Council President Peterson called on Marissa Madrigal (she/her), COO, Metro, and Brain Kennedy, CFO, Metro to present to Council.

Presentation Summary:

Brain Kennedy (he/him), CFO, Metro, detailed the process leading to the current rate proposal, emphasizing the council's previous recommendations and the adopted 11% fee increase from the prior fiscal year. He explained the extensive engagement activities over the last year, which included roundtables, task force meetings, and communications with various stakeholders. The waste fee policy task force prioritized setting fees at the full cost of service and maintaining separate reserves, while Metro's solid waste services focus on equity, health, and the environment rather than just cost efficiency. He highlighted the proposed 11.9% fee increase for the next fiscal year, stressing the need to cover the full cost of services and avoid depleting fund balances, ultimately recommending the council adopt the new fee structure.

Council Discussion:

President Peterson (she/her), requested further clarification on the apparent disparity between the cost of service reduction in the budget compared to the proposed eleven precent increase in the tipping fee. How would items conflicting present such a drastic picture.

Brian Kennedy (he/him), stated the reason for the conflict in budget is because there is only one expensed budget including the state grant funds which caused a smaller capital program for the 2025 fiscal year.

Brain Kennedy, CFO Metro, explained the process of developing the rate proposal and answered questions about council's adoption of an 11% fee increase. over the past year, there were extensive engagement activities, including budget roundtables and a waste fee policy task force. Kennedy emphasized the importance of setting fees at the full cost

of service, discussed the criteria prioritized by the task force, and detailed the staff recommendation for adopting resolution 24 5404 to set solid waste fees at the cost of service for fiscal year 24-25.

Council Discussion

President Peterson inquired about the overall cost of service provision reduction on the budget versus the tipping fee.

Brian Kennedy stated that the main reason for the difference

is because there was a one-time expense budgeted in the current fiscal year with the inclusion of expenditure of state grant funds that offset the revenue; making the budget smaller.

Staff pulled up the Ordinance No. 24-1511 For the Purpose of Annexing to the Metro District Boundary Approximately 203.79 Acres Located in the Carver Area of Happy Valley North of Highway 224 and South of SE Eckert Ln PowerPoint to present to Council.

Presenters outlined an ordinance for annexing land in Happy Valley, sharing that while the territory is within the urban growth boundary and planned for various urban uses, including residential and commercial, annexation to the Metro district is necessary for urban development. The proposal aligns with ORS chapter criteria and the city's comprehensive plan. Services will be provided by Happy

Valley, Sunrise Water Authority, and the Water Environment Services program. Owners consented to annexation, and public notice was provided, with no written comments received. Staff recommended approval based on compliance with all criteria.

Council Discussion:

Councilor Nolan asked for some clarification about land use code, lot sizes, and density, and Hamburg responded that he would have to find that information in the code and get it for them.

Council President Peterson asked about an intersection in this region and traffic consequences of this acquirement. Hamburg responded that he would find that information and get back to her.

Councilor Lewis called on Jon Blasher (he/him), Metro, and Community Members to present to Council.

Staff pulled up the Resolution No. 24-5317 For the Purpose of Approving 2023 Nature in Neighborhoods Community Stewardship and Restoration Community Grants PowerPoint to present to Council.

Presenters described Metro's longstanding grant program, which has supported fish and wildlife habitat creation and connected people with nature for nearly two decades. They introduced the latest round of Neighborhood Nature Grants, emphasizing the program's alignment with Metro's racial equity, diversity, and inclusion strategy. These grants aim to build partnerships, enhance water quality and habitat, and promote environmental equity. This year's review saw an increase in applications and funding requests, leading to the recommendation of nine projects. Highlighted projects include the Seven Waters Canoe Family's culturally focused habitat work, Friends of Trees' urban tree care training, and

Willamette Falls Trust's habitat restoration led by tribal members. The emphasis on youth mentorship, Indigenous leadership, and community engagement underscores the program's commitment to sustainable, inclusive environmental stewardship.

