WHEREAS, the Multnomah County Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission held its public hearing on the annual Metro budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016, and ending June 30, 2017; and

WHEREAS, recommendations from the Multnomah County Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission have been received by Metro (attached as Exhibit A and made a part of the Resolution) and considered; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED,

- 1. The "Fiscal Year 2016-17 Metro Budget," in the total amount of SIX HUNDRED TWENTY MILLION ONE HUNDRED NINETY FOUR THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED FIFTY SIX (\$620,194,356), attached hereto as Exhibit B, and the Schedule of Appropriations, attached hereto as Exhibit C, are hereby adopted.
- 2. The Metro Council does hereby levy ad valorem taxes, as provided in the budget adopted by Section 1 of this Resolution, at the rate of \$0.0966 per ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000) of assessed value for operating rate levy; at the rate of \$0.0960 per ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000) of assessed values for local option rate levy and in the amount of THIRTY TWO MILLION THREE HUNDRED TWELVE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED FIFTY FOUR (\$32,312,954) for general obligation bond debt, said taxes to be levied upon taxable properties within the Metro District for the fiscal year 2016-17. The following allocation and categorization subject to the limits of Section 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution constitute the above aggregate levy.

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION 16-4697 ADOPTING THE ANNUAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2016-17, MAKING APPROPRIATIONS, LEVYING AD VALOREM TAXES, AND AUTHORIZING AN INTERFUND LOAN

BACKGROUND

I am forwarding to the Metro Council for consideration and approval my proposed budget for fiscal year 2016-17.

Metro Council action, through Resolution No. 16-4697 is the final step in the process for the adoption of Metro's operating financial plan for the forthcoming fiscal year. Final action by the Metro Council to adopt this plan must be completed by June 30, 2016.

Once the budget plan for fiscal year 2016-17 is approved by the Metro Council on May 5, 2016, the number of funds and the maximum tax levy cannot be amended without review and certification by the Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission. Adjustments, if any, by the Metro Council to increase the level of expenditures in a fund are limited to no more than 10 percent of the total value of any fund's expenditures in the period between Metro Council approval in early May 2016 and adoption in June 2016.

Exhibit A to this Resolution will be available subsequent to the Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission hearing June 9, 2016. Exhibits B and C of the Resolution will be available at the public hearing on April 14, 2016.

ANALYSIS/INFORMATION

- 1. **Known Opposition** Metro Council hearings will be held on the Proposed Budget on April 14, 2016 and May 5, 2016. Opportunities for public comments will be provided. Opposition to any portion of the budget will be identified during that time.
- 2. **Legal Antecedents** The preparation, review and adoption of Metro's annual budget is subject to the requirements of Oregon Budget Law, ORS Chapter 294. Oregon Revised Statutes 294.635 requires that Metro prepare and submit its approved budget to the Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission by May 15, 2016. The Commission will conduct a hearing on June 9, 2016 for the purpose of receiving information from the public regarding the Metro Council's approved budget. Following the hearing, the Commission will certify the budget to the Metro Council for adoption and may provide recommendations to the Metro Council regarding any aspect of the budget.
- 3. **Anticipated Effects** Adoption of this Resolution will put into effect the annual FY 2016-17 budget, effective July 1, 2016.
- 4. **Budget Impacts** The total amount of the proposed FY 2016-17 annual budget is \$620,194,356 and 852.51 FTE.

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION NO. 16-4696 APPROVING THE FY 2016-17 BUDGET, SETTING PROPERTY TAX LEVIES AND TRANSMITTING THE APPROVED BUDGET TO THE MULTNOMAH COUNTY TAX SUPERVISING AND CONSERVATION COMMISSION

BACKGROUND

On April 14, 2016, Martha Bennett, the Chief Operating Officer, presented the FY 2016-17 Proposed Budget to the Metro Council sitting as Budget Committee. A public hearing on the budget was held where the Council, sitting as Metro's Budget Committee, received testimony from interested members of the general public and Metro stakeholders.

The action taken by this resolution is the interim step between initial proposal of the budget and final adoption of the budget in June. Oregon Budget Law requires that Metro approve and transmit its budget to the Multnomah County Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission (TSCC). Members of the TSCC are appointed by the Governor to supervise local government budgeting and taxing activities in Multnomah County. The TSCC will hold a public hearing on Metro's budget scheduled for Thursday, June 9, 2016 at 12:30 p.m. in the Metro Council Chamber Annex. Following the meeting, the TSCC will provide a letter of certification for Metro's budget at which time the Council will formally adopt the final budget for FY 2016-17. The adoption of the budget is currently scheduled for Thursday, June 23, 2016.

Oregon Budget Law requires the Budget Committee of each local jurisdiction to set the property tax levies for the ensuing year at the time the budget is approved. Under budget law the Metro Council sits as the Budget Committee for this action. The tax levies must be summarized in the resolution that approves the budget and cannot be increased beyond this amount following approval. Metro's levy for general obligation debt reflects actual debt service levies for all outstanding general obligation bonds. The levy authorization for FY 2016-17 also includes year 4 of the 5-year local option levy for Parks and Natural Areas support as well as the levy for Metro's permanent tax rate for general operations.

