

PRESIDENTS' COMMENTS - Robert G. Simpson

Neither the Columbia River nor Portland will be ocean ports in the next century. The potholes in your streets are never going to be fixed. Sewage is poisoning your drinking water. These predictions need not come true. Projects for future MCL action are announced in this first issue of the NEWSLETTER and these subjects and more will be addressed. GOVERNMENT STRUCTURE & FINANCE - Ron Cease

Last year, a number of governmental officials addressed the committee about problems and issues affecting the metro area. Proposed legislation was reviewed and recommendations made to the Board. Testimony and letters were presented to appropriate legislative committees in support of the extension of dues to METRO.

LAND USE AND URBAN SERVICES - Wm. Moshofsky

Our committee met over a dozen times last year pending state legislation impacting the metropolitan area. Primary focus was on the extent the state land control agency (LCDC) is controlling land use decisions and the process it uses. The committee was also concerned about the potential overlap between the functions of LCDC and the Metropolitan Sertinian Deliving and Deliving a vice District on land use controls. Policies and positions were developed and, with approval of the Board, presented to the state legislature. Legislative action this past session did reflect some of the committees' concerns by reducing the role of LCDC and improving procedures.

Thank you for being affirmative on our request for your help at the September 23rd noon meeting of the League at Tuck Lung Restaurant.

The two panelists will be Port of Portland Executive Director Lloyd Anderson and Jack Weisser, Assistant General Counsel, Union Pacific Railroad.

The League's interest in the Port stems from its basic relationships with all metropolitan governments - METRO, Tri-Met and the Port.

Waterway user fees are apparently crucial to the future of the Port. Port interests view the railroads as their chief opposition onthis issue as well as on other projects such as the proposed new Bonneville lock. So the platforming of Anderson and Weisser makes sense for an instructive program.

We suggest questions that cover the Stockman-Reagan doctrine that the user pays - perhaps a few inquiries on the challenge of ddep-water Puget Sound ports to the Columbia-Willamette and Oregon coast ports, and interrogation about the entire problem of who pays for inland river maintenance (not withstanding the uncertainties of a restless Mt. St. Helens).



I am writing to remind you to renew your membership in the Metropolitan Citizens League. As the new year begins, so too, do a number of activities you won't want to miss.

In 1983, The MCL Executive Committee has chosen to focus on three issues of importance. The first will consider how to finance basic capital services within the Urban Growth Boundary: storm and sanitary sewers; water supply systems and streets. In the context of Ballot Measure 3 concerns and the current state of Oregon's economy, financing capital facilities to support or maintain economic development, is critical.

A second major understaking of the League this year is to consider the future of our regional parks. Lane County was forced to close many of its parks outside of Eugene due to funding and maintenance problems. Do we face a similar problem here? Who uses the parks? In a crunch, can we act regionally to get the best use for the most people? These questions and others will be considered by a newly formed Metro Citizens League Study Group.

The third effort is to create a permanent local government education program. It will present the structure of local government, the services it provides, and how they are financed. The final product will be a video tape presentation which can be given by an MCL member to civic and academic groups. We believe this will fill a void, particularly in schools, where little is taught about the level of government closest to most people.

Another activity is our monthly luncheon series. In the coming months, members will have an opportunity to listen to and exchange ideas on the following:



His career in education also includes service as an adjunct professor in the Michigan State University College of Education, as Commissioner of the state of Michigan Tenure Commission and as board member of the Institute for Educational Leadership, Inc.

Prophet holds a doctorate in educational supervision and administration from Northwestern University, a master's degree in the same subject from Roosevelt University and a bachelor's degree in general education from the University of Omaha.

A native of Mississippi, Dr. Prophet is married. He and his wife, Freddye, have four children.