Council Discussion:

Councilor Lewis asked how the project grant cycle interacts with the capital grant cycle, and presenters explained that in the past the cycles have aligned with each other and it has been really hard on staff, so they are coming up with new strategies to stagger those for the next cycle.

ISSUE STATEMENT

Resolution 24-5407 will authorize changes in appropriations for FY 2023-24 and approve changes to the FY 2023-24 through FY 2027-28 Capital Improvement Plan.

ACTION REQUESTED

Council adoption of Resolution 24-5407.

IDENTIFIED POLICY OUTCOMES

Council approval will authorize changes in appropriations requested by departments for FY 2023-24 and approve requested changes to the FY 2023-24 through FY 2027-28 Capital Improvement Plan.

POLICY QUESTION

Council should consider whether the changes in appropriations have been justified, that adequate funds exist for identified needs, and that proposed changes to the Capital Improvement Plan appear appropriate.

POLICY OPTIONS FOR COUNCIL TO CONSIDER

Adoption of Resolution 24-5407 will provide sufficient appropriations to accommodate the changes in operations outlined by departments. Adoption will allow for changes to capital projects due to operational factors.

Disapproval of Resolution 24-5407 will require departments to reevaluate their proposed changes to operations and capital plans.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS

The Chief Operating Officer and Chief Financial Officer recommend adoption of Resolution 24-5407.

STRATEGIC CONTEXT & FRAMING COUNCIL DISCUSSION

Relationship to Metro's Strategic Plan, racial equity, and climate action goals

By funding additional expenditures for operations, the Agency will more efficiently be able to focus on programming related to our guiding principles of racial justice, climate justice and resiliency, and shared prosperity.

Known Opposition: None known.

Legal Antecedents: ORS 294.463(1) provides for transfers of appropriations within a fund, including transfers from contingency that do not exceed 15 percent of a fund's appropriation if such transfers are authorized by official resolution or ordinance of the governing body. ORS 294.463(3) provides for transfers of appropriations or of appropriations and a like amount of budget resources between funds of the municipal corporation when authorized by an official resolution or ordinance of the governing body stating the need for the transfer. ORS 294.338(2) allows an increase in appropriations due to specific purpose grants or gifts when authorized by an official resolution or ordinance of the governing body stating the need for the recognition. ORS 294.338(3) allows an increase in appropriations when a request for services, the cost of which is supplied by another entity, necessitates a greater expenditure of public money for any specific purpose in order to provide the services when authorized by an official resolution or ordinance of the governing body stating the need for the recognition. ORS294.463 (4) provides that public testimony be allowed if any funds are changing by more than 10 percent of a fund's expenditures. Metro code chapter 2.02.040 requires the Metro Council to approve the addition of any position to the budget. Metro's adopted financial policies require any project exceeding \$100,000 or an existing CIP project increasing greater than 20 percent to receive Council approval. ORS 294.471 allows for pressing and necessary changes, by supplemental budget, that could not be reasonably foreseen during budget development.

Anticipated Effects: This action provides for changes in operations and capital improvement plans as described below.

Budget Impacts: This action <u>increases appropriations by \$550,000</u>. The new total appropriations will be <u>\$1,806,249,044</u> with <u>1,153.45 FTE</u>. This action has the following impacts on the FY 2023-24 budget and FY 2023-24 through FY 2027-28 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). Details of each change can be found in Attachment 5 – Summary of June 2024 Budget Amendments.

- Parks and Nature Operating Fund: Increase appropriations by \$550,000
 - Parks and Nature increase of \$200,000 for Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board grant
 - o Glendoveer Golf Course increase of \$350,000 for Contracted Professional Services
- Changes in the General Asset Management Fund, MERC Fund, Supportive Housing Services Fund, and Waste Prevention and Environmental Services Fund do not increase each respective fund's appropriations

