of the lakes, to keep it better informed also.

I am very gratified to read that FOSB is especially interested in the restoration of the lakes. Restoration is my highest priority, and FOSB has a vital supporting role to play in that work. As we discussed at your meeting last week, I am very excited about building your organization and involving your members in expanded vegetation management activities at the lakes.

Thank you for writing to the management committee with your recommendation on the tidegate feasibility study. I appreciate your interest in and advocacy for Smith and Bybee Lakes Wildlife Area. I will plan to attend your meetings quarterly (at least). In the meantime, please call me if you have any questions.



Please attend if you can.
