Debate over style lies behind debate over garbage

To District 8 Metro Councilor Judy Wyers, the fights over building a new garbage system for the Metropolitan Service District point up the political immaturity of the 10-year-old council, and that of some of its members.

Metro councilors are being manipulated by such large garbage firms as Waste Management Inc. and its Oregon subsidiary, Oregon Waste Systems, "because they are politically inexperienced, some of them; they don't know how to handle an intense lobbying effort," Wyers says.

Wyers, who joined the council this January after a long career in Democratic Party politics working with her husband, former State Sen. Jan Wyers, was seen as something new for the 12-member council.

In the past, Metro councilors typically have been lesser-known people from business or industry. Few have been party veterans or experienced politicians.

Some looked at Wyers' victory in the election with regret, saying that Metro was in danger of losing its non-partisan, citizen council atmosphere where business has been accomplished quietly and with a minimum of public attention.

Wyers herself disagrees that having a full-fledged politician on the council has been a detriment. Instead, she sees it as an advantage.

Metro can't continue to function with such a low profile anymore, she says, not with savvy corporations such as Waste Management on the scene. And politicians, while they may be the butt of many jokes, do know how to bring public input into the discussion of issues in an effective way.

Wyers's wish to increase Metro's visibility has sometimes put her in conflict with her colleagues. She has been handing out sheets of telephone numbers for all the Metro councilors to the public, and that caused an altercation with District 2 Councilor Lawrence Bauer of Beaverton.

At a council meeting, Bauer told her to stop

giving out his home telephone number (the only number he has listed on the Metro information sheet), saying, "Don't you let anyone call me at home ever again," Wyers says. She came right back and told Bauer he was an inexperienced politician.

"That's just blatant inexperience as to his role as a public official," Wyers says.

She says Metro councilors not only should be more available to the public, but they should take their message out to community meetings in order to get people interested and informed about Metro and the issues it faces. She has visited neighborhood association meetings in her district since her election.

Brian Heiberg, co-owner of Heiberg Garbage Service and Recycling in Sellwood, agrees with Wyers, herself a Sellwood resident.

"(Metro councilors) are the people who could be having press conferences and media events," he says, "We need some representation from our Metro councilors. They could be listening to the people of the area they represent."

He would also like to see Metro councilors take the initiative in building better communication.

"I don't ever recall a Metro councilor coming to a (neighborhood association) meeting (before Wyers) and saying, These are some of the things before us," he says.

Wyers describes Metro presiding officer Mike Ragsdale and other councilors as wanting to be "discreet" in their discussions of policy and the day-to-day operation of Metro in order to avoid thorny political debates.

"He doesn't want a higher profile," Wyers says of Ragsdale.

"Generally, there's a feeling on the council that they don't want these things given too much public attention or debate.

"There's a feeling that public input complicates the process rather than enhances it."

Ragsdale responds strongly to Wyers' suggestions.

"What she's saying is ridiculous," he says. He

and Metro executive Rena Cusma have spoken about Metro in the community many times and to suggest that any public official would like to restrict public input into the governmental process is "outrageous."

Metro will meet the public's test of maturity by doing good work and nothing else, Ragsdale says.

Metro has an unusual structure, with an executive and a council sharing the same staff, for one thing, and it still hasn't found its legs yet, Wyers says.

"Part of the problem at Metro is that Metro is young," she says. It replaced the Columbia Region Association of Governments only 10 years ago.

Metro is only now learning about the Oregon Public Meetings Law, for example.

"They've got a long way to go, as far as I'm concerned," she says.

One of the requirements of that law is that a quorum of the council cannot meet together without a stipulated amount of public notice. But councilors have met to conduct business without adequate notice to the public, Wyers says.

"It happens," she says.

Ginny Burdick, a former candidate for the state Senate in Southeast and Southwest Portland and now involved with Don't Trash Oregon, echoes Wyers sentiments about organizations that believe that public input is a hindrance to an efficient political process.

She serves as vice chairwoman of the Land Conservation and Development Commission, which has also sometimes shown a reluctance to be visible and active in seeking out communication with the public, she says.

"You cannot go too far in bringing in the public," she says.

Trying to avoid difficulty by avoiding public controversy is always eventually counterproductive, Wyers says.

"I think that Metro needs to come of age as a public body with response to the public, or it's going to continue to be a hidden government that people don't feel good about," she says. October 27, 1989




