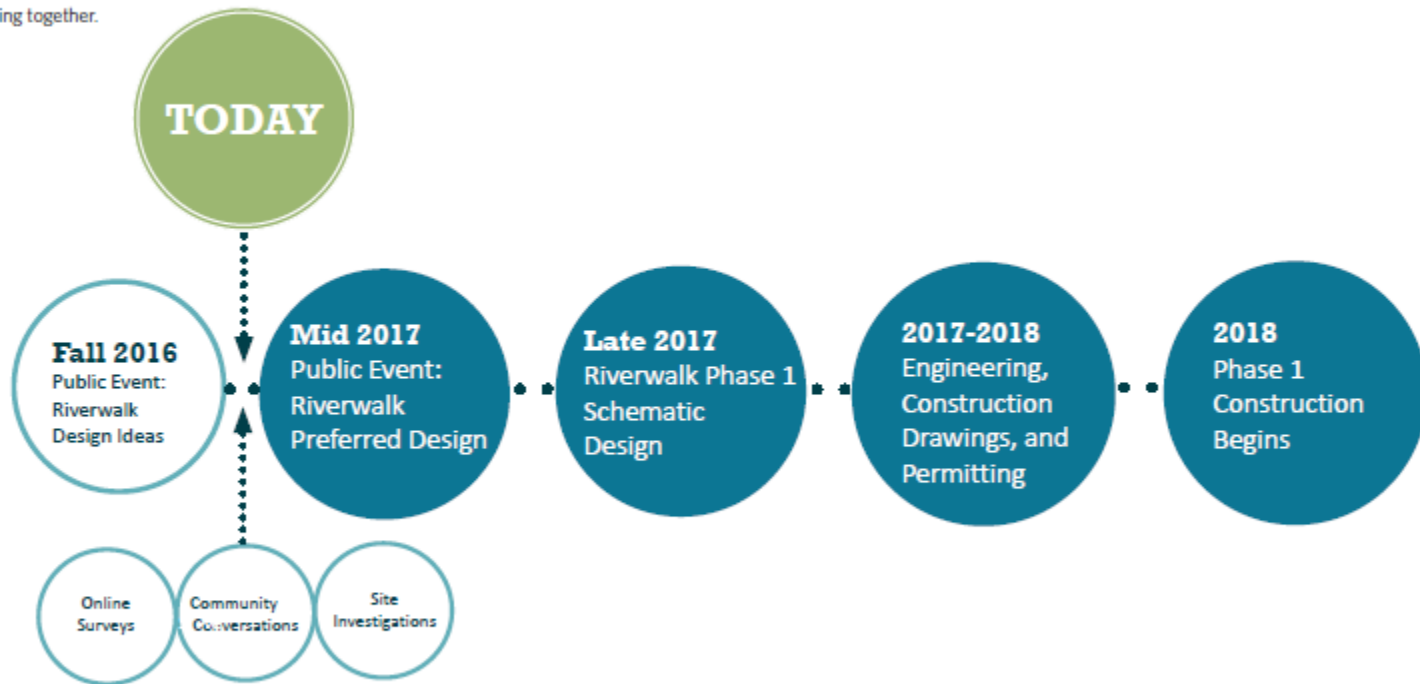
Goals for the Transportation, Access and Parking Plan

- Reach shared understanding among stakeholders of transportation and parking issues, tools, and goals for this project
- Create a long-term metric based strategy that can guide the community through the many phases of private and public development onsite
- Achieve Planning Commission approval of the strategy and plan as part of the upcoming riverwalk land use approval, including identification of proportional requirements for the first phase of the riverwalk
- Identify actionable next steps that community and City can take to implement the plan

KEY DESIRED OUTCOMES (from Summits 1 & 2)

- Walking infrastructure is lowest hanging fruit
- Wayfinding/information/communications need to be improved
- Connectivity (to downtown and vice versa) is essential
- Manage neighborhood parking spillover
- Provide parking but don't overprovide – recognize timing and cost issues
- Maximize the parking we have



KEY DESIRED OUTCOMES (from Summits 1 & 2)

- Improve transit / shuttle connections
- Enhance bicycle access and comfort
- Address Highway 99 (speed, safety)
- There are both public and private solutions
- *The TDM & Access Plan needs coordination and on-going community input*



STRATEGY APPROACH

- Inside/Outside Filter
 - ✓ Building on existing infrastructure first
- Begin with commitment to organization and coordination
- Near, mid and long-term strategies
 - ✓ Near-term (Project opening)
 - ✓ Mid-term (Lower cost/building on near term accomplishments)
 - ✓ Long-term (Higher cost/private partnership opportunities)

CHALLENGES

■ Coordination

- ✓ A designated point person to manage the plan
- ✓ On-going stakeholder input (SAC)
- ✓ Liaising partnerships and opportunities



■ Process / Patience

- ✓ Several near-term strategies require additional research and fact finding and/or moving forward prematurely could set up long term failure.

■ Resources

- ✓ Quantifying costs / identifying resources
- ✓ Piggy-backing/leveraging other plans and processes

CENTRALIZE COORDINATION/IMPLEMENTATION OF THE TRANSPORTATION DEMAND MANAGEMENT (TDM) PLAN</p>  <p>Reason(s)/rationale: Ensure stakeholder coordination and forward movement of TDM Plan.</p> <p>Triggers: Plan approval/adoption. Within six months of plan adoption, designate a single staff person responsible for plan implementation.</p> <p>Implementation Steps:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Designate a single staff person (TDM Project Manager) responsible for plan implementation. • Establish a representative TDM Access Plan Implementation Advisory Committee charged with assisting in the coordination and implementation of the TDM plan. • Initiate routine meeting schedule, provide consultant support as needed. 	<p>****</p>	<p>\$</p>
<p>2. DEVELOP ONGOING MONITORING DATA COLLECTION PLAN</p>  <p>Reason/rationale: Most of the TDM and access strategies require ongoing monitoring for evaluation purposes. Especially measurement of onsite parking usage, parking pricing, walking and bicycling access improvements, off-site parking and shuttle programs, residential parking permits, and hours of parking enforcement.</p> <p>Triggers: Plan Adoption/Approval triggers starting this process.</p> <p>Implementation Steps:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Review existing monitoring methods and determine what is missing (approach, level of detail). • Include as an annual or biannual budget item. • Identify stakeholders who can provide paid or volunteer support for data collection tasks. • Identify staff to own and manage project. • Determine appropriate schedule, yearly, every other year, summer, fall, etc. • Hire consultants as needed to implement. 	<p>****</p>	<p>\$\$</p>