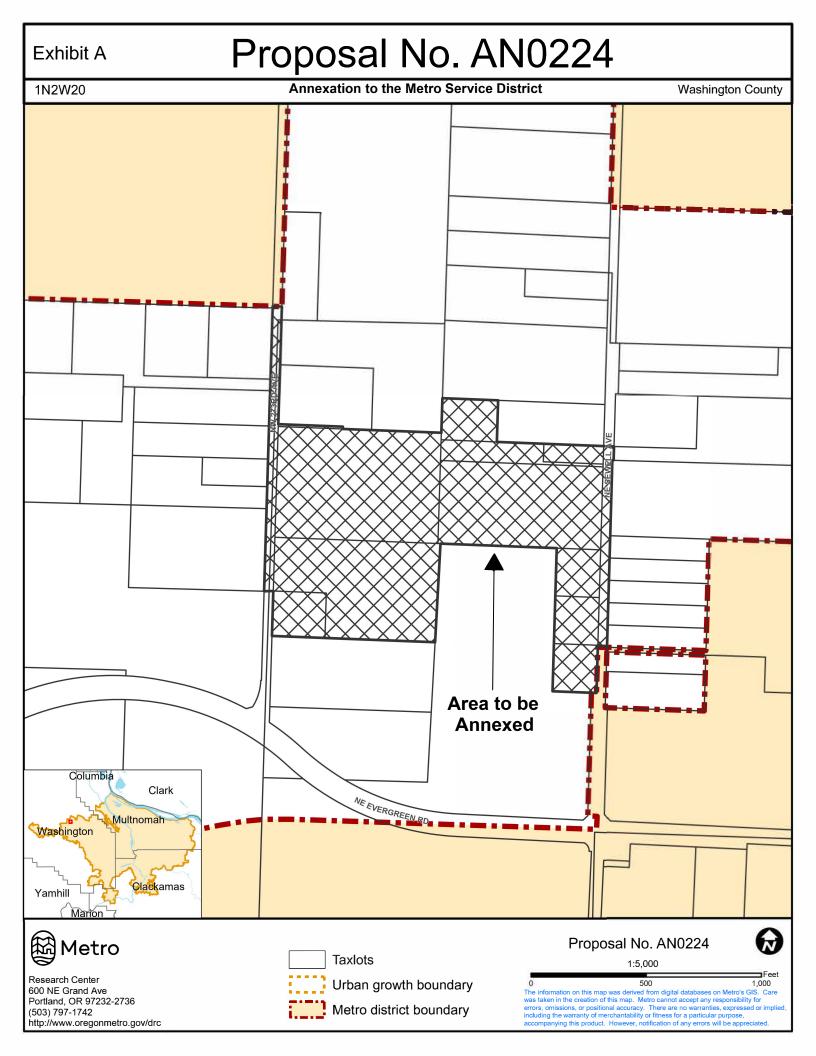

The subject territory has already been annexed to the City of Hillsboro by City Ordinance No. 6462 and is zoned by the City for urban industrial land uses. Therefore, the application meets the criteria in MC Subsection 3.09.070(E)(2).

3. The proposed change is consistent with any applicable cooperative or urban service agreements adopted pursuant to ORS Chapter 195 and any concept plan.

Staff Response:

The subject territory has a land use plan designation of "Industrial" in the City of Hillsboro's March 2023 Comprehensive Plan Map. The proposed boundary change would allow for industrial development of the subject territory. The subject territory is already within the UGB and is not in an urban reserve with a concept plan. Urban services will be provided by the City of Hillsboro and Clean Water Services (CWS). The application meets the criteria in MC Subsection 3.09.070(E)(3).

