GOVERNMENT STRUCTURE & FINANCE - Ron Cease

Last year, a number of governmental officials addressed the committee about problems and issues affecting the metro area. Proposed legislation was reviewed and recommendations made to the Board. Testimony and letters were presented to appropriate legislative committees in support of the extension of dues to METRO.

LAND USE AND URBAN SERVICES - Wm. Moshofsky

Our committee met over a dozen times last year pending state legislation impacting the metropolitan area. Primary focus was on the extent the state land control agency (LCDC) is controlling land use decisions and the process it uses. The committee was also concerned about the potential overlap between the functions of LCDC and the Metropolitan Service District on land use controls. Policies and positions were developed and, with approval of the Board, presented to the state legislature. Legislative position this past spession did reflect some of the ture. Why shouldn't the citizens of East county form a new city of Columbia Ridge rather than annex? If the citizens of North Clackamas County do not form the city of McLoughlin, who will provide the services? Are the residents of the cities really paying for services in the unincorporated areas?

METRO Reapportionment:

After studying proposals made by the Secretary of State and METRO regarding METRO councilor district boundaries, the following Committee recommendations were made to and approved by the MCL Board of Directors:

- 1. The Office of the Secretary of State should closely review the boundaries proposed for subdistricts 4, 5 and 6. Some adjustments may be warranted.
- 2. In so far as legal criteria and political sense permit, the Office of the Secretary of State should accomplish its reapportionment responsibility with as little disruption of "elected incumbencies" as possible.

The Board agreed with the Committee that it is most appropriate that the reapportionment agency be a body outside METRO, such as the Office of the Secretary of State; however, it also seems appropriate to consider incumbents if this can be done without violating the population and other criteria provided by law. Experience is an important part of the stability and continuity essential to METRO's successful development.

These recommendations were transmitted to the Secretary of State and were repeated at a hearing held in Portland on October 27.

Other Issues

The Committee is presently taking a close look at the initiative petition being circulated statewide by a group of people wishing to abolish metropolitan service districts.

Long range plans include study of the port system for the lower Columbia River. Committee meetings are held every other Wednesday. Special guests are invited to attend and share their expertise and points of view with committee members.

The Land Use and Urban Services Committee heard advocates of two competing solutions to the urban service problems of East Multnomah County at the committee's December 15, 1981 meeting. Bill Dirker, annexation coordinator for the City of Portland, and Bonnie McKnight, a member of the Mid-County Future Alternatives Committee (MCFAC) discussed the merits of annexation or incorporation of the urbanized area between Portland and Gresham. The committee has been charged to recommend ways to improve the facilities and services - sewers, water, streets, police, etc. - in unincorporated areas within the regional urban growth boundary.

MCFAC, a group of mid-county residents, advocates consolidation of the vast (150,000 people) urban area with the tiny (population 1800) City of Fairview, which would create a new municipality larger than Eugene. Mr. Dirker pointed to the City of Portland's established ability to provide facilities and services as the chief benefit to annexation.

The committee plans the following series of meetings. At each meeting the committee will hear presentations from public officials and citizen advocates on specific aspects of the issue.

The METRO Committee meets every Friday at the Ione Terrace Restaurant at 7:30 AM. The focus has been the assesment of performance, structure and financial operation. To date, they have had as guest speakers, Don McIntyre of EIEIO; Jack Nelson, mayor of Beaverton; Joy Burgess, Mayor of Milwaukie; and Lucille Warren, a Washington County Commissioner. The committee, with the help of these people, is looking for recommendations for METRO. A report will be given at the annual meeting on May 26, 1982.

The Land Use and Urban Affairs Committee continues its' inquiry into the problems of providing urban services to unincorporated areas within the regional urban growth boundary. On March 2nd, the committee heard presentations on the provision of police protection from Multnomah County Commissioner Dennis Buchanan, Clackamas County Sheriff Paul McAllister and Washington County Administrator Gordon Mulleneaux. On February 16th, the committee reviewed sewer service with Dave Abraham, Administrator of Clackamas County Service District No. 1, and representative of the Washington County Unified Sewerage Agency.

The committee will study streets and roads, parks, water and other services in the weeks ahead, in preparation for its' report to the League on means to improve the delivery of urban services in the region as a whole and in east Multnomah County in particular. The committee will next meet on March 16th, March 30th and April 13th at 7:30 AM at the Ione Terrace Restaurant.