ANALYSIS/INFORMATION

- 1. **Known Opposition** None known at this time.
- 2. **Legal Antecedents** The preparation, review and adoption of Metro's annual budget is subject to the requirements of Oregon Budget Law, ORS Chapter 294. Oregon Revised Statutes 294.635 requires that Metro prepare and submit its approved budget to the Multnomah County Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission by May 15, 2016. The Commission will conduct a hearing on June 9, 2015 for the purpose of receiving information from the public regarding the Council's approved budget. Following the hearing, the Commission will certify the budget to the Council for adoption and may provide recommendations to the Council regarding any aspect of the budget.

- 3. **Anticipated Effects** Adoption of this resolution will set the maximum tax levies for FY 2016-17 and authorize the transmittal of the approved budget to the Multnomah County Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission.
- 4. **Budget Impacts** The total amount of the proposed FY 2016-17 annual budget is \$620,194,356. Any changes approved by the Council at the time of approval were incorporated into the budget prior to transmittal to the TSCC.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

The Council President recommends adoption of Resolution No. 16-4696 approving the FY 2016-17 budget and authorizing the Chief Operating Officer to submit the approved budget to the Multnomah County Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission.



BACKGROUND

CASE: AN-0216, Annexation to Metro District Boundary

PETITIONERS: West Hills Development Noyes Development Group

735 SW 158th Avenue 16305 NW Bethany Ct. #101

PROPOSAL: West Hills Development proposes to annex one parcel (10.17 acres) located at

16125 NW Brugger Road and Noyes Development Group proposes to annex six parcels west of NW Kaiser Road and north of NW Brugger Road totaling 83.34 acres to the Metro Jurisdictional Boundary. The applicants are in the process of annexing the subject properties to the necessary service districts in Washington County.

LOCATION: The West Hills Development parcel is located at 16125 NW Brugger Road. The

Noves Development Group parcels are located west of NW Kaiser Road and north of

NW Brugger Road. A map of the proposed annexation areas can be found in

Attachment 1.

ZONING: The properties are zoned for residential use (R6 NB, R9 NB, R15 NB & R24 NB) and

institutional use (INST NB) by Washington County.

The land was added to the UGB in 2002 and is part of the North Bethany Subarea Plan that was adopted by Washington County. The land must be annexed into the Metro District for urbanization to occur.

APPLICABLE REVIEW CRITERIA

The criteria for an expedited annexation to the Metro District Boundary are contained in Metro Code Section 3.09.070.

3.09.070 Changes to Metro's Boundary

(E) The following criteria shall apply in lieu of the criteria set forth in subsection (d) of section 3.09.050. The Metro Council's final decision on a boundary change shall include findings and conclusions to demonstrate that:

1. The affected territory lies within the UGB;

Staff Response:

The subject parcels were brought into the UGB in 2002 through the Metro Council's adoption of Ordinance No. 02-987A.

2. The territory is subject to measures that prevent urbanization until the territory is annexed to a city or to service districts that will provide necessary urban services; and

Staff Response:

The conditions of approval for Ordinance No. 02-987A include a requirement that Washington County apply interim protection measures for areas added to the UGB as outlined in Urban Growth Management Functional Plan Title 11: Planning for New Urban Areas. Title 11 requires that new urban areas be annexed into the Metro District Boundary prior to urbanization of the area. Washington County also requires the land to be annexed into the appropriate sanitary sewer, water, park and road service districts prior to urbanization occurring, which the applicants are in the process of completing. These measures ensured that urbanization would occur only after annexation to the necessary service districts is completed.

3. The proposed change is consistent with any applicable cooperative or urban service agreements adopted pursuant to ORS Chapter 195 and any concept plan.

Staff Response:

The property proposed for annexation is part of Washington County's North Bethany County Service District, established by the County Board of Commissioners on June 7, 2011. The proposed annexation is consistent with that agreement and is required by Washington County as part of a land use application. The inclusion of the property within the Metro District is consistent with all applicable plans.

ANALYSIS/INFORMATION

Known Opposition: There is no known opposition to this application.


Legal Antecedents: Metro Code 3.09.070 allows for annexation to the Metro District boundary.

Anticipated Effects: This amendment will add approximately 93.51 acres to the Metro District. The land is currently within the UGB in unincorporated Washington County. Approval of this request will allow for the urbanization of the parcels to occur consistent with the North Bethany Subarea Plan.

Budget Impacts: The applicants were required to file an application fee to cover all costs of processing this annexation request, thus there is no budget impact.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends adoption of Ordinance No. 16-1374.

I realize Mary Rose Navarro has, according to policy, eliminated land we hope for a park, for being too small. Yet we need the kind of help Metro can provide, which brings me here today in defense of a new land use threat - the power of money for residential development to consume all remaining open space in fringe areas like ours, close to Barbar Blvd, and I-5. I refer to a 1.54 acre site on SW Spruce behind the Tigard Fred Meyer.

It took a Dec 2015 plan by the City of Tigard to cover the great with asphalt, top it with 20 three-story tower houses, to wake me up, With Portland's Westmoreland Nature Park the model, I walked a half-mile radius required for a walk-to park, to petition support, and no one turned me down, especially residents of a new 12-house development on 78 and 5W Spruce who play on street and sidewalk for lack of space. The twelve houses replaced one older Metzger home.

Our hope rests with Metro and such as The Trust for Public Land to See the long-term value of this privately-owned acreage, help fund and preserve it from blight to pending over-development. My home of over 50 years, on 7310 SN Pine St, will be a tear-down along with its landscape of old trees and shrubs. We live in troubled times for which we're Ill-prepared - climate change, earthquakes, a possible Trump presidency, job uncertainty and endless global conflict. 
