## Re: FINAL REPORT

The Tualatin River Stewardship Project achieved significant success over the period of June 1996 - April 1997:

- Training of 20 citizen observational monitors for the Watershed Watch program. Two training sessions were held. 16 miles of the river are now covered by volunteers.
- Watershed Watch monitors' observations led to the clean-up of an agriculture aerial spraying operation site near Forest Grove . Following a Riverkeeper complaint lodged with the Oregon Department of Agriculture, action resulted to correct the flagrant and habitual pesticide and herbicide containers littering property in the floodplain.
- Identifying and alerting the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) of the presence of barrels of toxic chemicals in the river, leading to their removal by an independent contractor.
- Working closely with the Friends of Cook Park to ensure grassroots, citizen representation in the planning process for Cook Park expansion. Riverkeeper involvement has resulted in serious consideration of alternatives which can best protect wetlands and wildlife
- Identified and advocated for Tualatin River public access sites included in the Metro Greenspaces Program, resulting in Metro's acquisition of 278 acres for future public access points. Assistance continues to influence the acquisition of additional Greenspace/Open Space parcels.
- Sponsored 12 river trips and van tours involving 300 individuals; including Metro Councilors and staff, birders, and the general public.
- Produced and distributed the *Citizen Action Guide to the Tualatin Watershed* to 2,000 citizens. Corporate sponsor now being recruited to improve graphic design and allow for greater distribution.
- Provided presentations to 10 community groups and school classes in Tigard, Tualatin, Sherwood, and Lake Oswego; involving 200 participants.

**Evaluation:** The Project has significantly achieved its stated objectives. The citizen's observational monitoring program, Watershed Watch, is active and covers both the River and several tributaries (including Cedar Mill creek and Rock, Bronson, Willow creeks). The environmental education program has done significant outreach to area elementary, middle and high schools. The slide show has been updated. A Citizen Action Guide to the Tualatin Watershed has been produced.

Our goal for the coming months is to significantly expand this program work through the launching of **Stewardship 2000**. This project will enable the Tualatin Riverkeepers to mobilize grassroots, citizen participation - and unite fragmented efforts - to monitor, protect and improve conditions in the watershed. The result will be 2,000 citizens participating in watershed protection activities by the year 2000, and strengthening of the varied friends and streams groups in the watershed. The program builds on the current momentum generated by our Friends groups partnership that will craft a shared advocacy vision for watershed stewardship.