Dear Members.

This first newsletter is our way of thanking you for your excellent responses to our recent membership renewal drive for 1984-85, and bringing you up-to-date on recent Citizens League activities.

The Library Committee completed its study on library systems in April. The Committee's findings and recommendations were included in a report entitled, "Libraries in Transition", which was aired at a press conference in May and received excellent media coverage. Reports have been sent to librarians, public officials and interested citizens in the tri-county area, to be used as a basis for discussion at a library systems conference MCL has scheduled for July 20th. Additional copies are available at the office for interested, members. A summary appears on Page 3.

Following close behind is a "Study of Financing Basic Capital Services Within the Portland Metropolitan Area", recently completed by the Local Government Finance Committee and approved by the Board of Directors at its June meeting. Copies have been sent to the media and are also available at the MCL office. A summary appears on Page 2.

The Parks Committee is completing its research into regional parks and will soon have a report ready. A new committee, Regional Government Structures, chaired by Jane Rhodes, was formed earlier this year. The Committee will be reviewing legislative bills being considered by Glenn Otto's Interim Task Force on Regional Governments and will develop recommendations for Board consideration.

Two members, Tom Questad and Eleanor Milne, have graciously volunteered their services as co-executive directors, replacing Beth Blunt, who left earlier this year. Eleanor will handle office activities such as meeting notices and other membership mailings, luncheon arrangements and bookkeeping. Tom will concentrate on membership recruitment and public affairs.

A by-law change was adopted by the Board in June, eliminating specified dues amounts from the by-laws for various types of memberships. Instead, the amount of dues for each membership category will be reviewed annually by the Board, prior to sending renewal notices to the membership. Members will be advised of the change with their dues notices.

Currently, individual memberships are \$35. Senior citizen and student memberships are available at \$10. Business contributions begin at \$100; however, contributions in any amount are accepted from any and all. LOCAL GOVERNMENT FINANCE COMMITTEE ISSUES FIRST REPORT

The eleven members of the Local Government Finance Committee, chaired by Charles Kemper, issued its first report, titled: "Financing Basic Capital Services Within the Portland Metropolitan Area." The Committee was formed in 1983 to study the limitations to financing basic capital development services such as storm drainage, sewers, water supplies, and roads within the Portland metro area. Their report is a first step in an effort to describe a less expensive way to meet future needs.

Local governments are being forced to cut back drastically on capital investments or consider new methods to finance them because of federal aid cut backs, shrinking tax sources and high interest rates. Historically, intergovernmental transfers from the federal level have been a major method to finance basic capital services of local governments. But now the federal government is telling local governments to stop looking to Washington for assistance.

The Committee detailed seven work tasks to complete of which this study is a partial report. Included are interviews with five public officials who are intimately involved with financing capital improvement projects for the major jurisdictions in the area. There is a very interesting survey of 35 local agencies that lists some of the problems and concerns they have with obtaining public support for capital improvements. The findings and recommendations address the cut backs in federal aid and the need to develop citizen involvement in an advisory capacity to determine the priorities for capital improvements.

The final section discusses the proper revenue mix for capital improvement projects considering the three groups now providing funds: general taxpayers, facility users and owners of benefited property. The question is raised of whether the price system or the political system is the proper determinant of the amount of service which should be provided. The report concludes that whatever method is chosen to determine the revenue mix it should include consideration of the economic efficiency of collection, equity, political accountability, and administrative feasibility.

LIBRARIES IN TRANSITION: A Follow-Up JULY 20th MEETING PLANNED

The Library Systems Committee of the Metropolitan Citizen's League issued its final report and held a press conference in May. The report was described by the major Portland daily, two television stations and a radio station. An editorial in the same major Portland daily, several weeks after the press conference, promoted the Committee's concept of developing regional library cooperation in commenting about a dispute over local library user fees.

The Library Systems Committee is concerned that there is little long-term planning or coordination among libraries and that long-term funding is a problem for almost all the local libraries. In each county, the libraries report to a different governing body and they compete with other general government programs for funding.

On July 20th, the Metropolitan Citizens League will hold a meeting for all interested librarians and members of the public to help develop cooperation and resource sharing within the metropolitan area. If there is enough interest in this concept, we will encourage the formation of a tri-county consortium to begin development of regional, library resource sharing.