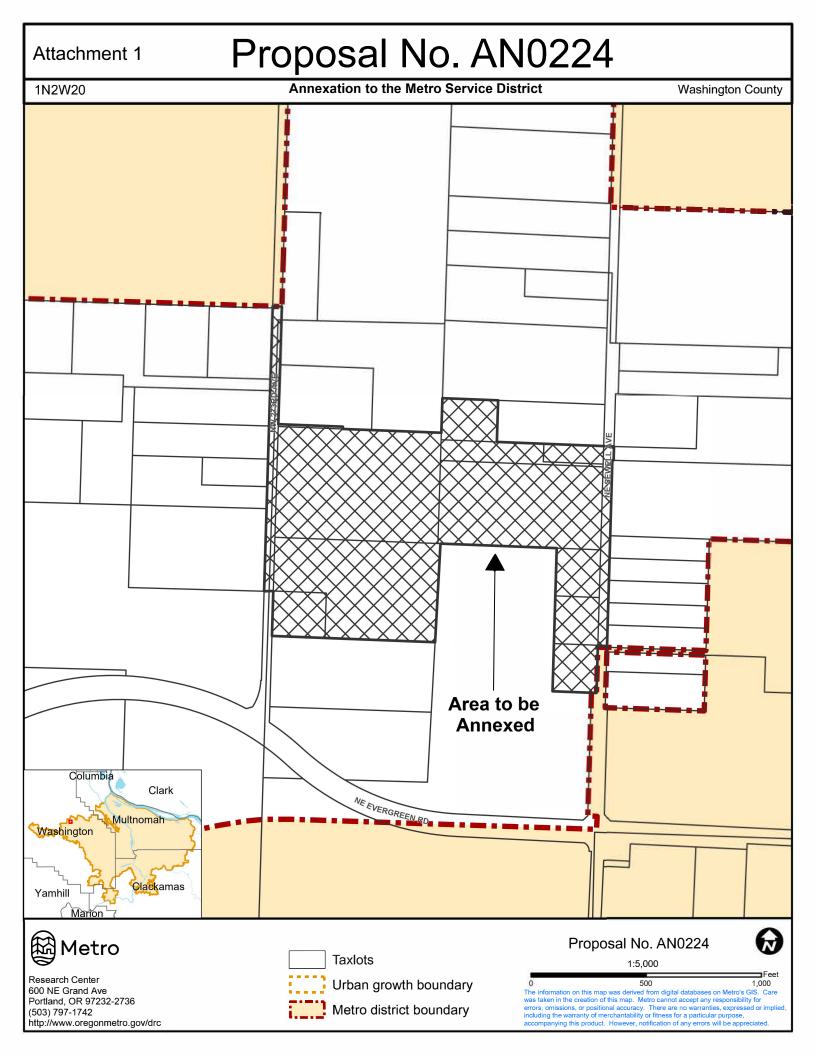

