Jim, thanks for going out with me this morning. I think we reached a good balanced approach for this year. Just to recap:

Spot spray area:

- Ridges and openings near trails left fairly open for viewing from trail
- Ridge areas and other patches of trees to be planted heavily with trees (ash/willow/dogwood) to fill in areas and suppress blackberries
- Sedge areas to be left alone, spiraea planted around them
- In general, plant in clusters with open areas between, try to mimic nature
- Between clusters, can stake at regular intervals but farther apart (say 8-10 ft rather than 6-7 ft)
- Can mulch around plants if money allows it

Broadcast spray area:

- Start beyond observation blind
- Again, mimic nature and plant in clusters with open space or widely scattered plants between
- Seed with native seed mix
- Avoid planting trees under power lines

Extra plants:

- Can be interplanted in sea of tubes area to create patches if available

Herbicide:

- Only Rodeo form of glyphosate to be used
- If weather does not permit spray, then plant without spraying
- Can scalp area to be planted if not able to spray
- If you can't spray at planting, you can come back later and spot spray around plants if money allows (again, only Rodeo form of glyphosate)

Interpretive displays:

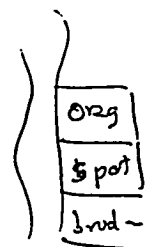
- We will not do the demonstration plots at this time because of time constraints on preparing educational materials to go with them

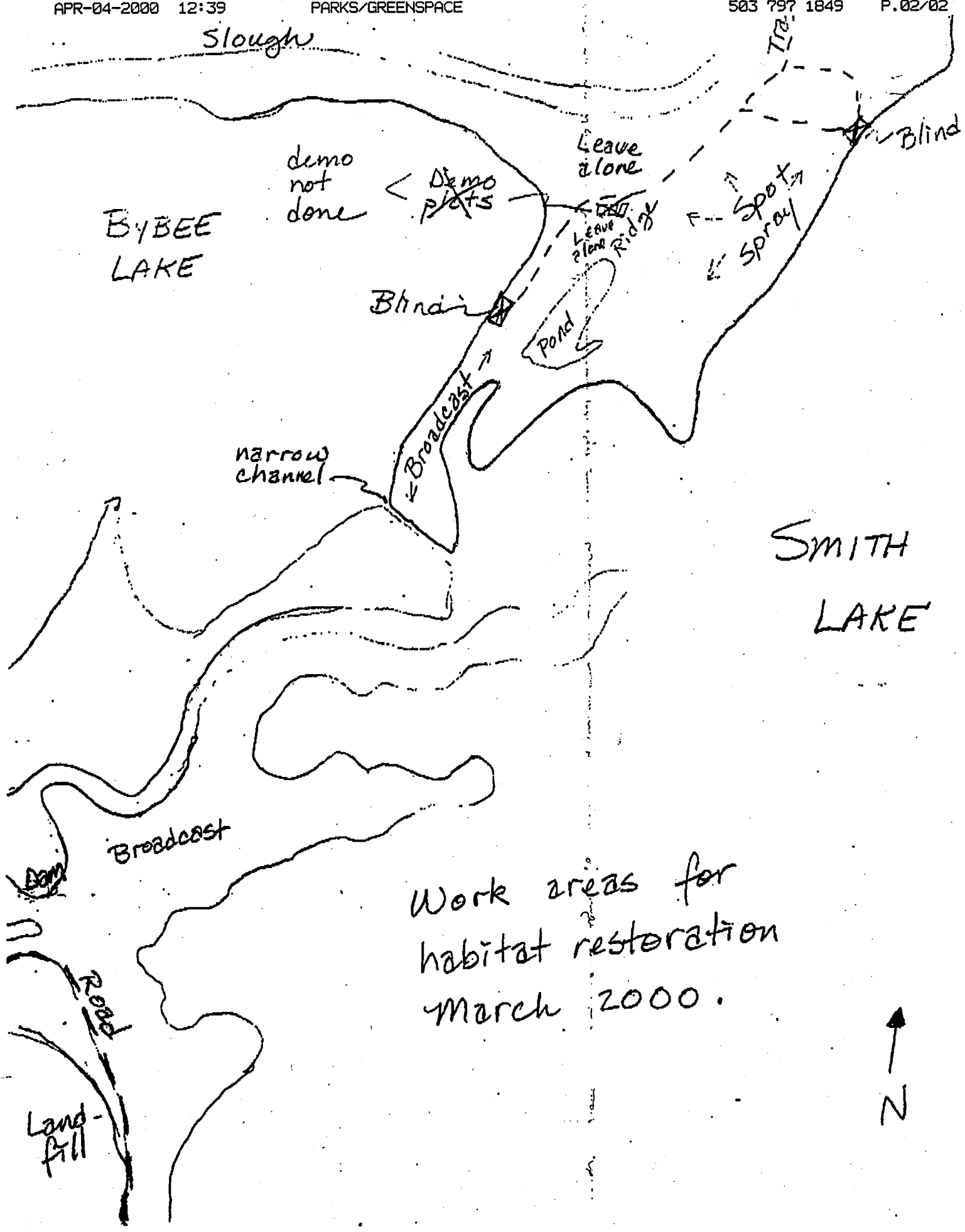
Signage:
