

<u>QUESTION:</u> How can educators be encouraged to expand their classrooms beyond the normal four walls?

<u>GOAL:</u> Train educators to a level where they encourage environmental awareness in the young citizens who they influence and to be active and involved stewards of natural areas.

<u>COMMUNITY:</u> Saturday Academy targets teachers in the Portland-Metropolitan area for environmental education awareness. Willing educators train to be trainers. Teachers train other teachers in their area, as well as, share their knowledge with their students.

<u>DESCRIPTION:</u> Saturday Academy provided educational workshops to teachers. The workshops were to enhance the teachers' knowledge of Greenspaces. Three main project curriculum were emphasized: Project WET (Water Education for Teachers), Project WILD (Wildlife in Learning Design), and Project Learning Tree.