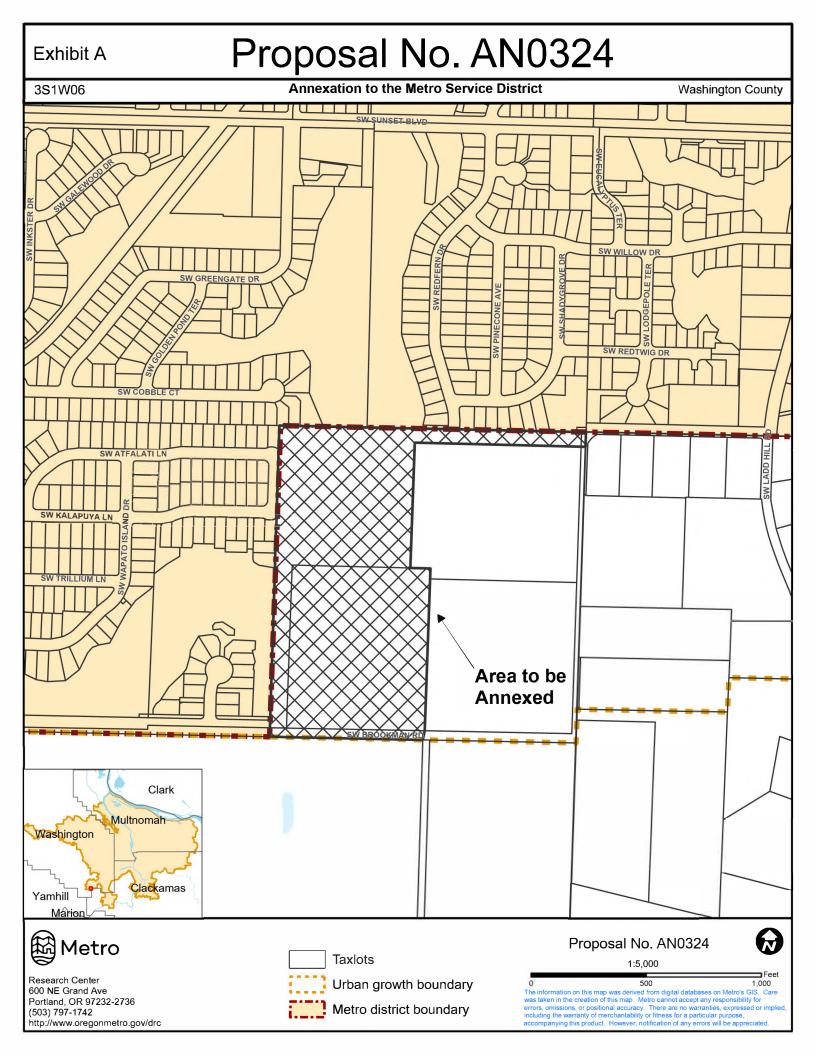

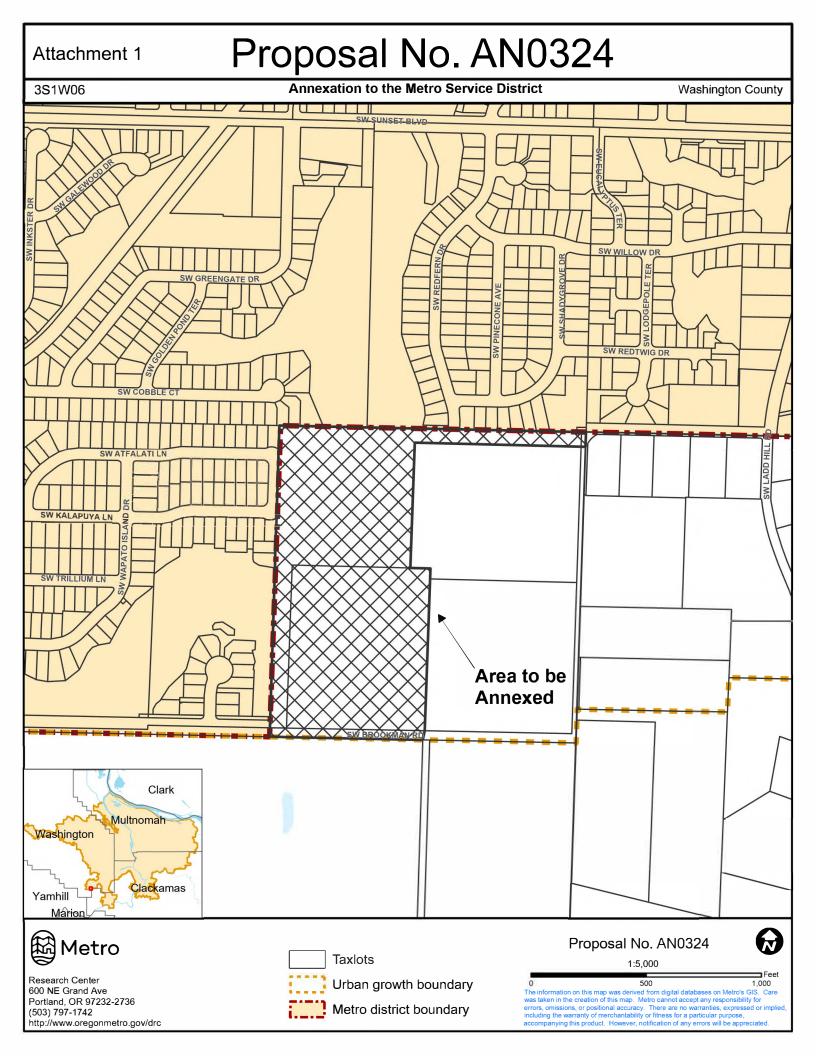
